A. <u>Resolution #2020-73 – Villanova University, CEER Building, **Preliminary/Final**<u>Approval Land Development</u></u>

There was discussion amongst the Commissioners, Staff, and Applicant. John Rice, stated that there is a language change to #4 on the resolution, the language is now to read "The Applicant shall execute Development and Financial Security Agreements in a form and manner to be approved by the Township Engineer and Township Solicitor, and the new building shall be restricted to engineering, education, and research by a note on the record plan."

Commissioner Larkin moved to approve the resolution with the additional language. Seconded by Commissioner Farhy. The motion passed 5-2 with Commissioners Booker and Abel opposed.

B. Resolution #2020-72 - 117 Radnor Chester Road- Final – Minor Land Development

There was discussion amongst the Commissioners, Staff, and Applicant. Commissioner Larkin called the vote to approve the resolution. The motion failed 7-0.

C. Ordinance #2020-15 - (Adoption) An Ordinance Approving a Lease Agreement Between the Township of Radnor and the Sports Legends of Delaware County, Inc.

Commissioner Larkin moved to approve the adoption of the ordinance. Seconded by Commissioner Enderle. The motion passed 7-0.

D. Ordinance #2020-05 – (Adoption) Emergency Response Rapid Entry Systems

There was discussion amongst the Commissioners and Staff. Commissioner Farhy moved to strike the fine from the resolution. Seconded by Commissioner Booker. The motion, to strike the fine, failed 4-3 with Commissioners Abel, Booker, and Farhy in favor.

Commissioner Borowski moved to change the maximum fine to \$500. Seconded by Commissioner Larking. The motion passed 6-1 with Commissioner Booker opposed and Commissioner Farhy off the dais.

Commissioner Borowski moved to strike the term "owner-occupied" from the exclusion of one and two-family dwellings. Seconded by Commissioner Booker. The motion passed 7-0.

Commissioner Larkin moved to approve the adoption of the ordinance. Seconded by Commissioner Borowski. The motion passed 6 - 1 with Commissioner Booker opposed.

F. Resolution #2020-74 – Awarding the 2020 Superpave Resurfacing Project to
Allan Myers, L.P.

Commissioner Larkin moved to approve the resolution. Seconded by Commissioner Borowski. The motion passed 7-0.

G. Resolution #2020-71 Roberts Road Culvert - Authorizing the Payment of Change Orders #1: Additional gas line location work, #2: Powder coating of guiderail and concrete coloring, and #3: Cost of accelerated work schedule, to Loftus Construction in the Amount of \$35,049.25

There was discussion amongst the Commissioners and Staff. Commissioner Larkin moved to approve the resolution. Seconded by Commissioner Borowski. Wayne Avenue proposal and the implementation of a new Radnor Township Historical Commission that would be of aid in maintaining and saving historic properties throughout Radnor Township.

Commissioner Borowski welcomed Joyce Platfoot, the new Executive Director of Radnor Memorial Library.

"We see problems Most agreed that the non-existence of honest, fact-based communications between police and community people continues fueling negative perceptions on both sides.

Bennett's presentation included data from recent national surveys that indicated most cops become callous after taking the job (56 percent), including younger under 35 yearolds (62 percent); that most Black cops (68 percent) call policecommunity relations "fair to poor"; that 63 percent of cops believe being callous is "more useful in certain neighborhoods" than "being courteous"; and that 72 percent of cops believe that poorlyperforming cops are not held accountable.

The event, Bennett said, was designed to lay bare such realities and to address them.

Martin Wusinich, a 42-year police veteran and the Media Borough chief, said his department has not had any major incidents for the 35 years he's been the chief. But recently one of his officers got caught up in a social media controversy and

was fired by elected officials with no consultation.


He said the officer's decades-long stellar career came to a crashing end because of one "mistake" he made on social media.

He continued, "I think we have to sit down and talk before these things (explode). I don't know, in Delaware County, where, in fact, law enforcement isn't trying to do everything they can to serve the public."

"We all bring cultural biases to the table," said Delaware County Sheriff Jerry Sanders. better, sometimes for the worse."

Sanders said he has brought cultural biases to his career, but they can be dispelled through interaction with someone else.

"I always have my deputies imagine how they would like to be treated or a loved one would like to be treated," Sanders said. "The ultimate violation to human dignity is loss of home or loss of household."

