A Message from the Board of Commissioners

Dear Radnor Residents:

It is my pleasure to wish you all a wonderful fall season and hope that you enjoyed a peaceful and restful summer. While summer can be a quiet time for many, our Township staff has been hard at work and we have made much progress on many of the important issues facing our Township. Additionally, our extraordinary staff is always on duty and they never miss a beat in providing our fantastic services -- even in the dog days of summer, from sanitation to park programming and maintenance to road work to police protection.

This fall and winter we will be wrapping up many of the multi-year projects in front of us. The Villanova conditional use application is currently underway, and when and if that is approved their building plans will proceed toward subdivision and land development approval. The Ardrossan Estate is currently in the subdivision and land development approval process, and when and if that is approved we will be moving forward with the purchase of 71 acres of open space adjacent to that development. We are also working toward improving the parameters of development under our PLO zoning designation as we face new redevelopment of significant properties in that area, especially the property at 145 King of Prussia Road. For all three of these projects (Villanova, Ardrossan and PLO improvements) we have hired a planning firm, Rettew Associates, to help us analyze, understand and control the changes that are coming our way.

We are finally poised to enter into a contract with a private firm to manage the Willows mansion while still maintaining the entire park as public open space. We are also planning for great trail extensions in all sections of our Township, and this fall we should see the final version of our new Trails and Greenways Plan. In addition, our new Stormwater Advisory Committee has been busy working through the many issues involved in establishing our stormwater program and recommending projects. Finally, our highly respected financial advisory board, CARFAC, continues to put in many, many hours and provide skillful guidance in our financial planning for today and for many years to come.

As you can see, there is a great deal of progress and activity underway in your Township. Tune in or come by our meetings and be a part of it!

A Message from Township Manager Robert A. Zienkowski

Summer is coming to an end. Across the country, kids are heading back to school and we are all preparing for the changing of the seasons. As summer rolls into fall, one thing remains the same: the staff of Radnor Township remains dedicated to providing excellent services to its residents.

Radnor Township continues to keep the audit process, accountability and financial transparency as top priorities. The Finance Department continues to work with the Citizens Auditor Review and Financial Advisory Committee (CARFAC) on an ongoing basis which continues to produce tremendous results. With CARFAC's guidance, the Township has issued an award winning comprehensive annual financial report for 2011 and 2012, and we expect that the 2013 report will once again receive the Government Finance Officers Association's highest recognition for excellence in financial reporting. At the same time, we continue to work with the independent auditors in addressing the thirty four audit comments lingering from the 2010 audit. We are proud to say that we are down to two comments left to address; both of which are "other" items. The Township has also benefited from its strong business base. Increased revenues from the business base have allowed the Township to maintain its real estate tax rate for three years (2012-2014). In fact, in addition to keeping tax rates constant, the Township has also been able to direct over \$6.0 million to help begin to address the pension and post-employment benefit liabilities and direct over \$4.2 million to help provide funding for stormwater and other capital program needs.

The Public Works Department is continuing to maintain the Township's parks and infrastructure, collect trash, brush, and recycling, all while preparing for the upcoming leaf collection season and snow fighting season. The Public Works team is dedicated to addressing the issues that affect our residents every day, and strives to do so as efficiently as possible.

Now that school is back in session, your Radnor Township Police Department will be continuing its Safe Schools initiative by having officers conduct daily patrols through the schools, as well as scheduled trainings with select schools to best prepare for emergencies. As a service to our residents, the department also continues to do vacant house checks, so if you plan on taking a trip in the fall, let the police department now and they will periodically check on your house for you.

With the appointment of a professional planner, in conjunction with the Engineering Department (consisting of our civil engineers and traffic engineer), the Township now has a truly broad based, multifaceted approach to providing plan review information to our volunteer committees and elected officials regarding land development projects large and small. This approach with our professionals is important as these projects will affect Radnor Township today and well into the future.

The Community Development Department is always working to make sure that new residential or commercial construction, as well as additions and renovations, are constructed according to code for the safety of our residents. Coupled with rental housing inspections and property maintenance, Community Development is here to help make your living environment safe.

Throughout the summer, the Parks and Recreation Department provided programming that enhanced the quality of life for residents of all ages, including Radnor Day Camp, Theatre in the Park, A Night at the Ball Park and the Great American Backyard Campout. We are already looking at events for next summer, but don't forget to keep an eye out for our fall events, including the 37th Annual Radnor Run on October 26 and the "State Award Winning" Fall Harvest and Great Pumpkin Patch Event to name a few! Check out the Township website for a full list of year round events.

The Radnor Township Board of Commissioners has contracted with Emergency Communications Network, providers of the CodeRED high-speed notification solution and the CodeRED Weather Warning Service. The CodeRED system provides Radnor Township officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire Township.

This is a FREE service to Township residents!

