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A Message from the Board of Commissioners

T he township is committed to protecting residents as much as possible from the effects of stormwater runoff. Our weather is changing—we now experience more frequent and severe rainstorms—and we must adjust public policy to cope with the problem.

Areas of North Wayne, South Wayne, and portions of Garrett Hill experience large-scale flooding during heavy rainstorms from Gulph and Ithan creeks. In a storm May 16 of this year seven automobiles were flooded out and became total losses; one vehicle was lifted off its yard and pushed across Poplar Avenue in North Wayne to another front lawn.



There was a time when homes built along our streams were safe from flooding even during intense and sustained downpours. The addition of impervious surfaces upstream-- driveways, roofs, patios, new streets, even shopping centers-- has changed that. It is now fairly common for homeowners in several of our neighborhoods to sustain considerable flooding in basements and yards during moderate and severe storms.

In June the Board of Commissioners authorized signing of a contract with AMEC Infrastructure, a national firm with headquarters in Plymouth Meeting, to prepare a plan for the study and possible implementation of a stormwater management fee for Radnor Township. AMEC will work from an engineering study performed for the township in July 2011 by Chagrin Valley Engineering to map areas of the township containing large sources of runoff and to recommend a plan to charge a fee for the privilege of discharging water.

The fee would be based upon the size of each property, the amount of non-porous surfaces on the property and the extent the property owner holds stormwater in place and causes it to infiltrate in situ rather than being discharged.

Revenue from the fee would be used to widen and deepen stream channels, build up stream embankments, construct holding ponds, and generally improve the way stormwater moves through the township.

Within several years we expect to realize a substantial improvement in how stormwater is managed in the township.

WEATHER ALERT TYPES

Moments after a severe thunderstorm, flash flood, or tornado warning has been issued by the National

Weather Service, messages will be sent to affected citizens.

CALLER ID

You will know the call is from CodeRED Weather Warning when you see 800-566-9780, 866-419-5000, for CodeRED Notification calls and 855-969-4636 for General calls (road closures, trash changes). If you would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back.

USES

The CodeRED Notification system will be used to send critical communications from evacuation notices to missing child alerts.

PRIVACY

Your contact information remains private and will only be used for community notifications.

OPT-IN TO RECEIVE ALERTS

You can register your home, cell or work phones, plus add optional texting and email alerts. Registered residents will have the ability to log into their account and change their notification choices at their convenience.



Radnor Township is in the "CAFR" again!

ot only is it fun to say, but the "CAFR" is also a large step forward for the Township's financial reporting. CAFR stands for

Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and it includes a complete look at the Township's financial position and operating results from 2011. The financial information was prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and includes an introductory section, Independent Auditors' Report, Management's Discussion and Analysis, Audited Financial Statements, Footnote disclosures, and a statistical section that provides supplemental comparative and other useful data. The CAFR is available on the Township's web site at www.radnor.com.

The 2011 CAFR makes the first time since 2007 that the Township completed a comprehensive financial report. The Township engaged CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP, an independent CPA firm, to conduct the 2011 audit which included a look at the Township's internal controls, financial transaction processes, asset management controls and completion of the financial statements. The CAFR and corresponding audit is the product of a project that started back in

December 2010 and was officially completed in July 2011 when the Board of Commissioners formally accepted the report. The Township

submitted the 2011 CAFR to the Government Finance Officers' Association for their consideration for the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. The results of the submission should be released in November 2011.

The Finance Department is extremely appreciative to the Citizens Audit Review & Financial Advisory Committee for their critical role in implementing several of the revamped internal controls and for their oversight of the project timeline. Without their volunteerism and expertise, this project would have had very different results. Also, each of the Township departments played important roles in compiling the information needed to complete their report and their cooperation was tremendous. Finally, the Finance

Department staff should be commended for their daily roles in making sure that the Stakeholders of Radnor Township can feel confident that the internal controls and financial reporting aspect of the Township are being done accurately and professionally.




In 2010, U.S. fire departments responded to 369,500 home structure fires. These fires caused 13,350 civilian injuries, 2,640 civilian deaths, and \$6.9 billion in direct damage.

"One home structure was reported every 85 seconds in 2010," says Michael Maguire, Fire Chief of the Radnor Fire Company. "Fire is unpredictable and moves faster than most people realize. Having a tried and true escape plan with two ways is essential to ensuring your family's safety should fire break out in your home."

Radnor Fire Company recommends the following tips for planning your family's escape:

· Make a map of your home. Mark a door and a window that can be


used to get out of every room.