Sanders continued,
"The more we talk to
each other, personally,
the more we see
(perceptions) dispelled.
Whatever negative thing
we can bring to the
table can be dispelled by
community interaction,
as law enforcement."

Sheila Carter, president of the NAACP-Darby Area Branch and former Darby Township police officer, said officers have to be trained and made more aware of what they can and cannot do. She said, while Delco doesn't have a record of police brutality in which a person died, there have been incidents of police brutality among community members.

Carter said
communities struggle
with relationships
with their police
departments and chiefs
need to "hear from
those people."

"You need to go into your communities and know who your leaders are," Carter said. "I'm not talking about your political leaders. I'm talking about the people who live in the community, go to work everyday, your Grammies – those are the people you need to have in the room."

"I think we see people first, here in Delaware County," Sanders said. "But a conversation like today; we should never be comfortable with it. We should always be challenging ourselves because we're all human."

What the Summit revealed

ave White, owner of DWD Mechanical Contractor, LLC. and a Summit for Serious Solutions co-convener, said his main goal for participating was for community and law enforcement to come together and develop strategies for change.

"We're not here to cast blame or take sides, but to work together, learn from what has happened, and make changes tomorrow," White said. "I have the upmost respect for our law enforcement. Both sides are right on this. After today, I don't want to stop the communication. We have to learn to talk with each other."

"We need to also remember that police are human just like us, and they have bad days, too," said Rev. Leonard Carroll, also a co-convener, pastor of Ezekiel Church of God in Christ and president of the Law Enforcement Chaplains of Delaware County. "How many of you (chiefs) offer (counseling and) debriefings for your officers? This is a spiritual battle and you need spiritual people to help you fight it."

If a police department does not have a clergy member as its chaplain, Carroll said one could be appointed.

training and that more
work around police
reform is continuing.

On the controversial topic of "chokeholds," most agreed that the move cutting off air to a person's windpipe is not acceptable and not used in the county.

Talking about a policy change in Media Borough, Chief Martin Wusininch said, "I had to change one word: chokehold. Our guidance on use of force is already in (our policies). I was never trained in a chokehold. I know their guidelines and use of force don't include chokeholds. I do know they're taught in other areas, (but) I never used one."

Other solutions

discussed included

continuing communications and discussions addressing issues immediately, before they get blown out of proportion; educating the community about criminal justice and police department policies; more community and cultural training for police to understand the communities they serve; expansion of citizen and youth police academies; hosting joint events, creating community advisory boards for police departments, holding bad police officers accountable and using resources that are under-utilized.

Yeadon Police Chief Anthony Paparo said he already implemented a new policy that allows officers to intervene in police interactions with the public if they feel a fellow officer is using excessive force. It also details how police should handle incidents with people who are delirious, suffering from medical or mental health emergencies, and providing attention to people in need of those

"Police chiefs have to start thinking outside the box," Paparo said. "I don't think anybody in this room would have ever thought that they would have had to write a policy to tell an officer to intervene. You have some officers, especially newer officers that are with training officers,

(that) believe they gotta follow what (the training officer's) doing."

Paparo added,
"Officers need to learn
that when they see
something that is flat
out wrong or criminal,
they have the duty to
intervene.'

He said another solution for him is to use social networking platforms to engage with community members and address their concerns. Paparo said he uses Nextdoor, a website "where communities come together to keep a local shopkeeper in business: where neighbors exchange recommendations for babysitters, plans for local events, and tips about what to order at that new cafe down the street; (and) where local agencies connect with neighbors in need," according to its website.

"It enables us to see people complain about things they might not call the police for, and as a result, it allows my guys to go and immediately handle things they see on the website," Paparo said.
"As a result, it gets these people talking. The community and the police are talking more. It's a game changer for police departments."

PA State Troopers offer two summer programs for kids.

Trooper Lt. James Hennigan said the safety of officers has to be considered when discussing communitypolice relationships but there are opportunities to engage.

The Troop N and Troop K Camp Cadet programs are for kids between 11 and 15 years-old, are designed to give kids an insight into police training and the overall expectations of a police officer, accepts kids in Delaware, Montgomery, and Bucks counties, and allows children from all backgrounds, gender, religion, nationalities, and financial status to join the program.

Children that can't afford it participate in the program for free.

Hennigan and Community Service Officer Trooper Jessica Tobin said their programs allow kids to also learn life skills such as washing clothes, cleaning, and selfdiscipline.