Individuals and businesses are urged to visit Radnor Township's website at www.radnor.com and follow the link to the Emergency Notification Enrollment page. Those without internet access may call (610) 688-5600 or stop by the Radnor Township Building, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne Monday to Friday, 8:00am to 4:00pm to supply their information. Required information includes first and last name, street address (physical address, no P.O. boxes), city, state, zip code, and primary phone number. Additional phone numbers may be entered as well.

WEATHER ALERT TYPES

Moments after a severe thunderstorm, flash flood, or tornado warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, messages will be sent to affected citizens.

CALLER ID

You will know the call is from CodeRED Weather Warning when you see 800-566-9780, 866-419-5000, for CodeRED Notification calls and 855-969-4636 for General calls (road closures, trash changes). If you would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back.

USES

The CodeRED Notification system will be used to send critical communications from evacuation notices to missing child alerts.

PRIVACY

Your contact information remains private and will only be used for community notifications.

OPT-IN TO RECEIVE ALERTS

You can register your home, cell or work phones, plus add optional texting and email alerts. Registered residents will have the ability to log into their account and change their notification choices at their convenience.

Keep your family safe from home fires

Although deaths and injuries from residential fires have decreased in the past several years, deaths from fires and burns are still the third leading cause of fatal home injuries (CDC). Seventy percent of these deaths are from inhaling smoke. Two-thirds of deaths from home fires occurred in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

Fires are more likely to happen in certain areas or by certain equipment in your house. Be extra careful while you're cooking, smoking, around candles, furnaces, electrical cords and fireplaces, and with children, toddlers and babies nearby.

According to the U.S. Fire Administration, cooking equipment, most often a range or a stovetop is the leading cause of reported U.S. home fires and home fire injuries.

Fortunately, there are things you and your family can do to protect yourselves.

Have a properly working smoke alarm

- Change the battery to your smoke alarm once a year and change the whole unit every 10 years. Pick a special day, a birthday, holiday or daylight savings and change the battery every year on that day.
- If possible, replace smoke alarms with interconnected alarms. When one alarm goes off, the others will sound too.

- Smoke alarms should be in every floor of your house (including your basement) and outside bedrooms or sleeping areas.
- Test your smoke alarm monthly.
- Make sure your kids are familiar with the sound of the alarm.

Plan a family escape route

- Practice it on a monthly basis.
- Practice with everyone in your family, even children, toddlers and infants.
- Practice from every room in the house.

Learn how to use your fire extinguisher

- Use a fire extinguisher when a fire is contained, like in a waste basket.
- Keep your fire extinguisher in an easily accessible place.
- Call your local fire department if you have questions on how to use a fire extinguisher.
- Fire extinguishers have gauges on them indicating when they need to be replaced. They should be checked regularly to make sure they are still functional.

If a fire occurs in your home

- Never open a door that feels hot. Escape another way.
- Take the safest route, but if you have to go through smoke, crawl low and under the smoke. Cover your nose and mouth with a moist towel (if possible) or an article of clothing.
- Immediately leave your house, and then call for help.
- Once you're out, stay out. Don't go back in, not even to grab someone else.

What happens after a fire?

After a fire, your world may be turned upside down and you may wonder what you should do now. Information and resources are available to help get your life back to normal. The U.S. Fire Administration has pulled together some tips to get you started. Please visit www.usfa.fema.gov for more information.

2014 TRASH & RECYCLING CALENDAR

Refuse, recycling, and yard waste must be placed at the curb by 7:00am on the day of scheduled pickup

Recyclable Items:

Yes: newspaper, inserts, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, paperback books, phone books, cardboard, clean pizza boxes, office and school paper, color paper, boxboard (cereal, cake, and cracker boxes), paper egg cartons, paper bags (grocery type), aluminum cans, clean foil, tin and steel aerosol cans (empty), glass jars and bottles (empty), plastic containers #1 through #7.

No: garbage, plastic bags, food waste, food tainted items (used paper plates, paper towels, paper napkins), Styrofoam, motor oil bottles or hazardous chemical containers, plastic toys or sporting goods, electronics, batteries, CDs, DVDs, foam egg cartons, ice cream cartons, light bulbs, hangers, yard waste or garden tools.

Yard Waste Collection:

Collected curbside on Wednesdays (with the exception of holiday weeks), must be placed in bio-degradable paper bags or loose in a 35 gallon refuse container. Contents of container cannot exceed 50 lbs. *No plastic bags will be accepted.*

Tree trimmings and brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 3 feet in length, and branches can be no larger than 2" in diameter. *No firewood will be collected.* Leaves will be collected in bio-degradable bags when placed at the curb except during the Township wide leaf collection in the fall. Up to 10 bundles/bags of yard waste per collection will be accepted. *Plastic bags, trash, grass, and dirt mixed with lawn debris is not permitted.*

