Code Red IN AN EMERGENCY – BE PREPARED

The Radnor Township Board of Commissioners has contracted with Emergency Communications Network, providers of the CodeRED high-speed notification solution and the CodeRED Weather Warning Service. The CodeRED system provides Radnor Township officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire Township. This is a FREE service to Township residents!

Individuals and businesses are urged to visit Radnor Township's website at www.radnor.com and follow the link to the Emergency Notification Enrollment page. Those without internet access may call (610-688-5600) or stop by the Radnor Township Building, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne Monday to Friday, (8AM – 4PM) to supply their information. Required information includes first and last name, street address (physical address, no P.O. boxes), city, state, zip code, and primary phone number. Additional phone numbers can be entered as well.

WEATHER ALERT TYPES

Moments after a severe thunderstorm, flash flood, or tornado warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, messages will be sent to affected citizens.

CALLER ID

You will know the call is from CodeRED Weather Warning when you see 800-566-9780, 866-419-5000, for CodeRED Notification calls and 855-969-4636 for General calls (road closures, trash changes). If you

would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back.

USES

The CodeRED Notification system will be used to send critical communications from evacuation notices to missing child alerts.

PRIVACY

Your contact information remains private and will only be used for community notifications.

OPT-IN TO RECEIVE ALERTS

You can register your home, cell or work phones, plus add optional texting and email alerts. Registered residents will have the ability to log into their account and change their notification choices at their convenience.

Do You Own or Operate a Business in Radnor Township?

As a business owner, including landlords and persons operating a business from a home office, you are required to register your business and annually file a business tax return with the Township. The type of business you operate will determine whether you file a Business Privilege Tax Return or Mercantile Tax Return. In general, retailers file a Mercantile tax return while all others file a Business Privilege tax return. If you have any questions or are unsure if you are required to file, please feel free to call the Township at 610-688-5600 x152 or visit the Township website at www.radnor.com for forms and information. Do not delay... Tax returns are due by May 15th for the previous calendar year. If a valid extension request is filed with the IRS or State, the Township will accept this as an extension for your local return. While the extension allows for additional time to file your return, your tax liability must be satisfied by May 15th.


Restoring Internal Control

Since joining the Township's staff in the summer of 2010 and reviewing the audit comments from prior years', it was clear that a greater focus was needed on reorganizing the department and reestablishing internal controls over procedures. This was certainly not a reflection on those employees who currently work in the Department, as these employees have proven themselves to be dedicated, hard-working, solution oriented

individuals... that have embraced a more organized, controlled environment! Working together over the past two years and in working with the Citizens' Audit Review & Financial Advisory Committee (CARFAC), the Finance Department has resolved almost all of the audit comments that have lingered for years. Specifically, in looking at the chart, in 2008, the Township had a total of 34 audit comments. Of these comments, twelve were material, which indicates a material weakness in controls. By December 31, 2011, we had resolved half of those comments. As of the date of this letter, we are in the midst of our 2012 audit. As noted in the chart, the unofficial updates on those items are that we will have resolved all material and significant comments and only have three "other" comments to resolve in 2013. This is not to say that additional comments won't surface during the 2012 audit process: We welcome those comments for improvement and will immediately work with the Board of Commissions and CARFAC in setting up procedures to resolve those issues as they present themselves.

In addition to changing the focus to implement greater control features within the department, the Board of Commissioners have taken additional steps to improve controls in how these comments are reported to CARFAC, the Board and the public: Specifically, the Independent Auditors meet with CARFAC and the Board of Commissioners, separately, without representatives from the Administration. This is important to ensure that the Auditors are reporting directly and openly with those who oversee the Administration. Further, the Township has improved transparency by posting the audit reports to the website. These added reporting controls and transparency add to the accountability required of all the parties involved to keep internal controls a primary focus moving forward!



Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting = Radnor Township


Radnor Township was recognized by the Government Finance Officers' Association (GFOA) for our 2011 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. This is the first time since 2007 that the Township has achieved the GFOA's Certificate. "The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management" says the GFOA's Technical Services Center Director, Stephen J. Gauthier.