"You're not sending your child to this camp to get well-behaved kids," Tobin said. "We're searching for kids who aspire to become a first responder or who have an interest in what we do. We do ride-alongs, basic rules for firearm safety, and we also give kids the opportunity to get CPR certified."

Unfortunately, due to the coronavirus outbreak, camp was canceled for the 2020 season.

Wayne Senior Center COVID-19 Response Plan

In response to the COVID-19 virus, Wayne Senior Center is taking proactive measures to keep the older adults who visit the Center informed, healthy, and safe. WSC is monitoring the situation as it evolves and is in contact with Radnor Township, as well as Delaware County through the County Office of Services for the Aging (COSA).

The CDC has identified older adults and people who have severe chronic medical conditions like heart, lung, or kidney disease at higher risk for more serious COVID-19 illness. In order to help protect the older adults who utilize Wayne Senior Center programs and services, the following measures have been established in addition to our existing health and safety policies:

- Access to Wayne Senior Center building is restricted to staff and members of Wayne Senior Center, individuals with AARP Tax Prep appointments, and prior authorized individuals. All individuals will enter through the front door and must immediately sanitize hands upon entering the building.
- Increased daily cleaning and sanitation procedures within all areas of the senior center, especially high traffic/high touch areas.
- Hand sanitation and sanitizing wipes located in every room of the center.
- Increased education and signage around center re: proper hygiene and handwashing techniques.
- Temporary removal of shared handheld exercise equipment from the Fitness Center. All large machine exercise equipment must be wiped down with provided sanitizing wipes before and after use of the piece of equipment.
- Postponement of large gatherings (special events) through the end of April.
- Temporarily cease additional rental of senior center facility to outside groups.
- Temporarily cease acceptance of outside community volunteers.
- Increased outreach provided by WSC staff, to identified vulnerable, high risk, older adults within the community.

The health and safety of Wayne Senior Center members is of the utmost concern. We encourage each of our members to follow the recommendations of their doctor and encourage any member who may be experiencing cold or flu like symptoms to stay home.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Mr. Al Murphy, resident of Glenmary Road – Concerns of trailers and other large box and container trucks continuing to cut through the neighborhoods using Glenmary Road

Mr. Al Murphy spoke regarding his concerns regarding this matter. Commissioner Booker stated that these trucks passing through were not believed to be local truck deliveries. Highway Patrol Officer Pat Lacey stated that part of the issue is that there are not any signs going eastbound alerting truck drivers that it is not permitted. Staff Traffic Committee will place more "No truck except local deliveries" signs going eastbound. LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: This request has not been before the Board of Commissioners previously.


PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: The Board of Commissioners, in association with Cabrini and Eastern universities, authorized the award of the civil engineering services contract for the traffic, pedestrian and stormwater management improvements at the intersection of King of Prussia Road and Eagle Road/Pine Tree Road on May 18, 2020 (Resolution No. 2020-57). The improvements include those to the traffic signal at that intersection. The Township owns all signals within its political boundaries, although this signal is within a Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) right-of-way and requires an application to PennDOT for Traffic Signal Approval (TE-160, application attached) to assure proper maintenance. The application requires a resolution by the Board.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE: Upon approval by the Board of Commissioners, the TE-160 application will be submitted to PennDOT.

FISCAL IMPACT: This project is to be funded by the General Obligation Bond.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Staff requests the Board of Commissioners of Radnor Township to Authorize and Direct the Submittal of the Application for Traffic Signal Approval (TE-160) to the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation for the Intersection of King of Prussia Road (SR 1021) and Eagle Road (SR 1042)/Pine Tree Road Associated with the Traffic, Pedestrian and Stormwater Management Improvements.

E - Applicant (Municipal) Certification

The applicant desires to own, operate, and maintain the traffic control device in the location indicated above; and the Vehicle Code requires the approval of the Department of Transportation ("Department") before any traffic signals may be legally erected or modified. A signed Application for Traffic Signal Approval (TE-160) must be submitted in conformance with the instructions provided by the Department, and a Traffic Signal Permit must be issued, before any work can begin.

If the Department approves a traffic signal after a traffic engineering study and engineering judgment indicates the need, the traffic signal shall be installed, owned, operated, and maintained within the parameters indicated in the Vehicle Code and the Department's regulations relating to traffic signs, signals, and markings. The Department may direct appropriate alterations to the design or operation (including, but not limited to, hours of operation) of the traffic signal, or require removal of the traffic signal, if traffic conditions or other considerations necessitate alteration or removal.