Leaf Collection Guidelines

- Residents who live on street names listed in CAPITALS on the Districts Streets List **MUST** place their leaves in the gutter line of their street. Leaves should be piled so they do not impede the cart way. If some leaves must remain behind the curb (so that the cart way is not impacted) township crews will remove leaves from that location.
- Residents who live on streets listed in regular type on the Districts Streets List are required to place their leaves on their property and **OFF** the street (behind the curb). The township crews will remove the leaves from that location.
- All tree branches and tree limbs must be removed from leaf piles.
- Because of State regulations, **bagged leaves will not be collected** by Radnor Township Solid Waste Collection Division during this collection.
- All leaves to be collected must be placed according to the guidelines described and will be picked up in bulk. **There will be no exceptions!**
- Special note: Please do not park any motor vehicle on top of leaf piles. A hot engine could cause the leaves to catch fire.
- Note to Landscapers: It is illegal to dump compacted loads of leaves on Township streets. Any contractor caught dumping compacted leaves will be subject to a \$300 fine for illegal dumping on Township right-of-way.

Daily Leaf Collection Schedule

- The projected list of streets that leaf crews will be working on the next workday can be found on the township website at www.radnor.com. The leaf schedule will be followed as possible, weather permitting.
- The Daily Leaf Collection Schedule can also be seen on Radnor Television (RTV). Please tune in to Comcast cable channel 5 or Verizon FiOS channel 30. The cable service is subject to change due to unforeseen circumstances that may arise.

During the months of January through October, leaves may be bagged in biodegradable paper bags and placed at the curb on Wednesdays (exception of holiday weeks) as part of the yard waste recycling program. No more than 10 bags of leaves should be put out for collection per week and each bag should weigh no more than 30 lbs.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

2014 LEAF COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Each year during the months of November and December the Township's Public Works Department collects leaves from residential properties located on all Township, State, and Private roads. In an effort to get all of the leaves collected before winter weather, leaf collection will begin a week earlier this year. Leaves will be collected two times in each district. The second collection will begin after the first collection has been complete in all three districts.

Radnor Recycles

All persons occupying a residential dwelling in Radnor Township are required to recycle. Radnor Township provides a single stream curbside recycling program to our residents as required by Pennsylvania Act 101 "Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act". All recyclables can be placed into the same container with no sorting necessary.

The following lists show what is acceptable for single stream recycling and what is not acceptable.

Acceptable items:

- Aluminum, clean foil, bi-metallic cans, steel aerosol cans (empty)
- Glass – glass bottles and jars
- Plastic containers marked with # 1 through #7
- Clean Paper Products – newspaper, inserts, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, paperback books, phone books, cardboard boxes (broken down), clean pizza boxes, office and school paper, color paper, boxboard (cereal, cake, and cracker boxes), paper egg cartons, paper bags (grocery type)

Items Not Acceptable for Recycling:

- Garbage – foam egg cartons, ice cream cartons
- Plastic bags – please leave your items loose in the can (plastic bags jam the recycling equipment)
- Food waste
- Used Paper Plates, paper towels, paper napkins – all food tainted paper items
- Styrofoam
- Motor oil bottles or hazardous chemical container
- Plastic toys or sporting goods
- Electronics, batteries, CDs, DVDs
- Light bulbs, hangers, yard waste or garden tools

**Please have your recycling containers at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your scheduled recycling day.
Additional recycling containers may be purchased for \$20 at the Radnor Township Building, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne.**

Yard Waste - Environmental Recycling

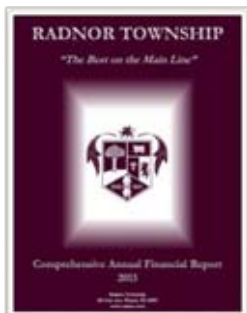
Please do not put your tree trimmings, brush and leaves out with the trash. Every Wednesday (with the exception of holiday weeks), yard waste is collected curbside. The Township will take up to 10 bundles/bags of yard waste per collection.

- All yard waste must be placed in bio-degradable bags or a 35 gallon refuse container. Contents of bags or containers are not to exceed 50 lbs. No Plastic Bags.
- Tree trimmings and brush must be tied in bundles no more than 2 feet in diameter and no longer than 3 feet in length.
- Leaves will be collected in bio-degradable (paper) bags and placed at the curb except during the Township wide leaf collection in the fall. In the fall, leaves should not be bagged.
- Grass clippings, dirt, and rocks are not collected as part of the yard waste program.

Radnor Township publishes the 2013 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report

Back in June, the Board of Commissioners accepted the Independent Auditor’s Report and the accompanying Audited Financial Statements. Combined, these items are included in the 2013 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. The CAFR is a complete look at the Township’s financial position and operating results from 2013. The financial information was prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and includes an introductory section, Independent Auditors’ Report, Management’s Discussion and Analysis, Audited Financial Statements, Footnote disclosures, and a statistical section that provides supplemental comparative and other useful data. The CAFR is available on the Township’s web site at www.radnor.com.

