

Welcome to autumn -- a time of football and colors in our beautiful trees. And of course autumn tree colors means falling leaves and the Township leaf pickup service. By the time you read this our pickups will be well underway. As in the past, there may be a second or even a third round of pick up. Be sure to check the Township Webpage, www.Radnor.com, for the schedule for your streets. I wonder how many folks in our community appreciate this service. How much would you have to pay to dispose of these leaves if they were not picked up by the Township? Friends, living in neighboring communities lacking this service, tell me that the cost can average several hundred dollars. In addition, we have the added value of



composted leaf mulch that residents can get for free from the Township each year.

Autumn is also "Budget Season" and this year our staff and the Commissioners have been working overtime to produce a budget that addresses the services that you have come to expect at the lowest possible cost, and to also begin to address some long term issues concerning unfunded long-term liabilities and capital expenditures. As you may have heard Commissioner Fisher's comment, this year has been a year of knowledge. The Board is being presented with perhaps the most comprehensively supported budget in our history. A special thanks to our CARFAC (Citizens Audit and Finance Advisory Committee) and our Finance Department for the incredible amount of work they have done to support this budget.

This year Radnor Township will join the legion of surrounding communities that have chosen to actively attempt to control our deer population. The Township has contracted with the Department of Agriculture to have professional marksmen begin to cull the herd. This is the beginning of an ongoing process which also includes private bow hunting on larger private properties in hopes of ultimately reducing the number of automobile collisions with deer and other property damage issues.

Radnor is a great place to live and autumn is a wonderful time to enjoy our community. Take a moment to stop and appreciate the wonderful place where we are lucky to live.

The Radnor Township Board of Commissioners has contracted with Emergency Communications Network, providers of the CodeRED high-speed notification solution and the CodeRED Weather Warning Service. The CodeRED system provides Radnor Township officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire Township. This is a FREE service to Township

Those without internet access may call (610-688-5600) or stop by the Radnor Township Building, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne Monday to Friday, (8AM - 4PM) to supply their information. Required information includes first and last name, street address (physical address, no P.O. boxes), city, state, zip code, and primary phone number. Additional phone numbers can be entered as well.

WEATHER ALERT TYPES

Moments after a severe thunderstorm, flash flood, or tornado warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, messages will be sent to affected

You will know the call is from CodeRED Weather Warning when you see 800-566-9780, 866-419-5000, for CodeRED Notification calls and 855-969-4636 for General calls (road closures, trash changes). If you would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back.

The CodeRED Notification system will be used to send critical communications from evacuation notices to missing child alerts.

Your contact information remains private and will only be used for community notifications.

OPT-IN TO RECEIVE ALERTS

You can register your home, cell or work phones, plus add optional texting and email alerts. Registered residents will have the ability to log into their account and change their notification choices at their convenience.

Radnor Township Snow Removal Requirements

Radnor Police Department wishes to inform all residents and snow plowing contractors of township requirements. Radnor Township Ordinance #250, entitled Snow and Ice Removal, has two main requirements.

The first requirement is that all owners, tenants and occupants of buildings or land abutting on a paved sidewalk on a public highway is required to keep the sidewalk clear of snow and ice in front of their respective premises. The sidewalks must be cleared of ice and snow 24 hours after the snowfall ceases. Property owners are also required to keep the sidewalk treated with material to abate ice and snow.

The second requirement of the ordinance addresses the disposition of the snow removal. Many times residents and/or snow removal contactors will shovel or plow snow into the street from private

As we head into the winter months the inevitable snowfall may be properties. This practice is prohibited by ordinance and the person depositing the snow in the street may be subject to a fine for


Property owners that are in violation of the snow removal ordinance may be cited for the violation which results in a fine of \$50.00 and additional related court costs.

The intent of this ordinance is to promote the rapid removal of snow from sidewalks and streets. The paramount goal is to provide safety and mobility of pedestrians and vehicles throughout the township during inclement winter weather. Additional information

Recreation Winter Safety Tips





The following tips for staying safe during winter recreational activities are being offered:

- * Avoid areas with fixed objects such as trees, posts, and fences
- * Always stay in control and be able to stop or avoid other people or
- * People ahead of you have the right of way. It is your responsibility to avoid them
- * Do not stop where you obstruct a trail or are not visible from above
- * Whenever starting downhill or merging onto a trail or slope, look uphill and yield to others
- * Observe all posted signs and warnings. Keep out of closed areas. Construction or building of ramps or jumps is not permitted

- * Park in designated areas only
- * No motorized snow vehicles are permitted in the parks
- Do not use trails or slopes that end in a street, drop-off, parking lot, river or pond
- * Observe park hours dawn to dusk. NO night winter recreation activities are permitted
- * Parents are encouraged to supervise thei children

For your safety, please obey Township regulations concerning park hours, parking in designated areas, and restricted "No sledding" areas. All winter recreational activities in Radnor Township Parks are "At Your Own Risk."