All items associated with the traffic control device (geometric features, signs, signals, pavement markings, pedestrian accommodations, and other traffic control device associated items) are the applicant's responsibility. The Traffic Signal Permit will then document all of the items associated with operation of each traffic control device. The applicant, at its sole expense, shall provide the necessary inspection, maintenance, and operation activities in conformance with the Department's Publication 191 or as otherwise agreed to by the Department. The applicant shall perform the preventative and responsive maintenance requirements and recordkeeping in accordance with the exhibits specified below. If the applicant fails to provide the required inspection, maintenance, or operation services within thirty (30) days of receipt of written notice from the Department, the Department shall have the right to perform the required inspection, maintenance, or operation services in the applicant's stead and the applicant shall reimburse the Department for all costs incurred. Federal- and/or state-aid participation may be withheld on all future projects if the applicant fails to demonstrate to the Department the ability to provide all required maintenance and operation services. The applicant certifies that it has funds available and committed for the operation and maintenance of the traffic control device and that it will make available sufficient funds for all required future inspection, maintenance, and operation activities.

The applicant shall indemnify, save harmless and, defend (if requested) the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, its agents, representatives, and employees from and against any damages recoverable under the Sovereign Immunity Act, 42 Pa. C.S. §§ 8521-8528, up to the limitations on damages under said law, arising out of any personal injury or damage to property which is finally determined by a court to be caused by or result from acts or omissions of the applicant and for which a court has held applicant, its officials, or employees to be liable. This provision shall not be construed to limit the applicant in asserting any rights or defenses. Additionally, the applicant shall include in any contracts into which it enters for maintenance, operation, or inspection of the traffic control device this same obligation to indemnify the Commonwealth and its officers, agents, and employees; and it shall require its contractor(s) to provide public liability insurance coverage, naming the Commonwealth and the applicant as additional insureds for bodily injury, including death and property damage, in the minimum amounts of \$500,000 per person, \$1,000,000 per occurrence, it being the intention of parties to have the contractor fully insure and indemnify the Commonwealth and the applicant.

The applicant shall comply with the study and ordinance requirements of 75 Pa. C.S. § 6109. The applicant submits this application with the intention of being legally bound.

Neither this application nor any Traffic Signal Permit creates any rights or obligations with respect to parties other than the applicant and the Department. Third parties may not rely upon any representations made by either the applicant or the Department in connection with the submission or approval of this application or any work permitted or approved that is related to this application, as regards either payment of funds or performance of any particular item of maintenance precisely as specified.

Preventive Maintenance

The APPLICANT or its contractor will provide preventive maintenance for each individual component of the traffic signal installation covered by this application at intervals not less than those indicated in the Preventive Maintenance Summary, PA DOT Publication 191, current version. This is the recommended level of maintenance to keep the intersection control equipment and signals in mechanically, structurally and aesthetically good condition.

Response Maintenance

The APPLICANT or its contractor will provide response maintenance in accordance with the provisions of the Response Maintenance Schedule. It encompasses the work necessary to restore a traffic signal system to proper and safe operation. Includes Emergency Repair and Final Repair.

Recordkeeping

Accurate and up-to-date recordkeeping is an essential component of a good traffic signal maintenance program. In recognition of this fact, the APPLICANT must prepare, retain, and make available to the COMMONWEALTH, on request, a record of all preventive and response maintenance activities performed on the traffic signal equipment covered by this application.

The APPLICANT shall establish a separate file for each installation and keep its records in the municipal building, signal maintenance shop, or other weather-protected enclosure.

At a minimum, the following records will be kept by the APPLICANT or its contractor for each traffic signal. These forms can be found in Section 10.0, Maintenance Record Forms, PA DOT Publication 191, current version.

FORM 1 - Master Intersection Record

This form, which lists all maintenance functions performed at the intersection, should be updated within one day of the activity but no more than one week later.

FORM 2 - Response Maintenance Record

Each time response maintenance is required at the intersection, this form is to be completed. Once the pertinent information is transferred to the master intersection record, this form is to be placed in the intersection file.

FORM 3 - Preventive Maintenance Record

This form will be used to provide a record of the preventive maintenance activities performed at each intersection. The date, the activities performed, and the signature of the person in charge of the work must be recorded in the form.