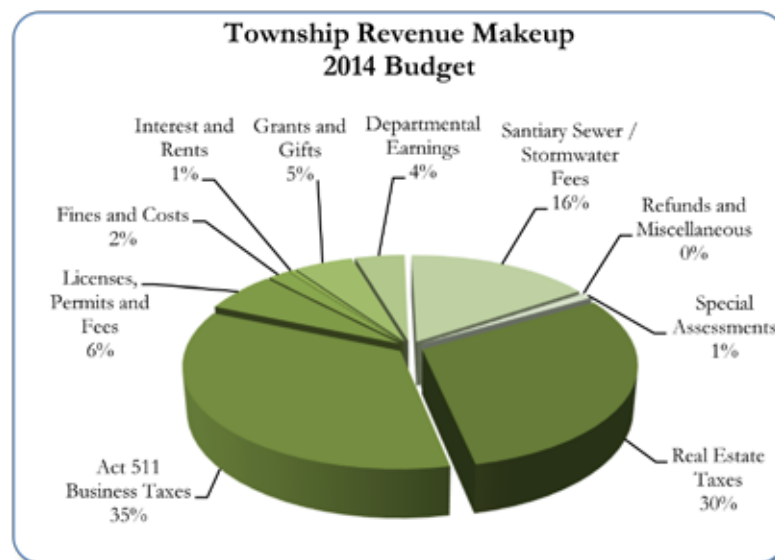
The 2013 CAFR makes the third consecutive year that the Township completed a comprehensive financial report. The Township engaged CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP, an independent CPA firm, to conduct the 2013 audit which included a look at the Township’s internal controls, financial transaction processes, asset management controls and completion of the financial statements. The CAFR and corresponding audit is the product of a project that started back in December 2013 and was officially completed in June 2014 when the Board of Commissioners formally accepted the report. The Township submitted the 2013 CAFR to the Government Finance Officers’ Association for their consideration for the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. The results of the submission should be released later this year, but we feel confident that Report meets all of the required items to be considered for the award.

The Finance Department is extremely appreciative to the Citizens Audit Review & Financial Advisory Committee (CARFAC) for their continued role in implementing several of the revamped internal controls and for their oversight of the project timeline. Also, each of the Township departments played important roles in compiling the information needed to complete their report and their cooperation was tremendous. Finally, the Finance Department staff should be commended for their daily roles in making sure that the Stakeholders of Radnor Township can feel confident that the internal controls and financial reporting aspect of the Township are being done accurately and professionally.

The Sources of Revenue that Fund Your Services and Township Infrastructure

In our continued efforts to provide the Stakeholders of Radnor Township with more information regarding the finances of the Township, I wanted to include a brief note on the sources of income that the Township utilizes to pay for the service delivery, infrastructure and other amenities that make Radnor Township the “Best Place to Live, Work and Do Business on the Main Line.” Radnor Township benefits from a very diverse revenue base. As indicated in the chart, the primary sources of revenue for the Township include real estate taxes, business taxes and departmental earnings. In drilling down, the real estate component is made up of five different classifications as noted in the table. The primary component is the residential base, which is 77%. What this means is that the residents of the Township only provide approximately 25% of the Township’s total revenue base. This is important to note because it emphasizes the role that our local businesses play in funding the services that the Township provides. Further, included in the Departmental Earnings revenue category are annual sewer rent revenues, recreational programming revenues, special refuse collection program revenues, various parking revenues as well as extra police duty revenues all of which help offset direct expenses incurred by the Township to provide those services. Basically, these revenues directly offset the amount of taxes that would otherwise be needed to provide the same level of service. Finally, it’s important to focus on the business portion of the Township’s tax base because they make up a critical portion of the total revenue (over 30% between 511 Enabling Taxes and their portion of the Real Estate). As mentioned, the revenue diversity that Radnor enjoys can be, at times, a double edge sword: When economic downturns occur, the impact to the Township’s revenues can be quite large (with swings over \$1.8 million) as evidenced by the recent Great Recession. Radnor Township Snow Removal Requirements

As we head into the winter months the inevitable snowfall may be just around the corner. While speaking of corners The Radnor Police Department wishes to inform all residents and snow plowing contractors of township requirements.

Radnor Township Ordinance #250, entitled Snow and Ice Removal, has two main requirements.

The first requirement is that all owners, tenants and occupants of buildings or land abutting on a paved sidewalk on a public highway is required to keep the sidewalk clear of snow and ice in front of their respective premises. The sidewalks must be cleared of ice and snow 24 hours after the snowfall ceases. Property owners are also required to keep the sidewalk treated with material to abate ice and snow.

The second requirement of the ordinance addresses the disposition of the snow removal. Many times residents and/or snow removal contactors will shovel or plow snow into the street from private

properties. This practice is prohibited by ordinance and the person depositing the snow in the street may be subject to a fine for this violation.

Property owners that are in violation of the snow removal ordinance may be cited for the violation which results in a fine of \$50.00 and additional related court costs.