Know What We Pay For and Where the Township Gets the Money From


Radnor Township is very proud of the services that it provides to the residents and businesses of this great community. Quite honestly, at the township level of government, taxpayers here get the most immediate return on their payment... We enjoy the police and fire protection, we utilize the roads and sewers, we enjoy the parks and recreational amenities, we put our trash, recycling and yard waste out every week, we take advantage of leaf collection service, we appreciate the cleared roads during snow storms and heavy summer storms, we enjoy the community recreation events; the list goes on. So how much does all of that cost when we get the tax bill?

First, let's look at the Township's revenue sources. Radnor benefits from having a diverse revenue base that is made up from real estate taxes, business taxes ("Act 511"), permits, fines, intergovernmental revenue and departmental charges / fees for service. As you can see on Chart 1, each of the major revenue categories carries about one-third of the total load. This is beneficial to help keep real estate taxes lower and still be able to provide as many municipal services as Radnor can. As you can see, the businesses in Radnor pay another third of the total revenues: Keep that in mind when you are deciding where to shop, eat or do business because a healthy business base helps contribute towards lower property taxes.



Secondly, a look at the Chart 2 shows how much the average Radnor Township real estate tax bill is divided to the different expense categories. It's important to note that in addition to the services the Township provides, Radnor Township spends over \$1.4 million per year supporting the Radnor Library, Wayne Senior Center, Wayne Art Center, Surrey Services as well as the Radnor Fire Company, Bryn Mawr Fire Company and Broomall Fire Company. It's also important to note that Radnor Township is a separate (and far less expensive) entity than the School District or the County. In total, the township's portion of the real estate tax bill in Radnor is only 12%, with the Schools taking 71% and the County 17%. Here is a description of the expense categories: General Government is basically the overhead of our operations which includes administrative costs, finance, HR and IT. Protection to Persons & Property covers your police department. community development department and the Township's contributions to the three fire companies listed earlier. Next, the public works category covers all of the municipal services from garbage/recycling collection, to leaf collection, to snow removal, to infrastructure maintenance, to signal maintenance. Parks & Recreation covers the cost to maintain the vast park and trail system in the Township as well as the cost for the community programming offered to the residents throughout the year. Retiree Benefit Expenses covers the expenses made today for obligations owed to past Township police officers and civilian employees. The library and community organization category covers the entities listed above. It's important the note that each of those entities is a standalone not-for-profit entity that the Township simply provides funding / rent-free building space to. Debt Service is basically the long-term "mortgages" that the Township has borrowed to construct facilities, purchase park and open space, install park improvements, make infrastructure improvements, etc. over the years. Finally, the transfers to other funds section captures the tax subsidies needed to cover other areas of the Township's budget such as the Willows fund and capital fund.

This type of information is available by going to the Township's web site / Finance Department / Financial Reporting & Budgeting page where you will find current and past budgets, audited financial statements and monthly finance update reports. Community Development

■ Radnor Township through the administration and enforcement of regulatory ordinances adopted by the Board of Commissioners to assure the health. safety, and welfare of everyone involved in the Radnor experience. As part of this tasking, Community Development is responsible for the oversight of ten (10) volunteer boards/committees. These include the: Board of Health, Design Review Board, Historic & Architectural Review Board, Zoning Hearing Board, Code Appeals Board, Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee. Environmental Advisory Council, Garrett Hill Implementation Committee, Open Space Committee, and the Rental Housing Appeals Board.

While all of these boards serve important functions and are critical to the future development of the Township, there are several that the residents and businesses interact with on a more regular basis than others. The previous newsletter highlighted the Board of Health, DRB, HARB, and the Zoning Hearing Board. This newsletter will focus on the duties of some of the other boards and committees. Future newsletters will highlight the functions of the remaining boards and committees.

Code Appeals Board

The Code Appeals Board consists of five (5) members serving five (5) year terms. The Code Appeals Board reviews all building and construction codes and recommends modifications to Township ordinances as necessary; the Board hears appeals regarding the Township staff's interpretation of the aforementioned codes. The Code Appeals Board meets on an as needed basis. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee

The Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee consists of nine (9) members serving five (5) year terms. The Implementation Committee is an ad hoc committee established by the Board of Commissioners to monitor implementation of the Comprehensive

The Community Development Department serves the residents of Land Use Plan approved by the Board in 2003. The Committee is also tasked with the review of land use ordinances (when directed by the Commissioners) to determine compliance and consistency with the Goals and Objectives listed in the Plan. The Implementation Committee meets quarterly on the first Thursday of

> March, June, September, and December beginning at 6:30 p.m. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Environmental Advisory Council

The Environmental Advisory Council consists of eleven (11) total members; including seven (7) at-large members serving four year terms and a member from each of the following Boards:

- •Board of Health Representative
- Parks and Recreation Representative
- •Planning Commission Representative
- •Shade Tree Representative

The Environmental Advisory Council serves as a clearinghouse for issues of any environmental nature. The EAC recommends plans and programs to the appropriate Township agencies for identification and resolution of environmental problems. The EAC is also charged with the task of environmental education and awareness for the community. The EAC sees one of its major roles as "educator' to provide the citizens with useful information that will help to maintain and improve the environment in which we all live. The council also encourages voluntary programs through community

The EAC meets on the fourth Thursday of each month January through October at 6:00 p.m. The EAC meets on the first Tuesday after Thanksgiving at 6:00 p.m. for a combined November/December meeting. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Please contact your private recycling hauler and request the information be sent to Radnor Township, c/o Public Works, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne, PA 19087. Your haulers report, once received, will verify your compliance with Radnor Township Ordinance 01-17*. Reports are due by February 1, 2012.