This form may be kept at the intersection, if it is adequately protected from the weather. Form 1 must be updated at the central file, however, to reflect the date and activity.

Personnel Classifications

In order to properly maintain the traffic signal equipment covered by this applicant, the APPLICANT agrees to provide, as minimum, the following staff throughout the useful life of equipment. The APPLICANT agrees to abide by all guidance provided in PA DOT Publication 191.

<u>Traffic Engineer</u> - The administrative position which has prime responsibility for the proper operation of traffic signal equipment. The principal function of this position is the supervision and control of subordinate personnel and the planning of their activities to ensure adequate preventive and response maintenance programs.

Minimum Position Requirements

- A thorough understanding of traffic signal design, installation and maintenance.
- A working knowledge of the interaction between the following traffic characteristics: Intersection geometry, traffic flow theory, control type (fixed time, actuated, etc.), signal phasing and timing, and interconnection.
- 3. An ability to supervise subordinate personnel effectively in the assignment of their work.
- 4. Possession of a college degree in engineering, which includes course work in traffic engineering.
- 5. Either four years experience in the field of traffic engineering or its equivalent in graduate college work.

<u>Signal Specialist</u> - The individual responsible for the diagnostics and repair of all traffic signal equipment including solid state equipment.

Minimum Position Requirements

- 1. Extensive training and troubleshooting skills in electronics and software.
- 2. Ability to repair modules in the shop and to design test equipment needed to diagnose and repair a problem.
- 3. Ability to make design and modifications to implement or omit special functions.
- 4. Ability to implement a recordkeeping system to include maintenance activities, inventory control and identification of recurring problems.
- 5. Ability to perform all tasks required of a signal technician.

Signal Technician - Individual responsible for the operation and maintenance of traffic signals and electromechanical equipment.

Minimum Position Requirements

- 1. Ability to perform response maintenance on solid state equipment up to the device exchange level.
- 2. Capability to diagnose a vehicle loop failure and initiate corrective action.
- 3. Ability to tune detector amplifiers.
- 4. Ability to follow wiring schematics, check and set timings from plan sheet and check all field connections.
- 5. Ability to perform preventive maintenance on all equipment and to maintain accurate records of all work perform.

Training

The APPLICANT agrees to secure training in order to upgrade the ability of its present staff to properly perform the required maintenance functions. The APPLICANT agrees to abide by all guidance provided in PA DOT Publication 191.

Budget Requirements

The APPLICANT agrees to provide, in its annual operating budget, dedicated funds which are sufficient to cover the cost of the personnel, training, contractors (if utilized) and specialized maintenance equipment which are required, by virtue of this application. The APPLICANT agrees to abide by all guidance provided in PA DOT Publication 191..

The resolution is required giving the Township Manager authorization to bind coverage and pay the appropriate premium obligation.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: The purpose of the legislation is to authorize the Township Manager to bind coverage which includes Property, General Liability, Automobile Liability (including physical damage), Police Professional Liability, Public Official Liability, Employment Practices Liability, Umbrella Liability, Public Official Bonds, and Cyber Liability.

FISCAL IMPACT: The insurance coverage will cost the Township \$383,844 which will be paid in quarterly installments at the beginning of each quarter. The increase in coverage cost is primarily a result of several property claims and the addition of new police and public works vehicles. 
<u>LEGISLATION:</u> Resolution #2020-83: Authorizing the Receipt of Sealed Bids for the Construction of the West Wayne Avenue Pedestrian Improvements

<u>LEGISLATIVE HISTORY</u>: The Board of Commissioners previously awarded the design contract for this project to Traffic Planning & Design (TPD).

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: Originally, the Radnor TAP Trail had a leg of the trail that traversed the West Wayne Preserve, from the intersection of Lenoir Avenue and Conestoga Road to the Radnor Trail. In order to remove the section of the TAP Trail that ran through the West Wayne Preserve, an alternate route was brought forth, using West Wayne Avenue from Conestoga Road, through the Friends of the Radnor Trail Park, to the Radnor Trail. In using West Wayne Avenue, the existing sidewalk will have to be upgraded, ADA compliant curb ramps installed, along with crosswalks. The attached plans depict the work to be placed out to bid.