This recognition is based on the Township's renewed emphasis on governmental accounting and financial reporting, and while this accomplishment does not directly tie back to the audit results, it would not have been achieved without the unqualified opinion letter included in the 2011 CAFR. The Board of Commissioners should be recognized for their directives to the Administration for improved financial accounting, reporting and transparency. Additionally, the Administration is extremely thankful to the members of the Citizens Audit Review & Financial Advisory Committee (CARFAC) who were deeply involved in the audit process and findings process. Without their expertise and input, this Certificate would not have the same level of meaning and importance to the Radnor Community. As of the date of this article, the Finance Department is working with CARFAC, the Independent Auditors and the Board of Commissioners on the 2012 CAFR and submission for the GFOA's consideration for the 2012 Certificate of Achievement award.

Community Development

The Community Development Department serves the residents of Radnor Township through the administration and enforcement of regulatory ordinances adopted by the Board of Commissioners to assure the health, safety, and welfare of everyone involved in the Radnor experience. As part of this tasking, Community Development is responsible for the oversight of ten (10) volunteer boards/committees. These include the: Board of Health, Design Review Board, Historic & Architectural Review Board, Zoning Hearing Board, Code Appeals Board, Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee, Environmental Advisory Council, Garrett Hill Implementation Committee, Open Space Committee, and the Rental Housing Appeals Board

While all of these boards serve important functions and are critical to the future development of the Township, there are several that the residents and businesses interact with on a more regular basis than others. Previous newsletters highlighted the Board of Health, DRB, HARB, the Zoning Hearing Board, Code Appeals Board, Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee, and the Environmental Advisory Council. This newsletter will focus on the duties of the remaining boards and committees.

In addition to these ten (10), there are several other volunteer boards and committees under the other departments in the Township. The Township is always looking for individuals to volunteer their time to make a difference and give back to their community. If you are interested in serving in a volunteer capacity, please contact the Township.

Garrett Hill Implementation Committee

The Garrett Hill Implementation Committee consists of nine (9) members. The Garrett Hill Implementation Committee acts as representatives for the residents and stakeholders during the development and implementation of the Garrett Hill Master Plan and Overlay District pursuant to the Radnor Comprehensive Land Use Plan of 2003. The Implementation committee is a result of the efforts of the Garrett Hill Coalition (GHC) which was formed on October 17, 2007 to change the planning process in the development of the Garrett Hill Master Plan and Overlay District so the people of Garrett Hill can direct and create the future of their community. The Garrett Hill Implementation Committee meets quarterly. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Open Space Committee

The Open Space Committee was formed in 1999 as an ad-hoc committee to advise the Board of Commissioners on the acquisition of land. The Open Space Committee, which meets as necessary, consists of ten (10) members. The Open Space Plan Implementation Committee meetings are not televised, but are open to the public.

Rental Housing Appeals Board

The Rental Housing Appeals Board was formed in 2001. The Board hears appeals from the Township's Code Officials' determinations in the enforcement of the rental housing ordinance. The Rental Housing Appeals Board consists of three (3) members serving five (5) year terms, plus one (1) alternate member. The Rental Housing Appeals Board meets on an as needed basis. Meetings are held in the Radnorshire Room of the Township Building, and are televised on Radnor Cable Channel 10 and Verizon FiOS Channel 30.

Think Spring!!!

As the weather starts to warm up and all the snow and ice disappears, there is a tendency to want to make our outdoor living areas more livable. Often times, we are in a rush to soak up that first bit of nice weather and stretch our legs from a long cold winter. The anticipation of starting to whittle down the "To-Do" projects list that has been growing over the winter months can be a little overwhelming and these projects are often started without much of a second thought.

