





A Message from the Board of Commissioners

As summer sets upon us and the hectic pace of life in Radnor begins to ease a bit for many of us, we'd like to take a moment to highlight some of the tremendous work being done by your friends and neighbors for the betterment of our Township.

One of the most unique and exceptional attributes of Radnor is the level of resident involvement and support we experience. We have over twenty boards and commissions and scores of other volunteer organizations, all of which contribute to the high quality of life we enjoy. Especially when times are tight, we are incredibly fortunate to have such an educated resident base so willing to donate their valuable time and significant expertise.



One example of this important supportive work is the CARFAC, the new Citizens Audit Review and Financial Advisory Committee. Nine members of the community with exemplary business acumen meet regularly to help advise and guide the Board of Commissioners in our efforts to strengthen our financial position. Their work, in collaboration with our excellent Finance Department, has already begun to pay off, and we have now had two years of significant budget surpluses, almost a million dollars in savings on a bond refinance (along with a positive Aa1 rating from Moody's), and commenced down the path of tackling our previously ignored long term liabilities.

Another example of remarkable citizen support comes from our dedicated Planning Commission. Contrary to the myth that Radnor is "fully built out", we are seeing a robust amount of development and redevelopment. Recent projects include the conversion and rehabilitation of Louella Mansion, the development of ten new homes on County Line, the redevelopment of the Taco Bell/Blockbuster site, and several large redevelopment projects on our university campuses. The Planning Commission plays a prominent role in assessing these development submissions and working hard to make them the best projects they can be for all the residents of Radnor.

Moving forward, we are sure to be similarly reliant upon input from our residents as we take on the very serious issue of storm water management in our community. On this issue, we will seek guidance from many of our boards, our local non-profits, and perhaps even consider forming a new board or commission, all with the aim of finding innovative and efficient ways to address and fund our flooding and water quality issues.

As Commissioners we are tremendously grateful for the support of our residents who give so generously of their time and skills. We are equally fortunate to have a superior and professional staff and management team to keep our Township moving forward and providing the excellent services we enjoy while containing expenses and improving our fiscal position.

We encourage you all to join your neighbors and get involved, we are a better Township for it and will continue to be for decades to come.

Dear Radnor Community,

As the newly elected President and Fire Chief of the Radnor Fire Company, we would like to take a moment to bring you up to speed on our recent activity and plans for the future.

In 2012, our firefighters have responded over 200 times to varying incidents, including, but not limited to: house fires, car crashes, brush fires, fire alarms, and other emergencies. Our combined paid crew and volunteer crew of 60 dedicated individuals takes great pride in serving the community and train routinely to ensure a high state of readiness for whatever emergency we encounter.

Our Advanced Life Support (ALS) program that went operational on August 1, 2011 is off to a strong start. Our volunteers and paid EMS personnel have already responded to over 750 medical incidents, with the majority of those responses occurring in Radnor Township. During our peak hours of call volume between 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. during the work week, we have a minimum of two Paramedics on duty ready to respond to any type of medical emergency.

We have many projects on the horizon, including replacing one of our pumpers that is now 16 years old. It will cost an estimated \$350,000 - \$500,000 to replace this unit after a competitive bid process is completed by our Specifications Committee. The continued support of municipal tax dollars, grants, and the generosity of residents will enable us to complete this project.

The Radnor Fire Company welcomes the community to visit during one of our events hosted by the Auxiliary or stop by anytime. We are committed to providing quality and timely emergency services to you and your family. We understand the great responsibility to lead the Radnor Fire Company and we are honored to serve you.

The Radnor Township Board of Commissioners has a contract with Emergency Communications Network, providers of the CodeRED high-speed notification solution and the CodeRED Weather Warning Service. The CodeRED system provides Radnor Township officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire Township. This is a FREE service to Township residents!

Individuals and businesses are urged to long onto the Radnor Township website, **www.radnor.com**, and follow the link to Emergency Notification Enrollment page. Those without internet access may call or stop by the Radnor Township Building (610-688-5600), Monday to Friday, (8AM – 4PM) to supply their information. Required information includes first and last name, street address (physical address, no P.O. boxes), city, state, zip code, and primary phone number, additional phone numbers can be entered as well.