- Write the emergency telephone number (9-1-1) for fire and medical emergencies on your escape plan.
- Have a grown-up sound the smoke alarm and practice your escape plan with everyone living in your home.
- Keep your escape plan on the refrigerator and remind grown-ups to have your family practice the plan twice a year or whenever anyone in your home celebrates a birthday.

Community Development

The Community Development Department serves the residents of Radnor Township through the administration and enforcement of regulatory ordinances adopted by the Board of Commissioners to assure the health, safety, and welfare of everyone involved in the Radnor experience. As part of this tasking, Community Development is responsible for the oversight of ten (10) volunteer boards/committees. These include the: Board of Health, Design Review Board, Historic & Architectural Review Board, Zoning Hearing Board, Code Appeals Board, Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee, Environmental Advisory Council, Garrett Hill Implementation Committee, Open Space Committee, and the Rental Housing Appeals Board.

While all of these boards serve important functions and are critical to the future development of the Township, there are several that the residents and businesses interact with on a more regular basis than others. This newsletter will focus on the duties of some of these boards and committees. Future newsletters will highlight the functions of the other boards and committees.

Board of Health

The Board of Health consists of nine (9) members serving four (4) year terms. The Board of Health advises the Board of Commissioners and the Department of Community Development on matters of public health to promote awareness by Township citizens (AIDS, food handling, rabies, and lyme disease have been topics of recent discussion). The Township's Health Officer acts as a liaison between the Board and the Township Administration and reports to them on his activities.

The Board of Health meets on the third Monday of each month at 5:00 p.m. No meetings are held in July and August. Meetings are held in the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Design Review Board (DRB)

The Design Review Board consists of five (5) members serving four (4) year terms. The Design Review Board reviews applications for signage, new buildings, and facade renovations for compliance with the Township's Sign Ordinance and related landscaping regulations. The Design Review Board meets on the second Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Projects requiring Design Review Board approval are:

- •New wall, ground, window or freestanding signs; or change of existing.
- •New or change of existing awnings.
- Commercial or institutional building facade renovations.
- •New commercial or institutional buildings.
- •Additions to commercial or institutional buildings.
- •Addition of telecommunication antennas.

Historic and Architectural Review Board (HARB)

The Historic and Architectural Review Board consists of five (5) members serving five (5) year terms. HARB was created to protect and enhance the North Wayne Historic District, Louella Court Historic District, and the South Wayne Historic District for the educational, cultural, economic, and general welfare of the public through preservation, protection, and regulation of buildings of historic

interest or importance within the District. Another function of HARB is to safeguard elements of architectural history throughout the District which have been determined to be of historic significance. Under provisions of the Historic District Ordinance, the HARB serves to review applications for the construction, addition or demolition of any principal building, or any additions or accessory buildings.

The Historic and Architectural Review Board meets on the first Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Zoning Hearing Board

The Zoning Hearing Board consists of five (5) members plus one (1) alternate serving five (5) year terms. The Zoning Hearing Board is a quasi-judicial body that conducts legally binding hearings and renders decisions on appeals, variances, and special exceptions to the Township's Zoning Ordinances. The primary purpose of the Zoning

Ordinance is to coordinate and guide development into areas that are deemed appropriate for development as well as to provide standards for that development. The Zoning Ordinance divides the Township into districts and establishes regulations that apply to the Township as a whole as well as to the individual districts. The Zoning Ordinance regulates and restricts uses on land within the Township; defines and designates classification of types of uses; regulates size and location of buildings and other structures; provides for the administration and enforcement of such regulations; and establishes penalties for violation thereof.

The Zoning Hearing Board meets on the third Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. No meeting is held in August. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.



Public Works Department

T he Public Works Department was busy this summer on many fronts. For starters, the Cowan Park Comfort Station project is almost complete. The new Comfort Station has a much smaller impervious foot print than the one it replaced and is ADA compliant. In the fall, the Environmental Advisory Committee, with some assistance from the Public Works Department, will install a rain garden on the area that was formerly occupied by a portion of the previous comfort station.




What is a rain garden? A rain garden is a shallow depression that is planted with native plants and grasses to receive storm water runoff. Rain gardens reduce run off, remove pollutants, and recharge ground water. They are also beautiful. Although most rain gardens are very



small, the combined effect of many rain gardens can help make a difference!


The solid waste crews have been picking up our residents' trash, recycling, and brush. Last month, they collected: 1,243,900 pounds of solid waste, 486,360 pounds of recycling, 120,000 pounds of brush, along with 180 open truck stops. In total, that is over 1,800,000 pounds!