Did you apply for and receive a permit or even know that a permit was required? A permit is required for new construction, additions, alterations, any project that requires structural changes. Building permit applications are available on the Township website or at the Township office. Check with the Community Development Department before you make alterations to your home or business. Here are some of the improvements that require permits:

- · Fences or walls
- Shed, greenhouse
- · Wood deck, patio, porch
- Swimming pool, spa, or hot tub over 24 inches in depth
- New buildings and additions
- Roof replacement

- Driveways
- Interior alterations
- Structural repair or replacement
- Fireplace
- Sign

- Changes in use, home occupations, change in commercial tenants
- Heating and air conditioning replacement
- Plumbing alterations
- Electrical work or new installation
- Alternative Energy

With the warming weather, now is the time people start to seek out a good safe Public Swimming Pool and secure their seasonal memberships. The following are recommended tips to inquire about in order to ensure a safe, fun swimming experience.

- \bullet Inquire if all lifeguards are certified as a Lifeguard, CPR, & 1st Aide.
 - Inquire as to the ratio of lifeguards to bathers (1 per 50 is recommended).
 - Inquire if the wading pool will be guarded by a lifeguard.
 - Inquire as to the frequency of pool sampling during the day by lifeguards.
 - ➤ Indoor pools get sampled 2x per hour.
 - ➤ Outdoor pools get sampled 1x per hour.
 - Inquire about the pool policy for accidents (Vomiting, Formed and loose Fecal matter).

Are you aware of all of the services that the men and women of the Radnor Police Department provide to our community? You may ask or tell yourself that you are aware of these services. Yes, the Radnor Police Department provides the core services to all residents and visitors to our community. Those core services are the protection of life and property as well as the generalization of providing public safety. However, your Radnor Police Department provides more than just public safety to the township. The Radnor Police Department is a full service police department and is separated into divisions to provide different services. There are two main divisions, the patrol division and special operations division.

RADNOR POLICE

The patrol division is responsible for basic patrol of the township and answering calls for service. Did you know that the patrol division also provides the following services?


- > Vacant House Watch Program

Radnor Recycles - Single Stream

What is single stream recycling? Single stream recycling is placing all acceptable recycling items into one container, no separation required!

In 2011 the residents of Radnor Township recycled 6731.14 tons of material. This effort saved the Township approximately \$157,845 in tipping fees for solid waste. The more Radnor residents recycle the more we save!

The following lists show what is acceptable for single stream recycling and what is not acceptable:

Acceptable Items

Newspaper, inserts, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, paperback books, phone books, cardboard, clean pizza boxes, office and school paper, color paper, boxboard (cereal, cake, and cracker boxes), paper egg cartons, paper bags (grocery type), aluminum cans, clean foil, tin and steel aerosol cans (empty), plastic food containers #1 through #7.

Non Acceptable Items

Garbage, plastic bags, food waste, food tainted items (used paper plates, paper towels, paper napkins), Styrofoam, motor oil bottles or hazardous chemical containers, plastic toys or sporting goods, electronics, batteries, CDs, DVDs, foam egg cartons, ice cream cartons, light bulbs, hangers, yard waste or garden tools.

Radnor Township picks up yard waste for recycling on Wednesdays. Yard waste is not collected on Wednesdays that fall during a holiday week.

The following are the regulations for yard waste collection:

- All yard waste should be placed in bio-degradable paper bags or a 35 gallon refuse container for collection
- All bags are to be placed at the curb for collection
- Tree trimmings and brush should be tied in bundles and no longer than three (3) feet in length and 2 inches in diameter.
- Leaves will be collected in paper bags when placed at the curb.
 Bagged leaves will not be collected during the township wide leaf collection season in November and December.
- Christmas trees are collected after the Christmas holiday, weather permitting, and after leaf collection is completed Christmas trees must be placed at the curb for collection
- Brush will not be collected that is sticking out of a container, this is for employee safety
- The Township will take up to ten (10) bags/bundles per collection
- Plastic bags or trash mixed with law debris are not permitted
- · Bags of rocks and dirt are not permitted
- Grass clippings will not be collected. It is recommended that the grass clippings be left on your lawn to decay or be composted on your property.
- Firewood will not be collected.
- Burning of yard waste is not permitted.