<u>IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE</u>: The PennDOT Highway Occupancy Permit is still being reviewed, but we anticipate this will be complete some time in September. Pending Commissioners approval and the PennDOT permitting process, receipt of bids is anticipated in November. At that time, we will be before the Commissioners for award of the project.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no cost to the Township to receive bids for the project. The project is estimated to cost \$205,000. This cannot be included with the TAP Trail project; it is a standalone project that must be funded by the Township. By the time of award, the Commissioners will need to determine a funding source for the project.






ELEVATION PLAN








WEST WAYNE AVENUE STA 103+50.00 TO 112+00.00 TYPICAL SECTION



<u>LEGISLATION:</u> Resolution #2020-82: Authorizing the Award of the Design Contract for the Stream Bank Stabilization at 210 Gulph Creek Road to Carroll Engineering in the amount of \$12,543.

LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: The Township has an Easement Agreement, dated November 7th, 1957 (please see attached), to install a storm drain outfall on the property at 210 Gulph Creek Road. The agreement states that the township is responsible to prevent encroachment of Gulph Creek on said property. In 2012, the Board of Commissioners authorized the sealed bid and subsequent construction contract to install a retaining wall on this property. The retaining wall abutted an existing stone retaining wall (please see attached plan). Severe weather events have compromised that existing stone retaining wall, requiring the installation of +/- 12' of retaining wall.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: Carroll Engineering has provided a proposal to provide design, permitting, bidding documents and construction administration services, as well as a construction cost estimate for the 12" of retaining wall. Once this work is completed, we will return to the Commissioners to seek approval on receiving sealed bids for the project.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE: Pending Commissioners approval, a purchase order will be processed. Carroll Engineering will commence with the design and permitting the permitting process could take three to six months. If the permitting process does take six months, we will request authorization to receive sealed bids in Q1, 2021.

FISCAL IMPACT: This project is funded by the 04 Stormwater Fund in the amount of \$12,543.

Carroll Engineering Corporation (CEC) is pleased to submit this proposal for the subject project. CEC understands Radnor Township wishes for us to complete the design, permitting, technical specifications preparation, and provide construction administration services for the stabilization of the stream bank along the southern portion of the 210 Gulph Creek Road parcel (ID 36020103201). There is approximately a 50-feet section of stream bank which is presently an eroded lawn area which will have large riprap installed akin to the existing riprap used for the previous stabilization project. An existing redi-rock wall having an approximate length of 110 feet shall be extended by approximately 12-15 feet to the north to the common property boundary with 220 Gulph Creek Road. Additionally, the toe of the existing redi-rock wall shall have riprap applied for added erosion protection. The site shall be accessed using the existing driveway, which shall be appropriately protected / restored, and from Gulp Creek Road at the eastern corner of the subject parcel. Existing fencing and landscaping shall be temporarily moved and restored to its preconstruction condition.

If such individual does not have such authority, he understands and agrees that he is personally responsible for this Letter Agreement to CEC in addition to any liability that Client may have.
- 6. Assigns: Neither Client nor CEC shall assign, sublet, or transfer interest in this agreement without the written consent of the other.
- 7. <u>Third Party Beneficiaries</u>: Nothing under this Letter Agreement shall be construed to give any rights or benefits in this Letter Agreement to anyone other than Client and CEC. All duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Letter Agreement will be for the sole and exclusive benefit of client and CEC and not for the benefit of any other party.
- 8. Client Responsibility: Client shall make all provisions for the Engineer to enter upon public or private property, shall provide legal services required for the project, and shall pay all fees incidental to obtaining permits for the project. It is understood CEC is acting as a consultant for Client to provide advice and consultation on the proposed project. Client shall designate a person to act with authority on his behalf in respect to all aspects of the project, shall examine and respond promptly to CEC's submissions, and give prompt written notice to CEC whenever he observes or otherwise becomes aware of any defect in the project. Client shall be responsible for the outcome of any applications associated with the proposed project. In the event Client does not respond to a submission from CEC within five (5) calendar days, Client shall be considered to have given its approval.
- 9. <u>Legal Matters</u>: Client shall provide legal services for all phases of the project. CEC will not express legal opinions or become an advocate in the law before public agencies. It is understood CEC's liability will extend to those matters that can be discovered by a knowledgeable Professional using a reasonable amount of effort. Should Client find the above terms unacceptable, CEC will obtain Professional Liability Project Insurance covering only this project and invoice Client for any additional insurance program.
- 18. <u>Indemnification</u>: To the fullest extent permitted by law, CEC shall indemnify Client, its officers, directors, partners, employees, and representatives, from and against losses, damages, and judgments arising from claims by third parties, including reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses recoverable under applicable law, but only to the extent they are found to be caused by a negligent act, error, or omission of CEC or CEC's officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees or subconsultants in the performance of services under this Agreement.