*Under Radnor Township Ordinance 01-17, all persons occupying commercial, institutional and multi-family establishments

are required to separate, from other waste, the following recyclable items: aluminum cans, high grade office paper; glass; bi-metallic cans; corrugated paper, and leaves.

Each commercial, institutional and multi-family establishment in Radnor Township is required to develop a system for recycling at their place of business and provide written documentation to the Township of the total number of tons recycled and of the total number of tons of waste generate annually. This report is made part of the Radnor Township annual report to the Delaware County Solid Waste Authority.

Keep Car Washing from Harming Our Streams

This message is brought to you by Radnor Township and Chester-Ridley-Crum Watersheds Association, www.crcwatersheds.org.

Did you know?

- Soapy runoff from vehicle washing enters storm drains and flows untreated into local streams.
- Detergent levels as low as 0.1 ppm can harm wildlife and negatively impact drinking water and supplies.
- Even biodegradable detergents contain surfactants which can harm fish.
- Tap water from running hoses contains enough chlorine to kill fish in local streams.

Use a commercial car wash whenever possible. They typically use half the water, and treat and reuse the water before discharging it to

sanitary sewers.

If use of a commercial car wash is not possible, please follow these precautions:

1. Park the car so that water runs off onto a grassy area, not to the street.

Use protective measures to redirect water onto grass and to block nearby storm drains.

- 2. Use a bucket of wash water with minimal detergent or plain water with sponges and towels, not a running hose, to wash and rinse the car.
- 3. Use a high-pressure, low-volume hose with a trigger nozzle to refill the bucket. Do not allow hose to run freely on the pavement.

An Update on Radnor's Stormwater Program and Funding Implementation Project

The Township kicked off the Stormwater Program and Funding Implementation Project in September and has since been working closely with consultants from AMEC Environment & Infrastructure, Inc. (AMEC). The overall goal of the project is to develop and create an equitable and sustainably-funded stormwater program that begins to address the long-term stormwater needs of the Township.

Since September, Township staff from multiple departments have participated in a series of one-on-one interviews, as well as multiple meetings and workshops to provide the necessary background data and information in order to define the current stormwater program and associated costs. To put it simply, by understanding what the Township is doing now, as well as how much it costs, the future objectives and gaps that need to be addressed can be better evaluated and assessed. The current stormwater program will serve as the foundation for evaluating what an enhanced stormwater program will need to include to begin to address flooding concerns across the community, maximize the capacity and effectiveness of the Township's existing system and meet increased regulatory requirements. AMEC has also reviewed relevant previous engineering studies to assess the backlog of flood mitigation projects, infrastructure replacement and improvement projects, and other capital needs that will be considered in the development of a future stormwater program plan.

In addition, AMEC has collected both Township financial and geospatial data (i.e. aerial photography, county parcel data, Township mapping). This data will be used to evaluate the funding and billing options available to the Township, as well as the evaluation of a user-fee based funding strategy.

With the initial ground work for the project underway, a Stakeholder Advisory Committee (SAC) will be convened in early November to provide input and feedback on key policy issues as the Township evaluates the future of the stormwater program, as well as the costs and available funding mechanisms. The SAC is intended to represent a diverse cross section of the community and provide a voice to the project team regarding varying opinions and concerns. Five SAC meetings are currently planned through March, and these meetings will parallel much of the ongoing project work. Ultimately, the Township hopes the SAC will assist in providing feedback on proposed policies and recommendations to the Board of Commissioners ahead of any formal decision.

We expect to provide updates on the overall project progress in future issues of the Township Newsletter, including additional details of the stormwater program and potential user-fee.

Radnor Memorial Library

Anyone visiting the Radnor Memorial Library in the last year has seen some important changes to the lighting in the library. Last December, the original 1970's mercury vapor ceiling lights in the children's area were replaced with over seventy LED fixtures and fixtures in the library lobby over the World War II memorial were replaced with compact fluorescents. In August and September this year, the original florescent lights over most of the adult collection were replaced with over fifty more LED fixtures. Why is this important? The new lights are more energy efficient, using significantly less electricity than the older lights; the new lights burn cooler, requiring less air conditioning in the summer (although we may have to bump up the heat a bit in the winter!); the LED fixtures last longer, requiring less maintenance and replacement; and the

quality and amount of light from the new fixtures make it easier for users to find what they are looking for. This two year project was funded by a special gift from the Friends of the Radnor Library, an all-volunteer group that runs four book sales a year and a membership drive

In addition to this special gift, the Friends of the Radnor Library also annually donate funding for children's programs, the summer reading program, adult programs, all new DVDS and large print and non-English language (Span- ish, French, Korean and Chinese) books added to the library collection each year.