The intent of this ordinance is to promote the rapid removal of snow from sidewalks and streets. The paramount goal is to provide safety and mobility of pedestrians and vehicles throughout the township during inclement winter weather.

Rental Housing Inspections

Rental Housing Inspections are a necessary tool that benefits everyone from the property owner, the tenant and the municipality. The Rental Housing Inspector is charged with protecting the life, safety and welfare of the community and attempt to inspect each rental housing unit once each year.

The purpose of this inspection is to identify issues that may be problematic and ensure that corrections are made within a timely and code compliant manner. The International Property Maintenance Code/2009 has been adopted as the standard used for inspections.

These are some of the items looked at during a typical rental housing inspection:

- Building #'s should be of a size large enough to be seen from the public right away by police, ambulance service, the mail carrier and or other delivery services. Numbers should be of a different color than their background for easy viewing.
- Smoke alarms should be located on every level of the rental unit including basements. They should also be located in the hallway outside of bedrooms and in each bedroom. Early warnings of fires can save lives and or reduce injuries.
- Stairways, decks, porches & balcony's should be structurally sound and in good repair.
- Electrical hazards such as broken outlet covers can shock you and your family and should be repaired immediately.
- Hot water heaters have a combination temperature/pressure relief valve that may release hot water when either the temperature of the water or the pressure in the tank is too high. This valve should be piped to within 6 inches of the floor to reduce the opportunity of injury if the valve release occurs.
- Accumulation and disposal of rubbish is important in the control of mice, mosquito's and other vector and is a part of being a good neighbor.
- Insect screens in windows are necessary to deter mosquitos, bats and other unwanted guest from getting into your home.

The mission statement for Skunk Hollow Community Garden, created by gardener Mukund Prabhu, states – “a garden sanctuary empowered by a diverse variety of Radnor residents sharing a keen awareness of nature’s interconnected web of life ... interested in utilizing and promoting ... organic gardening methods and sharing the experiences and abundant surpluses garnered with others through local outreach programs.

As we’re reaching the finale of our third year together, it’s good to reflect on the garden. Sixteen families joined our ranks and swelled our count to 62 families. It was a late, cool spring, resulting in a fabulous harvest of peas. Fortunately, last winter’s severe cold did kill off many of the dastardly insects that made gardening so frustrating in 2013. We’ve had fun and worked hard together.

A major focus for our garden is Outreach. We welcome school groups. This year Agnes Irwin 2nd graders visited, and planted 2 beds for the community with Edamame beans and pole Snap beans. They had a ball digging in the dirt. Haverford School seventh graders spent a morning with us, weeding and spreading woodchips throughout our rows and aisles. The boys have lots of energy and seem to love their time with us. In September, up to 40 Villanova students will make a repeat trip to the garden; last year we harvested 90 pounds of sweet potatoes together. Will they be ready this year?

The garden participated in the first Eco Tour, sponsored by the Radnor Conservancy. We provided a scavenger hunt for garden visitors spending the night at the Willows during the Great American Campout and have been judged for the Garden Contest sponsored by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society.

Most important is our annual participation in Philabundances’ Harvest In-Gathering. Over a 3 month period, each Saturday a team gathers ‘surplus’ vegetables, washes, weighs and packages them for delivery to Linvilla Orchards. The collection is then delivered to Loaves and Fishes, Prospect Park. This non-profit provides 650 families with three meals a day for 26 days of each month!!! “The Franklin Tree” (Franklinia Alatomaha)

One of the most exciting and unique trees found at Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens is the Franklin or Franklinia tree (Franklinia Alatomaha). This tree was first discovered by Philadelphia’s own John Bartram on the banks of the Altamaha River in Georgia in the late 1700’s. However, the tree has not been seen growing in the wild since 1790. The reasons for its disappearance are still debated today. Bartram named the specimen Franklinia in his garden after his dear friend Ben Franklin. It is likely that all of the Franklinias in cultivation today stem from Bartram’s original collection. Although the mystery of the Franklinia has yet to be solved, the unique characteristics of this tree make it an interesting part of Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens’ collection.

The Franklinia is of particular interest because it blooms later in the season than most other small flowering trees. Its showy white blooms appear in August and September. The flowers on the Franklinia have pearly white petals and striking yellow-orange stamens in the center. Often the flowers are compared to a fried egg, as the bottom petals are cupped.

In mid-October during the peak of fall color, the Franklinia makes another statement in the garden. By this time, the green color of the leaves has changed into a burgundy red. However, sometimes fall color is variable depending on the environmental conditions and weather. At Jenkins, the largest Franklinia specimen is nestled between a pair of white pines (Pinus Strobus), where the color the Franklinia contrasts with the dark green of the pines. Some years when the timing is just right, the flowers of the Franklinia can be found among the deep red foliage.

These two qualities make the Franklinia unique, as its late blooming flowers remind us to enjoy the changing of the seasons as the vibrant colors of fall begin to appear. Stop by Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens this fall to enjoy the beautiful fall color of the Franklinia trees, and, if we are lucky, there just might be a few blooms still persisting!