Recycling the Natural Way!

Leaves that are collected in the fall from the Township's leaf collection program are taken to Skunk Hollow for composting. The leaf compost is then made available to residents at the following locations: Harford, Willows, Emlen Tunnell, Fenimore, Ithan Valley, Skunk Hollow, and Warren G. Filipone Parks. Wood mulch from the Township's tub grinder is available at Willows and Harford Parks.

Keep Car Washing from Harming Our Streams



Did you know?

- Soapy runoff from vehicle washing enters storm drains and flows untreated into local streams.
- Detergent levels as low as 0.1 ppm can harm wildlife and negatively impact drinking water and supplies.
- Even biodegradable detergents contain surfactants which can harm fish.
- Tap water from running hoses contains enough chlorine to kill fish in local streams.

Use a commercial car wash whenever possible. They typically use

half the water, and treat and reuse the water before discharging it to sanitary sewers.



- 1. Park the car so that water runs off onto a grassy area, not to the street. Use protective measures to redirect water onto grass and to block nearby storm drains.
- 2. Use a bucket of wash water with minimal detergent or plain water with sponges and towels, not a running hose, to wash and rinse the car.
- 3. Use a high-pressure, low-volume hose with a trigger nozzle to refill the bucket. Do not allow hose to run freely on the pavement.



Raise Mower Height for Healthier Lawns, Cleaner Water



T urf grass, like other plants, must manufacture sugars through photosynthesis in their leaves if they are to develop into a high quality lawn. Closely mowed lawns have limited leaf area to take in the sunlight to produce the food they need to be healthy.

In addition to leaf area, a direct relationship exists between the height of turf grass plants and the depth and total mass of their root system. Kentucky blue grass and tall fescue lawns mowed at the recommended summer height of 3 inches have roots more than twice as deep as those of closely cropped lawns. The shallow, weak roots of closely mowed lawns exhibit stress first and loss of grass plants to competing weeds is more likely, particularly during the summer. Raising mower heights during the summer will keep soil temperatures

cooler, preserve soil moisture and help maintain turf grass quality.

Thicker lawns are more weed resistant, absorb more storm water, lose less sediment during storms, and



need less fertilizer. So this June, remember to raise your mower height to three inches, or remind your lawn service company, for a healthier lawn and cleaner streams this summer.



Chanticleer is an International Attraction

Although a favorite of Radnor residents, Chanticleer is becoming known internationally. While most of the 40,000 annual guests are from the mid-Atlantic region, horticulturally minded tourists from throughout the U.S. as well as from Australia, Asia, and Europe are finding their way to the garden.

London's Financial Times featured Chanticleer in a half page article this spring. Author Robin Lane Fox seemed to claim the former estate for Britain, calling it "the ideal mix of British and American gardening." He went on to mention "high standards of gardening and maintenance" and gave great praise to the book Chanticleer: A Pleasure Garden written by Adrian Higgins and photography by Rob Cardillo (University of Pennsylvania Press).

Visitors flying in from near and far during June saw a full page article on Chanticleer in the US Airways Magazine. It called the Radnor attraction a "secret garden" that "feels a world apart." It went on to describe it as a "joyful place for an escape, a romantic spot for a date, and the perfect place to paint en plein air, or to sit, read, and while away an afternoon."

The Chanticleer US Airways Magazine article was part of the June 2012 issue of highlighting the Philadelphia region. A significant number of pages were devoted to Philadelphia area gardens. Known as

"America's Garden Capital," the region has "more public gardens than anywhere else on the continent."

Surrey Services - Artful Aging

Transportation – A Challenge for Seniors

One of the most challenging issues for seniors in our community is transportation. The simple act of getting from home to the grocery store or doctor's office presents a seemingly insurmountable challenge. Some older adults are able to rely on family members to get them where they need to go, but often families are scattered or unable to help because of their own schedules. Many seniors are not willing to ask friends and neighbors for assistance because they don't want to be a burden. Whatever the reason, transportation is a major issue for older adults in our community. Without an affordable, convenient solution, many seniors find themselves isolated and lacking the essentials they need to live at home safely.

Surrey Services for Seniors provides several solutions to the problem. Last year, Surrey's Shared Ride program had five vehicles that provided 18,894 rides to 366 people throughout the community. The Shared Ride program is similar to carpooling with other seniors in your area. Utilizing one full time and nine part time drivers, Surrey vans pick people up at home and drop them off at a variety of places. Some use the Shared Rides to get to medical appointments, physical therapy and medical tests. Others use the transportation to go to the hair

salon, grocery store, or to Surrey to volunteer, have lunch or participate in an activity.