The said Grantor does grant, bargain and sell unto the said Grantee, its successors and assigns, the free and uninterrupted right, use, liverty and privilege to install, maintain, renew and replace at its sole cost, a 24" storm drain pipe of suitable construction for the discharge of surface water from Cricket Lane into Gulph Creek, together with the right to pass over and use the surface land over and adjacent thereto for the purpose of installing, maintaining, renewing and replacing said pipe as may be necessary or appropriate to facilitate such discharge of surface water to aid stream, the center line of said strip of land over and through which said privilege is granted being described as follows:-

BEGINNING at a point in the middle of Gulph Creek Road at the distance of 1211.99' Southwest from the middle of Biddulph Road to a point, the place of beginning; thence crossing the land of Miriam C. Daugherty South 30° 12' East 185' more or less, ending at Gulph Creek.

Together with the free ingress, egress and regress to and for the said Grantor, its successors and assigns, its workmen, servents, agents, employees and contractors, at all convenient times and seasons, for the purpose of constructing, cleansing, maintaining, improving, installing and renewing the above mentioned storm water sewer.

To have and To hold all and singular the premises, rights and privileges hereby granted, or mentioned or intended so to be, with the appurtenances, unto the said Grantee, its successors and assigns, to and for the only proper use and behoof of the said Grantee, its successors and assigns, forever.

And the said Grantee does hereby covenant and agree that it, the said Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall and will at its own sole cost and expense, whenever, by the exercise of the rights and privileges hereunto granted to it, the lands, structures, trees or shrubbery of the Grantors, or any of them, shall have been excavated, penetrated or disturbed, restore such lands, structures, trees or shrubbery as nearly as may be reasonably possible to the conditions thereof obtaining before such excavation, penetration or similar disturbance.

And the said Grantee does further covenant and agree that said storm water drain shall be constructed at such depth that it will not interfere with the free use of the surface of the ground.

and the said Grentee does hereby covenant and agree to indemify and to save hermless the aforesaid Grantors from any claim for damages arising out of the diversion of the water and increasing the size and flow of Gulph Creek by discharge of storm water from the aforementioned storm water sewer.

And the said Grantee does hereby covenant and

agree that it will, at its sole cost and expense, take such steps as may be necessary by the erection of a retaining wall or otherwise to prevent the encroachment of Gulph Creek upon land of the above named Grantors resulting from the discharge of the water into Gulph Creek from the aforementioned storm water sewer.

And the said Grantee does hereby covenant and agree that the covenants and agreements of the Grantee herein above contained shall run to and enure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, administrators and assigns of the Grantor.

RADNOR TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NO. 2020-16

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP RADNOR, DELAWARE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA PROHIBITING THE MAKING OF UNNECESSARY AND EXCESSIVE CONSTRUCTION NOISE DURING CERTAIN HOURS

WHEREAS, the Township is empowered to ensure the public safety and to define conduct that constitutes disturbing the peace within the boundaries of the Township; and

WHEREAS, It is in the interest of the citizens of Radnor Township to ensure that public health, safety and welfare shall not be abridged by the making of excessive or offensive construction noises in the Township; and

WHEREAS, residents of Radnor Township have the right to peacefully enjoy their residence and community without excessive or offensive construction noise.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Commissioners of Radnor Township, Delaware County, Pennsylvania, hereby ENACTS and ORDAINS the following ordinance revising Section 200-5 Construction work as follows:

Section 1: 200-5 Construction work.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation or their agents or employees owning or occupying any building, premises or other place in the Township of Radnor to operate or permit to be operated any type of machinery, appliance, equipment or hand tool which emits noise beyond the premise upon which the machinery, appliance, equipment or hand tool is being operated or used between the hours of 7:00 PM and 8:00 AM except for Sundays and Township, State or Federal holidays. On Sundays and holidays, construction noise shall only be permitted between 10 AM and 5PM.
- B. The Community Development Department shall be authorized to issue permits for emergency construction and repair upon submission of adequate proof of the necessity of such work.
- **Section 2.** Repealer. All ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.
- **Section 3**. Severability. If any section, paragraph, sub-section, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than that portion specifically declared invalid.
- **Section 4.** Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective in accordance with the Home Rule Charter of Radnor Township.