WEATHER ALERT TYPES

Moments after a severe thunderstorm, flash flood, or tornado warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, messages will be sent to affected citizens.



CALLER ID

You will know the call is from CodeRED Weather Warning when you see 800-566-9780, 866-419-5000, for CodeRED Notification calls and 855-969-4636 for General calls (road closures, trash changes). If you would like to hear the last message deliver to your phone, simply dial the number back.

USES

The CodeRED Notification system will be used to send critical communications from evacuation notices to missing child alerts.

PRIVACY

Your contact information remains private and will only be used for community notifications.

OPT-IN TO RECEIVE ALERTS

You can register your home, cell or work phones, plus add optional texting and email alerts. Registered residents hill have the ability to log into their account and change their notification choices at their convenience.



Township Saves Money through Refinancing


In April, the Board of Commissioners approved a bond refunding that will save the Township approximately \$60,380 per year over the next 26 years for a total cash savings of \$1,569,887. In today's dollars, the savings from refunding the bonds is \$991,325! The savings are net of the cost of issuance which totaled \$150,341. The annual savings will be realized annually by paying less in total debt service.


The Bonds were originally issued in 2007 for 30 years with a principal amount of \$15,910,000 and carried interest rates that ranged between 2.500% - 5.000%. The Bonds were used for various capital improvements that were constructed during that time period, including the Township Municipal Building. The refunding process is similar to refinancing a home mortgage: (1) The term remains the same, so these new bonds will be paid off in the same time frame as the 2007 bonds, (2) only the outstanding principal amount is refinanced, so the Township is not incurring any additional debt,




and (3) the new bonds will carry lower interest rates that range between 1.000% - 4.000%, which is where the savings come from.

After the refunding, the Township carries four bond issues that are categorized by the year in which they were issued (or refunded). The categories are Series 2004, Series 2009, Series 2010 and now Series 2012. The following chart represents the Township's new total annual debt service for all four issues through the end of their maturity.

Advance Fee Schemes

An advance fee scheme occurs when the victim pays money to someone in anticipation of receiving something of greater value—such as a loan, contract, investment, or gift—and then receives little or nothing in return.

The variety of advance fee schemes is limited only by the imagination of the con artists who offer them. They may involve the sale of products or services, the offering of investments, lottery winnings, "found money," or many other "opportunities." Clever con artists will offer to find financing arrangements for their clients who pay a "finder's fee" in advance. They require their clients to sign contracts in which they agree to pay the fee when they are introduced to the financing source. Victims often learn that they are ineligible for financing only after they have paid the "finder" according to the contract. Such agreements may be legal unless it can be shown that the "finder" never had the intention or the ability to provide financing for the victims.

Tips for Avoiding Advanced Fee Schemes:

• If the offer of an "opportunity" appears too good to be true, it probably is. Follow common business practice. For example, legitimate business is rarely conducted in cash on a street corner.

- Know who you are dealing with. If you have not heard of a person or company that you intend to do business with, learn more about them. Depending on the amount of money that you plan on spending, you may want to visit the business location, check with the Better Business Bureau, or consult with your bank, an attorney, or the police.
- Make sure you fully understand any business agreement that you enter into. If the terms are complex, have them reviewed by a competent attorney.
- Be wary of businesses that operate out of post office boxes or mail drops and do not have a street address. Also be suspicious when dealing with persons who do not have a direct telephone line and who are never in when you call, but always return your call later.
- Be wary of business deals that require you to sign nondisclosure or non-circumvention agreements that are designed to prevent you from independently verifying the bona fides of the people with whom you intend to do business. Con artists often use non-circumvention agreements to threaten their victims with civil suit if they report their losses to law enforcement.

Radnor Police Department's Vacant House Watch Program

With the summer months now upon us and vacation season in full swing, The Radnor Township Police Department wishes to remind all residents of the police department's Vacant House Watch program.

All residents are reminded that when leaving their residence for a vacation, weekend get-a-away or business trip to register their homes under the Radnor Police Department's Vacant House Program. The vacant house program provides security checks by Radnor Police Officers while you are away. How does the program work?

When leaving your residence you may log onto the township's website at **www.radnor.com** and click on the "Action Center" icon, scroll down to the "Vacant House Watch Report" and open this link. This link will take you into the registration fields prompting you to

enter pertinent information to register your vacant home. After your residence is registered, Radnor Police Officers will check your residence as a crime prevention technique at different times of the day. If officers discover any problems with your property they will call the local emergency contact that you provided and notify that person of the problem.