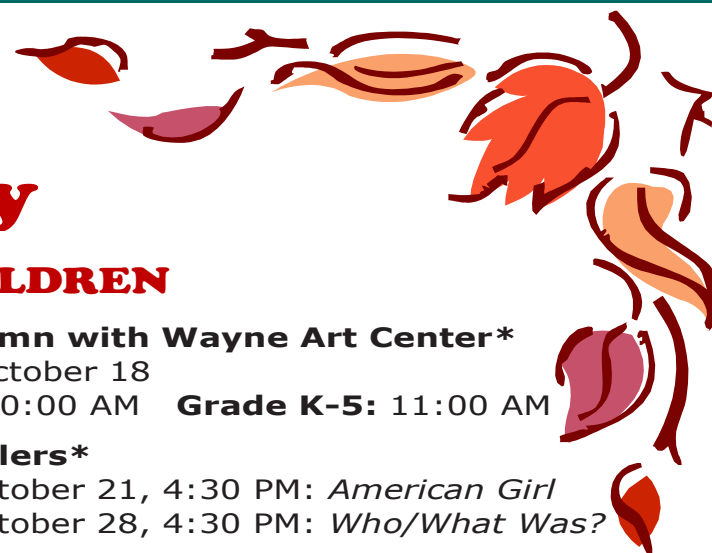
The holiday season is also a time to give back, and during Santa's stay, the Wayne Hotel will be collecting gifts to benefit Toys for Tots.

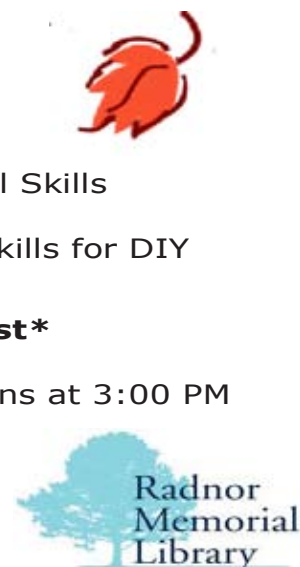

Your Vote - Your Voice - November 4th

To cast your ballot in the General Election on Tuesday, NOVEMBER 4th, you must be registered to vote by Monday, OCTOBER 6th.

In the 2014 election, you will be able to vote for governor, congressman, state senator and state representative. All the needed forms, applications and voting resources can be found at www.votespa.com. Many public libraries also have voter registration forms. Although the League of Women Voters continues to advocate for on-line registration, at this time, you still must mail or hand-deliver voter registration forms to the County Board of Elections at the Courthouse in Media. The address is printed on the back of the registration form.

If you are unable to go to the polls to vote in person because of illness, physical disability, or being absent from the area, you may vote by absentee ballot. The last day to register for an absentee ballot is OCTOBER 28th. The last day for completed ballots to be received by the county election office is OCTOBER 31st.

On Tuesday, NOVEMBER 4th, the polls are open from 7:00am to 8:00pm. Unless you are a first-time voter, you do not have to show a photo ID.

For many Radnor residents, newly configured legislative districts offer different choices and may require you go to a different polling location. To find out more about the candidates, your polling places, and other election information, please go to the League of Women Voters nonpartisan website, <http://www.smartvoter.org>. Be an informed voter. Let your voice be heard on Election Day, November 4th.



Good Voting Habits Start Early in Radnor Township

Members of the League of Women Voters of Radnor Township collaborated with administrators and staff at Radnor High School to introduce the Class of 2014 to the importance of voting by offering voter registration services during graduation rehearsal this spring.

As the seniors gathered for rehearsal on June 10, members of the school's Young Republicans and Young Democrats clubs joined League volunteers in circulating voter registration applications and providing information about how to register in Pennsylvania. Absentee ballot applications were also made available and completed registration forms were delivered to the Delaware County Government Center in Media that afternoon.

The League laid the groundwork for this event last September with a registration drive for first-time voters during the fall club fair at RHS. League members worked the tables and passed out registration forms to students who were eligible to vote or would turn 18 before the November election. Members of the school's Young Republicans and Young Democrats clubs provided the League with support and spread the word of their presence at the event. The drive resulted in more than 20 new registered voters.

The September event was coordinated by club sponsor and RHS English teacher Betsy McIlwain, with the support of the school's administration. The success of this event allowed the League to expand its efforts and hold the second registration event in June. The spring event was the result of collaboration between Radnor League president Roberta Winters, League members Lois Wysocki and McIlwain, Radnor High School principal Schellenger and senior class advisors who picked the best time and place to reach out to graduating seniors.

"A big dividend was heightening the awareness of students just passing through the hallway. Many stopped to ask what was going on and were eager to find out when they could register," said League member Anne Albright, who coordinated the spring effort. "The Radnor League hopes this will become an annual tradition where graduating students can count on voter registration being offered at the end of the year."