Have you ever wondered what happens to your recycling after it is picked up at your home and delivered to the recycling plant? Here are some of the ways your recycling is used:

- Aluminum cans shipped to interim processors or end users, such as Anheuser Busch and are converted into new sheets of aluminum for production into new aluminum cans.
- Steel Cans shipped to interim processors to be converted into new sheet of metal for use in various applications.
- Glass Bottles shipped to glass processors to be crushed down to smaller pieces and shipped to end users to make new glass products such as bottles and containers.
- #1 PET Bottles sold directly to interim processors and end users to make new PET bottles as well as the process of making new carpet. Mohawk Industries is one of the end users. The plastic bottles are
- cleaned, ground to pellets, melted and then used in making carpet fiber.
- #2 HDPE Bottles HDPE bottles, both pigmented and natural are substitutes for original plastic resins. They are shipped to interim processors and end users and these material are made into new HDPE bottles for non-food items, plastic lumber, and various other products.
- Newspaper, Cardboard, and Office Paper great substitutes for virgin materials. This material is shipped directly to paper mills, such as Georgia Pacific and Bowater, across the country and used to make new paper products such as tissue paper, newspaper and cartons.

Please remember recycling is mandatory in Radnor Township. *If recyclable materials are found in your solid waste you are subject to citation.* The Solid Waste/Recycling Calendar is available at www.radnor.com or in paper form at the reception desk at the Radnor Township Administration Building.

Radnor Memorial Library

2012 was a very good year at the library and 2013 is shaping circulated over 270,600 items. That means that every resident of Radnor borrowed on average over 8 ½ items from the Radnor library. Nearly 4,300 people attended library programs in the Winsor Room and thousands more came to story times in the library, at daycare centers and in Garret Hill. Nearly 180,000 came to the library building to browse, read, study, borrow, use a computer or attend a program. If we didn't see you in 2012, be sure to visit the library or its website at www.radnorlibrary.org to see what you are missing!

In 2013, 63% of the library's operating budget will come from the township's contribution. The remainder comes from money the library earns, gifts to our Annual Funds and as memorials, and major annual gifts from the Friends of the Library and from the Chanticleer Foundation. The library also receives state aid from the Commonwealth but this has decreased from over 10% of the library's budget in 2008 to around 7% in 2012. How does Radnor Library's funding compare with other nearby libraries? 2011 contributions from Tredyffrin, Easttown, Lower Merion and Upper Merion townships to

their libraries ranged from \$58 to over \$83 per capita; Radnor's is just over \$28 (last year this comparative data is available). Library expenditures per capita in 2011 in the other townships ranged from \$60 to \$92 per capita; the Radnor library spent \$43.37 per capita.

Upcoming programs include: on April 7, W. Gary Smith presents "From art to landscape" at the 14th Annual Chanticleer Lecture; on May 7, create your own Hypertufa planter (\$20 materials fee). Lego Club returns on March 28, April 25 and May 23 at 4 pm (ages 3

and up) and parents can hear from child development experts on dealing with challenging behaviors on April 22. Students in grades 9-12 are invited to two sessions on digital photography with Bill Ecklund on April 6 and 20.



purpose is to provide temporary shelter, care and second chances to dogs and cats in a loving, no-kill atmosphere with the ultimate goal of finding each animal a forever family and home. Founders Dr. and Mrs. George McClellan's motivation to start the organization was a desire to rescue and provide a home for stray animals, as they had done with the shelter's namesake, Francis. Found as a cold and starving puppy, Francis became a beloved member of their family, and his impact on their lives became the driving force to save more dogs and cats from homelessness and neglect.

Currently, Francisvale consists of a community-based board of directors, ten full and part-time staff members, over 100 active volunteers, and 30 dogs and 60 cats residing in every possible room of the original house and every space in the kennel. A common goal of all

those affiliated with Francisvale is to place each animal in the best, compatible, permanent home.