This program acts as a deterrent against property crimes while you are away from your home. If you do not have internet access you may register your property by calling 610-688-0503 where police department personnel will take your information over the phone and register your home.

Remember, you may be taking a vacation but crime never takes a vacation so register your home today under the vacant house watch program.

Traffic Safety Update - Act 81 of 2011 FACT SHEET

Changes Affecting Graduated Driver Licensing and Passenger Restraint Laws

The Radnor Township Highway Patrol and Traffic Safety has conducted several seatbelt awareness checks at various local high schools in Radnor. We have included information on the new SEATBELT AND TEEN DRIVING LAWS to all teen drivers and their parents. (Vehicle Code Act 81 and 4581)Any questions call Sgt Chris Flanagan 610-688-5606X108. In an effort to enhance safety on Pennsylvania roads, Governor Corbett and the Legislature have agreed on changes to the Vehicle Code involving graduated driver licensing requirements, passenger restrictions for junior drivers and passenger restraint laws. The new rules in Act 81 of 2011 took effect on Dec. 27, 2011. The changes to the law were initiated to help junior drivers receive more comprehensive training, ease young driver distractions through limiting the number of passengers they may carry and improve general highway safety through improvements to passenger restraint laws.

Changes to Junior Driver Training

Act 81 increases supervised, behind-the-wheel skill building for learner's permit holders under 18 years of age from 50 hours to 65 hours. Ten of the added hours will consist of nighttime driving, while the other five additional hours must be driven in poor weather conditions.

Learner's permit holders who have taken their on the road driving skills test before the law's effective date of Dec. 27, 2011 only need to complete the present requirement of 50 hours of supervised training. However, learner's permit holders who have not passed the on the road driving skills test before Dec. 27, 2011 will have to meet the new requirement of 65 total hours of supervised skill building training – including the ten nighttime hours and five poor weather hours of driving - before they are authorized to take the driving skills portion of their driver's test to receive their junior license.

Changes to Junior Driver Passenger Restrictions

Act 81 places increased restrictions on the number and age of passengers which a junior driver license holder may transport. Current

law limits drivers under the age of 18 to transporting no more passengers than the number of seat belts in the vehicle.

As of Dec. 27, 2011, for the first six months after receiving their junior driver's license, a driver is not permitted to have more than one passenger under age 18 who is not an immediate family member (brother, sister, stepbrother, stepsister of the junior driver and adopted or foster children living in the same household as the junior driver) in their vehicle unless they are accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. If they have not been convicted of a driving violation or been partially or fully responsible for a reportable crash after six months, they may have up to three passengers under age 18 who are not immediate

family members without a parent or legal guardian present. If they have any convictions or are partially or fully responsible for a reportable crash while a junior driver, they are once again restricted to one passenger.

Changes to Seat Belt Requirements

Drivers and occupants in a vehicle who are under the age of 18 must wear a properly adjusted and fastened seat belt, and children under the age of eight must be securely fastened in a child restraint system. Failure to comply with the new law's seat belt provisions is a primary offense, meaning that a driver can be pulled over and cited solely for that violation.

Pennsylvania's Seat Belts and Child Seats Law after ACT 81 Title 75 Section 4581 - Restraint Systems (effective 12/24/2011) From PAMVC Title 75 4581 & Title 67 section 102

Note: Section 1503c2.1 further restricts the number of occupants a new driver under 18 years old may have in a vehicle. (Medical Exceptions for Child Passenger Restraints must be on PennDOT form SG 5/9 03)

ALL APPLY TO: Passenger Cars, Class 1 & 2 Trucks, Motor Home, Classic, & Antiques

- 4581(a) (1) Every occupant under 4 years old must be in a safety seat used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. This is a primary Vehicle Code violation with a fine of \$75 and Court Costs.
- 4581(a) (1.1) Every occupant 4 years old to under 8 years old must be in a booster seat used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. (Exceptions from Title 67 section 102 for the use of a booster seat for Lap belt ONLY positions, more than 80lbs,or taller than 57 inches. CHILD MUST STILL utilize a seat belt system.) This is a primary Vehicle Code violation with a fine of \$75 and Court Costs.
- 4581(a) (2) (i) Every occupant 8 years old to under 18 years old must