Surrey also has volunteer driver escorts who serve a different group of members. These volunteers drive the Surrey members that need more individual attention. This group benefits from someone providing additional assistance or accompanying them to a medical appointment. Last year, Surrey volunteer driver escorts provided 2,913 rides supporting 286 members.

As a final option, Surrey Caregivers can provide transportation to individuals based on an hourly rate. This option is most popular among seniors that could use assistance at home as well as with transportation. Often caregivers will provide personal assistance to these individuals or help with housekeeping and meal preparation.

Surrey's mission is to help seniors remain in their homes with independence and dignity and continue as active members of the community. Providing safe, reliable and affordable transportation is a key element in helping Surrey achieve their mission. Delaware County Now Offers Easy Online Purchase for State-Mandated Dog Licenses

Delaware County dog owners can now purchase their required dog license via computer. Delaware County Council announced that the County Treasurer offers the added option to apply and pay for state-mandated dog

licenses through the county's website. The online payment option is part of Council's ongoing efforts to make transactions convenient for dog owners, while enhancing canine safety by ensuring they have identification

Dog owners now have four options for obtaining a current dog license: In person at the Delaware County Treasurer's Office, or visiting one of the 20 outside vendor locations; doing an online application and mailing a check or money order; printing the online application and mailing it in with a check or money order; or applying and paying online by credit card or PayPal with a small convenience fee.

When purchased online, individuals can print their license information instantly and the actual license will be mailed within seven business days. Lifetime dog licenses cannot be purchased online. They require verification from the veterinarian that a dog has a microchip or tattoo. Individuals are asked to apply in person.

"I am a new dog owner and I know the importance of having a current dog license and identification on your family's precious pet," said County Councilwoman Colleen Morrone. "We are pleased that the Treasurer's Office now offers this online option for dog owners so they can easily obtain a license without leaving home." Councilwoman Morrone added that the online completion of dog license applications also enables the County Treasurer's Office staff to collect owner emails and send owners annual reminders in December to get the next year's license.

Under Pennsylvania law, all dogs three months and older must be licensed. The fees range from \$6.45 for a neutered pup to \$31.45 for a lifetime license for a neutered dog that has been micro-chipped or tattooed, and \$51.45 for a lifetime license all others. If the animal is found with no license, the fine can run as high as \$300.

A current dog license is the best way to ensure a dog's safe return if they get lost, plus automatically lists the dog in Delaware County's "Return a Lost Dog" database.

If a lost dog has a current license, anyone who finds the dog can get the owner's phone number through the County's Return a Lost Dog feature

on the county website at www.co.delaware.pa.us. By entering the license number, the user can access the owner's contact information and quickly and safely return the dog.

In Pennsylvania, dog licenses are sold at the county level. In Delaware County, people can get dog licenses at the County Treasurer's Office in the Government Center, plus 20 additional sites throughout the county including the Department of Parks and Recreation Office in Rose Tree Park.

Each year, animal control officers report that many stray canines are turned in to shelters because they lack the proper identification to be reunited with their owners.

Fees collected through licensing are used by the state Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement to protect the safety, health and welfare of dogs.

Humane societies report the Fourth of July holiday is the busiest time for lost dogs. Vacations, open windows, outdoor activities and loud fireworks result in pets running away from home, so now is a critical time to get each dog a license.



Radnor Memorial Park



Radnor Memorial Park was donated to the Township by the Sun Corporation in the early 2000's. The site was used by the company as a helicopter landing pad. The land was converted into a multipurpose playing field that opened in 2002. Ever since, the park has been a key site for a number of recreational activities.

The park is located at the corner of Matsonford Road and King of Prussia Road, across from Radnor Elementary School. This park features a large, multi-purpose athletic field, fitness walking path, comfort station, and benches. The walking path extends across an elevated footbridge that spans Matsonford Road to Radnor Elementary School and continues to Radnor Nature Park.



In the spring of 2012, a turf playing surface was installed at the site. The Recreation Department is very excited about the addition of the turf and extended use of the field. The field is lined for different sports including soccer, lacrosse, and field hockey and is an improvement from the previous condition of the field.

Established groups and sports teams are eligible for consideration for use of the field by submitting a usage request form to the Recreation Department. When not in use by permitted groups, the field is open to the public for use from dawn to dusk. 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


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