Francisvale's relationship with the local community is also at the heart of its mission. Without the commitment of township volunteers, the financial support of donors, and their common love of animals, this non-profit shelter would not be able to save the lives of so many dogs and cats nor offer the critical medical and



emotional attention so essential to their rehabilitation. With a full complement of gardeners, both those returning for a 2nd year and the current waiting list, the Skunk Hollow Gardeners are impatiently waiting for the first glimmer of spring and planting their first crops of the season.

Year one was a challenge with lots of hard work: Clearing the area, laying out 40 plots, building and placing 102 raised beds, adding sufficient soil and then growing, watering and weeding their plots as well as the common areas.

Despite heat and drought the harvest was bountiful! With 85% of the gardeners reporting, 119 people ate regularly and the plot-holders also shared their bounty with an additional 67 families. Vegetables were gathered each Saturday and donated to Philabundance for their Delaware County program – a \$\$ equivalence of \$1350.00. Not bad

In December 2012 the Skunk Hollow Community Garden became a 501(c)(3) – the not-for-profit designation of the Internal Revenue Service. Any donations to the garden are now tax deductable.

During the summer, Declan Evans, working toward his Eagle Scout designation in Radnor's troupe, began the construction of a large shed for the garden. His troupe, adults and garden volunteers supported his work. In early January

some informative and interesting talks.


Wednesday April 3 brings us to our joint program with our sister club Wayne Woods. The speaker will be none other than Mike

Saving Hallowed Ground

Saving Hallowed Ground, a 501c3, was organized in 2011 under the leadership of Eugene Hough and Martin Costello of 'Joes Place' and former post commander of Bateman Gallagher Post 668 of the American Legion. Its mission is the Preservation and Protection of monuments and markers, commemorating veterans and patriots wherever they may be found.

Radnor's War Memorial, located on South Wayne Avenue, was in dire need of conservation and preservation. Eugene Hough had indicated that this was not an isolated case – many small towns have

memorials to the fallen heroes of their past that need to be protected and preserved.

Saving Hallowed Ground and the 8th graders at St. Katherine of Sienna School worked together in teams to select and research twenty names of local veterans listed on the memorial wall, including hands-on conservation experience. They researched the times when they lived and communicated with relatives both locally and

across the country. The students were supported in their research by the Memorial Library of Radnor and the Radnor Historical Society. Truly, this project allowed for atonement for many families who indicated that they thought the community had lost sight of their relatives' service for their country. One unique activity was the development of a video, "Saving Hallowed Ground", which may be viewed on YouTube.

Currently, Saving Hallowed Ground is in the process of replicating this program with two Philadelphia schools in the Northern Liberties

and Fishtown areas and also is in dialogue with Radnor and Conestoga High Schools to develop similar programs.

M ost seniors hope to experience healthy, positive aging, and prefer to continue to live in their own homes as well. Sometimes circumstances change for an individual, a spouse, or family members, and issues of health and home can become challenging.

Surrey Services is a supportive caring community organization that provides an array of home services which help seniors and their families meet these changing needs. By using a combination of paid professionals and caring volunteers, Surrey is able to help older adults address the challenges of living alone or with a spouse who has become more dependent.

In an environment where most home care providers are for-profit companies, Surrey is unique. Surrey is a local non-profit that offers much more than just home care—it also offers other critical services which seniors need to remain independent: grocery shopping, meal programs, help with bookkeeping and paperwork, housecleaning, and minor home maintenance services. Knowing these needs are addressed

provides peace of mind to the senior and to their family.

Older adults turn to Surrey for the whole continuum of in-home health care services. Whether the needs are part-time or round-the-clock, Surrey has companions who can drive an older adult to the grocery store and appointments, and help prepare meals, assist with activities of daily living such as showering and getting dressed. Skilled nursing services are available when a nurse is needed for medication management, wound care, diabetes management and other medical follow-up. Consultations and care management are available by a geriatric care manager, who can assess a situation, devise a care plan, and coordinate communication between the family, various resources in the community, and medical and legal professionals.