- be in a seat belt. This is a primary Vehicle Code violation with a fine of \$10 and no Court Costs but \$30 MCARE, \$10 EMS and \$10 JCP.
- 4581(a) (2) (ii) Every driver and front seat passenger 18 years old and older must be in a seat belt. This is a secondary Vehicle Code violation with a fine of \$10 and no Court Costs but \$30 MCARE, \$10 EMS and \$10 JCP. (Exceptions in 1581a3iii)
- 4581(a) (3) A Junior Operator may have no more passengers than there are seat belts. This is a primary Vehicle Code violation with a fine of \$10 and no Court Costs but \$30 MCARE, \$10 EMS and \$10 JCP.

Beginning in mid-May, the Township will be mailing their Rental License renewal applications issued by the Department of Community Development to the owner of a rental unit under the requirements of Chapter 226 - Rental Housing. In order to keep Radnor Township an attractive place to live, work, and play, the Township has adopted minimum requirements for Property Maintenance including mowing or trimming grass and other vegetation on private property.

Are Use and Occupancy Permits required for re-sales?

Yes. Use and Occupancy Permits are required for all re-sales. Permits are also issued for new homes, apartments, home-based businesses, for change of all non-residential/commercial tenants, and new commercial structures. No property shall be occupied or used by a new owner as a result of transfer by title, deed, or other legal means until a Certificate of Use and Occupancy has been issued by the Community Development Department. Any code violations will need to be addressed.

How tall can your grass or weeds be before it is a violation?



A violation exists when the weeds or grass are more than 12 inches in height (or more than 12 inches in length if matted down). A violation also exists if there is any vegetation that is poisonous to the touch, such as poison ivy, poison oak, or poison sumac. Other vegetation such as vines, saplings or shrubs may also be a violation if it exceeds the 12-inch height regulation and is clearly uncultivated. Please note that a clearing permit may be required depending on the size and type of

vegetation being removed. Please contact the Township for assistance.

Who is responsible for correcting the violation?

The violation should be corrected by the person responsible for the maintenance of the property. In most cases, this is the property owner, but it may be the tenant or owner representative.

What area must be mowed?

In addition to the yard or lawn area, you must mow any area between your property and the paved area of all adjacent streets, including ditches, easements, alleys and unpaved right-of-way. Storm drainage swales, ditches or easements are also the maintenance responsibility of adjacent property owners.

What are some of the other Property Maintenance Issues that I need to be aware of?

The Township has adopted the International Property Maintenance Code, which requires all exterior property and premises to be maintained in a clean, safe, and sanitary condition. In addition, the Code requires all structures to be maintained in good repair, structurally sound, and sanitary so as to not pose a threat to the public health, safety, or welfare.

All garbage, trash, and refuse should be kept in appropriate containers with tight-fitting lids to avoid attracting rodents and other vector. The use of bird feeders should be monitored as excess bird food deposited on the ground could attract rodents. In addition, areas of stagnate water such as bird baths, unused tires, flower pots, buckets, low-lying areas in a yard, or ponds without a circulation system can be breeding grounds for mosquitoes including those that can carry the West Nile Virus.

If I hire someone to perform my property maintenance, do they need to be licensed?

In some cases, your contractor will need to be licensed with the Township. Check with the Community Development Department to determine specific licensing requirements. The public is encouraged to consider the following guidelines when contemplating hiring anyone for a home improvement project:

- Verify that the contractor is registered with the State and/or Township. You can call the Community Development Department at 610-688-5600 to verify if the individual is licensed.
- Be cautious of "One-Time Offers". You should not have to make a decision on the spot to receive the deal or special that is being offered; even if the contractor says, "We will only be in the area for today!"
- Get at least three estimates from at least three different contractors. Check and verify all references supplied by the contractor. Verify the contractor has a valid Certificate of Insurance. Shop around!
- Know the difference between proposals (estimated costs) and contracts (specified costs). Enter into a contract no matter how small of a project.
- Be sure the contract describes the service(s) to be performed, lists the materials to be used, and includes a starting and expected completion date.
- Ask for a written warranty or guarantee with your contract.
- Be cautious of companies that require advanced payments.
- Contact the Better Business Bureau to file a complaint for the non-delivery of services or check with them ahead of time to see if there were prior complaints.