Albright was joined at the event by League members Anne Childs, Lynn Ellis, Jill Huentelman, Susan Newitt, Roberta Winters and Kathy Wright.

Most older adults want to retain their independence and stay in their homes for as long as possible. Taking the time to look at your current needs and anticipate future ones can help seniors achieve this goal.

1. Assess Your Needs

Determine what you need help with on a regular basis. Do you need help with jobs such as cleaning or home maintenance? Would it be easier to have groceries delivered? Is it becoming difficult or stressful to drive? Do you need help following a medication schedule or monitoring blood sugar? Evaluate your needs, and then connect with appropriate service providers.

2. Safety Begins at Home

Look at your home and assess whether you can live in it safely and comfortably. Add nightlights and remove throw rugs to prevent tripping. Hire someone to install handrails and grab bars to ensure you have a grip on stairs and in the bath. Consider installing an emergency response system. If your home can't be modified easily, be proactive and look for a home that is better suited to your needs such as a single-story or a senior community.

3. Find Local Support and Community Resources

Search government and non-profit organizations for activities and resources. Some nonprofits, such as Surrey Services, offer free informational and referral services. Identify these now rather than wait until you need them. Think about how you would get home, who would check your mail, take care of pets etc. if you needed emergency medical care. It is important to stay connected to your community. Look for area senior centers where you can enjoy camaraderie or volunteer.

4. Communicate with Family or Trusted Friends

Aging in place successfully requires planning and communication. Tell a family member or friend where you keep up-to-date list of doctors' names, medications, insurance information, power of attorney and other key documents. Know who you will contact in an emergency and let them know they are your emergency contact.

If you are unsure what services you need or what resources are available, a Geriatric Care can assess your situation and develop a customized plan. With planning, use of available services and proactive communication, the goal of remaining in your own home as you age is achievable.

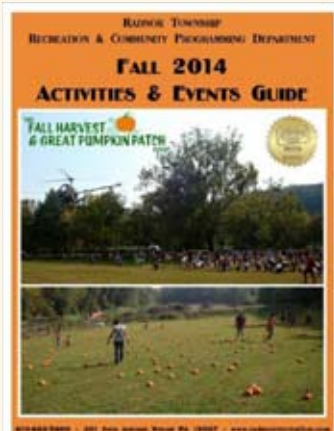

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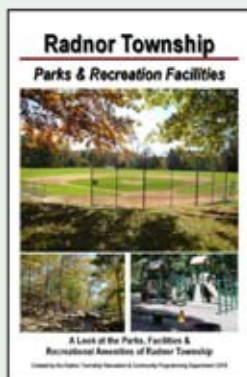