LEGISLATION: Resolution 2020-90 authorizing the Township to engage PFM as an Independent Disclosure and Pricing Agent relating to the Township's upcoming bond transactions.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) has developed a series of best practices on the issuance of debt. Specific to this topic, GFOA's recommendation is that regardless of whether a municipality is doing a negotiated or competitive bond sale, which they hire a financial advisor to provide expertise and ensure that the Township's best interests are being met during the transaction.

Radnor has engaged PFM in prior financing transactions with excellent success.

FISCAL IMPACT: The cost of the engagement is set at \$9,700 for the bond transaction and will be capitalized in the cost of issuance.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: The Administration recommends that Board of Commissioners adopt Resolution 2020-90 to engage PFM at the August 10, 2020 meeting.

RESOLUTION 2020-91

A RESOLUTION OF RADNOR TOWNSHIP, DELAWARE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, AUTHORIZING THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER TO ENGAGE COZEN O'CONNER AS BOND COUNSEL FOR THE TOWNSHIP'S PROPOSED BOND ISSUE FOR NEW MONEY FOR STORMWATER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners appointed Cozen O'Conner as Bond Counsel for Radnor Township with the adoption of Resolution 2010-42; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 2010-42 recognized that the Township will continue to have on-going responsibilities associated with the various debt obligations that are currently outstanding or will be issued in the future and will need to insure that it has proper legal representation to prepare, assist and review all documents relative to those obligations; and

WHEREAS, the Township is considering a new money bond issuance for financing stormwater capital improvements and needs to ensure that it has necessary legal representation to prepare and review all documents relative to the proceedings.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby **RESOLVED** by the Radnor Township Board of Commissioners authorize the Administration to utilize the services of Cozen O'Conner for the proposed bond issuance at \$10MM at a price ranging from \$25,750 to \$29,750, to be capitalized.

LEGISLATION: Authorizing the Township to proceed with <u>Cozen O'Conner</u> as Bond Counsel for the proposed Series 2020 General Obligation Stormwater Capital Improvement Bonds.

LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: The Board of Commissioners appointed Cozen O'Conner as Bond Counsel with the adoption of Resolution 2010-42, adopted Monday September 13, 2010. Included in that Resolution was the recognition that future debt issues will arise and will require specialized legal assistance (from Bond Counsel). The Resolution for Monday night recognizes that Cozen O'Conner is the Township's Bond Counsel.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: Municipal debt issuance is highly regulated both Federally and by State laws. As such, specialized legal counsel is recommended by both the ICMA and GFOA as best practice to ensure that the Township is properly advised and protected on all legal matters surrounding a debt transaction. Cozen O'Conner has served the Township since 2010 and has done an exemplary job. Suzanne Mayes has been professional, comprehensive and understanding in all matters surrounding these transactions; from dealing with the underwriter, to ensuring Federal Taxation Laws are considered and managed appropriately, to responding to the Board and Public to ensure questions are answered respectfully and thoughtfully.

FISCAL IMPACT: The cost of the legal services associated with a bond issuance of \$10MM will range from \$25,750 and \$29,750 of the total amount being transacted. Similar to other issuance costs, the bond counsel cost will be capitalized into the refunding and paid at closing.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: The Administration respectfully recommends that the Board of Commissioners adopt this legislation.

RESOLUTION No. 2020-92

A RESOLUTION OF RADNOR TOWNSHIP DELAWARE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, ENCOURAGING ALL CITIZENS TO WEAR FACE MASKS TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a virus that is very easily spread from person to person via respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or exhales air contaminated with COVID-19 within six feet from an uninfected person.

WHEREAS, COVID-19 cases in Delaware County and Pennsylvania have been steadily increasing from mid June. As of August 2nd, 2020 there have been 8,770 confirmed cases in Delaware County with 730 deaths. There have been more than 117,000 confirmed cases in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania with 7,720 deaths.

WHEREAS, there is no known cure or vaccine for COVID-19.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it **RESOLVED** that the Board of Commissioners of Radnor Township highly recommends that all people wear face masks in public and practice hygiene measures to stop the spread of the virus. Wearing face masks in public, washing hands, and avoiding highly populated areas greatly reduces the likelihood of transmitting or contracting COVID-19.