Radnor Recycles – Single Stream

That is single stream recycling? Single stream recycling is placing all acceptable recycling items into one container, no separation required!

In 2011 the residents of Radnor Township recycled 6731.14 tons of material. This effort saved the Township approximately \$157,845 in tipping fees for solid waste. The more Radnor residents recycle the more we save!

The following lists show what is acceptable for single stream recycling and what is not acceptable:

Acceptable Items

Newspaper, inserts, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, paperback books, phone books, cardboard, clean pizza boxes, office and school paper, color paper, boxboard (cereal, cake, and cracker boxes), paper egg cartons, paper bags (grocery type), aluminum cans, clean foil, tin and steel aerosol cans (empty), plastic food containers #1 through #7.

Radnor Township picks up yard waste for recycling on Wednesdays

Yard waste is not collected on Wednesdays that fall during a holiday

The following are the regulations for yard waste collection:

- All yard waste should be placed in bio-degradable paper bags or a 35 gallon refuse container for collection
- All bags are to be placed at the curb for collection
- Tree trimmings and brush should be tied in bundles and no longer than three (3) feet in length and 2 inches in diameter.
- Leaves will be collected in paper bags when placed at the curb. Bagged leaves will not be collected during the township wide leaf collection season in November and December.

Non Acceptable Items

Garbage, plastic bags, food waste, food tainted items (used paper plates, paper towels, paper napkins), Styrofoam, motor oil bottles or hazardous chemical containers, plastic toys or sporting goods, electronics, batteries, CDs, DVDs, foam egg cartons, ice cream cartons, light bulbs, hangers, yard waste or garden tools.

- Christmas trees are collected after the Christmas holiday, weather permitting, and after leaf collection is completed -Christmas trees must be placed at the curb for collection
- Brush will not be collected that is sticking out of a container, this is for employee safety
 - The Township will take up to ten (10) bags/bundles per
 - Plastic bags or trash mixed with lawn debris are <u>not</u> permitted
- · Bags of rocks and dirt are not permitted
- Grass clippings will not be collected. It is recommended that the grass clippings be left on your lawn to decay or be composted on your property.
- Firewood will not be collected.
- Burning of yard waste is not permitted.

Chanticleer Gardens

Chanticleer Continues to Improve its Environmental Impact

hanticleer, on Church Road in Wayne, is known for its beautiful garden. What might not be apparent to the casual visitor are the efforts the organization is making towards sustainability.

The 48-acre site preserves a significant amount of open space in the Township, including a ten-acre hayfield. Much of the garden's waste is reused, recycled, or composted. Solar panels produce 15-20% of its total electrical usage. Cisterns capture 30,000 gallons of rain water for irrigation and ground water recharge. Integrated pest management keeps pesticide usage low. Since healthy soil makes for healthy plants, most fertilization is done in the form of compost. All lawns have been fertilized organically for over a decade.

Meadows and native sedges are replacing some of the lawn areas and invasive exotics are being eliminated. Hundreds of trees have been planted since 1990 in the garden and along local streets.

Staff-made furniture is now being made with wood cut on the property or with reused wood. A small creek long entombed in a pipe was recently uncovered and returned to a more natural condition. A permeable path in the new native woodland is made of shredded tires.

As for keeping it local, Chanticleer uses local vendors whenever possible. These include the local hardware store, food and beverage sellers, hotels, restaurants, local tree care companies, and even nearby nurseries. Many of the staff live in Radnor Township and the ones who don't, wish they did!

The garden is open Wednesdays through Sundays, from March 31 until November 4, 2012. The hours are 10am to 5pm, except on Fridays, May through Labor Day, when the garden remains open until 8pm. Radnor Library Cardholders receive half price admission.


Dream Big – READ: Summer Reading Program at the Radnor Memorial Library

Parks & Recreation Board

The Parks & Recreation Board advises the Board of Commissioners and the Department of Recreation & Community Programming on matters of recreational policy and the development and maintenance of parks and open space in the Township. The Board consists of seven members serving five year terms, plus two representatives of the Radnor Township School District Board of Directors. 