Gryphon Volleyball Clinic

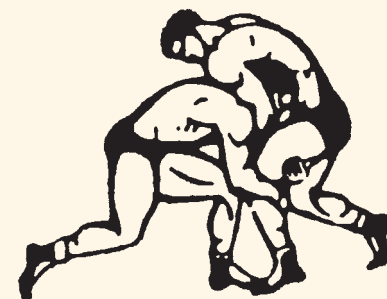

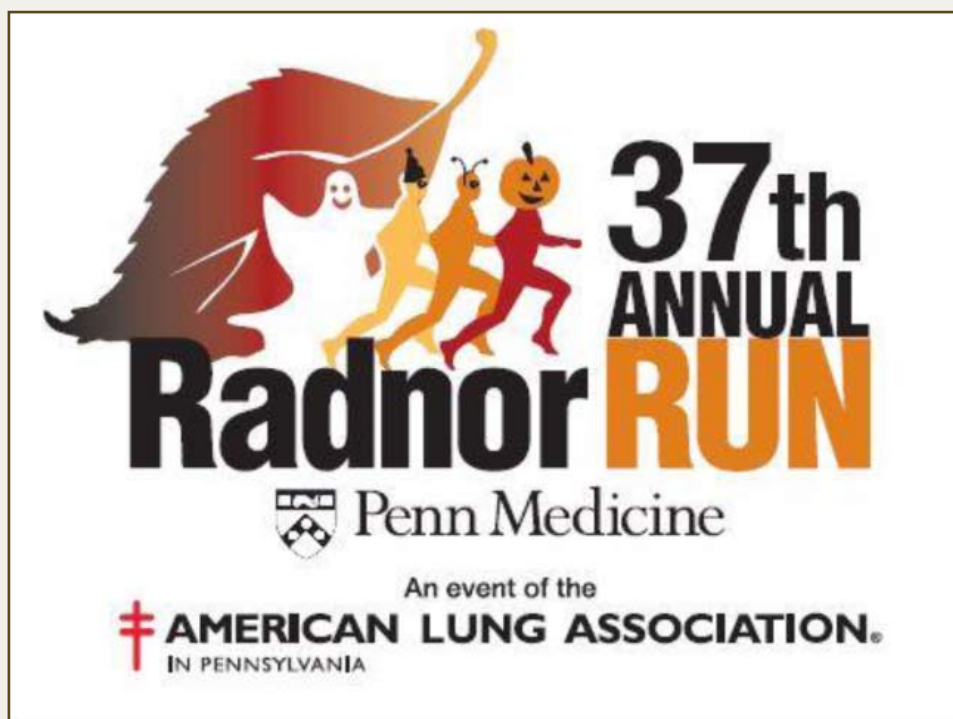
Radnor Aquatic Club



The Radnor Aquatic Club (RAC) is a local swim program designed for both competitive and beginner swimmers. RAC's more experienced swimmers participate in two swimming leagues: the Suburban Aquatic League and Mid-Atlantic Swimming (USA Swimming). Depending upon what group children are assigned to, practices are available 4-6 nights per week, generally from September to March. Children range in age from 6 years through high school.

For swimmers who are not quite team-ready, RAC offers two developmental programs, called "Piranha" and "Barracuda," which practice 2 times a week. These are smaller groups designed for optimal stroke instruction. Spring Clinics are also held in April and May for swimmers seeking further refinement or instruction.

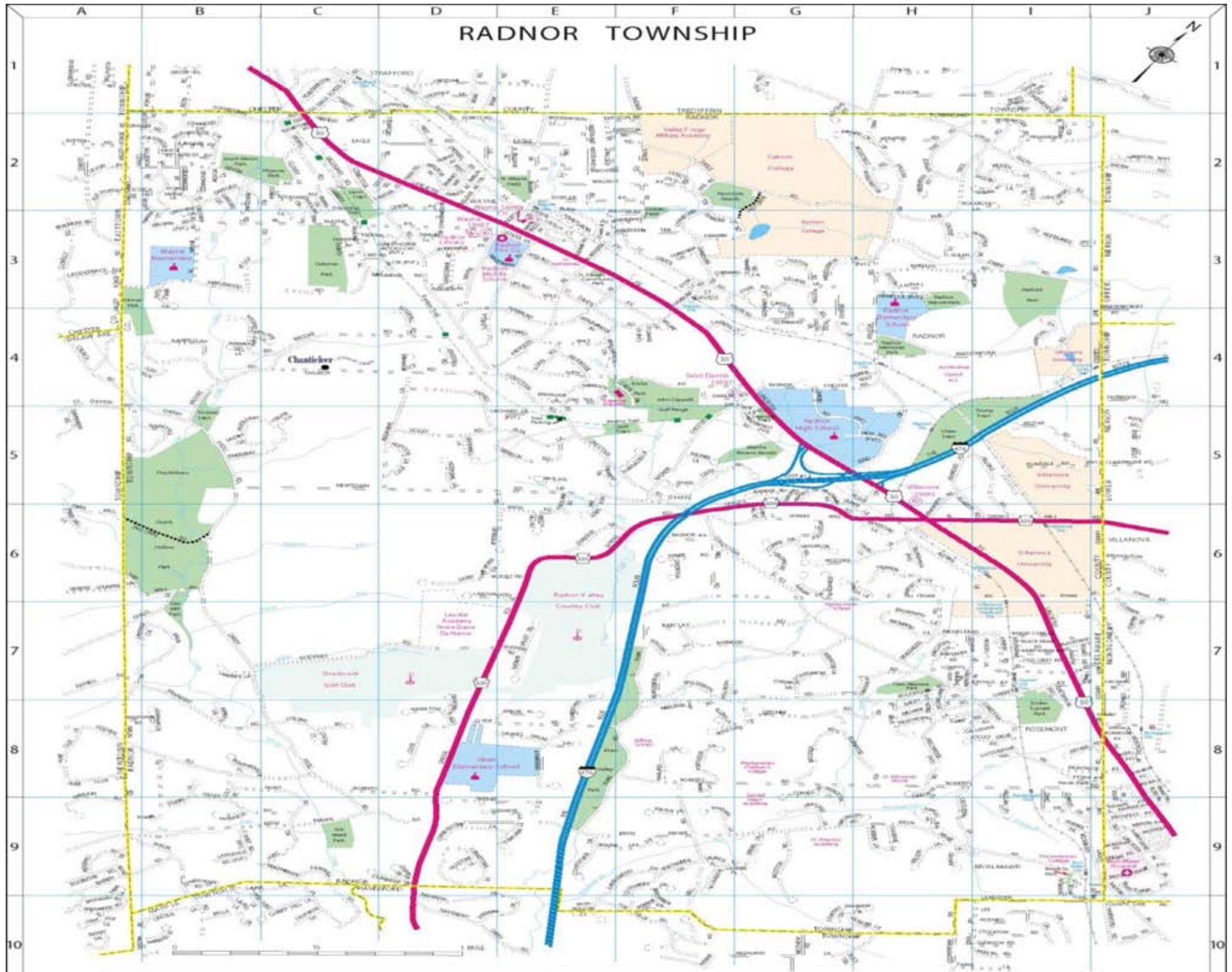
