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A Message from the Board of Commissioners

On behalf of myself and Ann-Michele, my predecessor as commissioner, I'd like to start by thanking the residents of the second ward for providing our family the honor of being your representative to the township government. It has been a privilege to serve you. Since one is not often provided the opportunity to thank people in public and this newsletter allows me to do that, on behalf of myself and my daughters, Claire and Elise, I want to thank our family and many friends for the support and friendship you have provided to us. These words can only modestly express how much we appreciate all that you have done for us. We are incredibly fortunate to have you as family and friends and thank you immensely.

Radnor Township residents are fortunate to live in a community that provides an extraordinary quality of life. While there are many issues we must face together, we have the community expertise to work together to find the best solutions. As stakeholders we need to try to find the time to give back to our community. We all get caught up in our daily lives, but we, as individuals, are responsible for the betterment of our community. We need new people to volunteer for our committees and boards in order to bring new vitality and ideas to the table. CODE RED In An Emergency - Be Prepared

The Radnor Township Board of Commissioners has contracted with Emergency Communications Network, providers of the CodeRED high-speed notification solution and the CodeRED Weather Warning Service. The CodeRED system provides Radnor Township officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire Township. This is a FREE service to Township residents!

Individuals and businesses are urged to visit Radnor Township's website at www.radnor.com and follow the link to the Emergency Notification Enrollment page. Those without internet access may call (610-688-5600) or stop by the Radnor Township Building, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne Monday to Friday, (8AM – 4PM) to supply their information. Required information includes first and last name, street address (physical address, no P.O. boxes), city, state, zip code, and primary phone number. Additional phone numbers can be entered as well.

WEATHER ALERT TYPES - Moments after a severe thunderstorm, flash flood, or tornado warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, messages will be sent to affected citizens.

CALLER ID - You will know the call is from CodeRED Weather Warning when you see 800-566-9780, 866-419-5000, for CodeRED Notification calls and 855-969-4636 for General calls (road closures, trash changes). If you would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back.

UŚES - The CodeRED Notification system will be used to send critical communications from evacuation notices to missing child alerts.

PRIVACY - Your contact information remains private and will only be used for community notifications.

OPT-IN TO RECEIVE ALERTS - You can register your home, cell or work phones, plus add optional texting and email alerts. Registered residents will have the ability to log into their account and change their notification choices at their convenience.

CHRISTMAS TREES TO BE RECYCLED - The Trash Department will pick up Christmas Trees on Wednesdays as part of the Yard Waste Recycling Days. Please bring all trees out to your front curb line where our men can pick them up. Trees will be recycled at Skunk Hollow and must be free from plastic bags, decorations, lights, garland, tree stands, etc. All holiday wreaths are to be put out with your regular trash.

PUBLIC WORKS

WINTER TIPS FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

 ${f R}$ est assured the Public Works Department will make every effort to have the snow removed from the streets as soon as possible. The Public Works Department is constantly monitoring the streets for slippery conditions. Please help us serve you better by following these Winter Tips:

** Please remove all parked cars from streets during snow removal operations. If you have a driveway, please use it. Snowplow drivers must plow very closely to parked vehicles to keep roads clear and safe for two-way traffic. Please be aware that the Township dump trucks are equipped with 10 foot plows. If you are parked across the street from another car, many times



- the trucks cannot get down your street due to parked vehicles. If you do not have a driveway, please keep parking to one side of your street as possible to allow the snow plow to make as large a path as possible.
- 🌞 If your car is parked in a cul-de-sac plows cannot clear all the snow, or salt the entire area. Again, please use your driveway.
- * Shovel snow as soon as possible after a storm before it has a chance to freeze and become a hardened mass of snow.
- 🌞 Do not plow or throw snow into the street. It will only be pushed back into your driveway.
- ** When following a salt truck be aware the driver may stop and back up at any time. Please give the salt truck room to work. When in doubt, stay back 100 feet from the vehicle and avoid mishaps.
- Place trash cans, bags and recycle bins off the street (either in the driveway or on the lawn). Plows are required to push snow back as far as possible in order to keep roadways wide and passable.
- Rear yard trash subscribers must have a clear path to their cans.
- ** It is the responsibility of all owners, tenants, and occupants to clear the snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of or along your premises within 24 hours of a snow fall.



STORMWATER RUNOFF

As many are aware, stormwater runoff affects the residents of Radnor Township in many ways. Visitors to our many parks and trails expect to see clean, clear streams, as do the many anglers that fish in our Township. Residents expect to drive safely on roads that are not flooded, and not have to fear their houses being flooded in severe rain events.

Working to that end, on October 14th, 2013, the Radnor Township Board of Commissioners passed Ordinance 2013-15, establishing a user fee for stormwater collection and management. This fee applies to all parcels in the Township; commercial, residential, and institutional. Residential properties are billed a flat fee based on lot size, and the other developed properties are based on actual impervious surface. There are three facets to the program: flood mitigation, repair and replacement of infrastructure, and MS4 compliance (water quality).





A resolution was also passed creating a Stormwater Management Advisory Committee, charged with the task of creating a credit policy as well as planning and implementation of the program. The ordinance provides for a dedicated funding stream that will be used to address these issues in a systematized fashion, with clearly defined short and long range goals. The implementation of this program will enhance the quality of life for all residents of Radnor Township.





CITIZEN SURVEY - Greenways & Open Space Network Plan for Radnor Township

Radnor Township is developing a Greenways and Open Space Network Plan. The plan will examine opportunities for new pedestrian and bicycle routes throughout the Township that will link open space, natural areas, parks, existing trails, schools, residential developments, places of business, regional transportation, other prominent Township destinations, and provide links to trails in adjoining municipalities. The plan will develop guidelines that enhance community sustainability and protect the Township's natural features. The plan is intended to provide Radnor Township residents with local non-motorized transportation alternatives and recreational opportunities. Obtaining feedback from the community about the use of greenways, open space, parks, and other Township destinations is vital to the planning process. Trash and residential recycling pick up is curbside unless residents choose the optional Rear Yard Trash Subscription. Residents may choose this convenient affordable service for 2014 for the annual fee of just \$420 per property.

2014 Rear Year Trash Subscription arrangements can be made in person at the Radnor Township Building Finance Department, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne or online at www.radnor.com and access the payment center. Once the application and payment is received by the Township, rear trash service will begin with the next regularly scheduled pick-up. The applications for rear yard trash service for February 1, 2014-January 31, 2015 should be returned with payment by January 27, 2014.

FINANCE

2014 Budget Highlights

Radnor Township is very proud of the services that it provides to the residents and businesses of this great community. Quite honestly, at the township level of government, taxpayers here get the most immediate return on their payment... We as stakeholders benefit daily from the services provided through the Township which include police, roads and sewers, parks and recreational amenities, garbage and recycling collection, leaf collection service, cleared roads during snow storms and heavy summer storms, community recreation events; and the list goes on. In addition to the services we provide, the Township also contributes significantly to the Fire Companies and Public Library. So how much does all of that cost when we get the tax bill?

The Township benefits from three primary revenue sources, each of which makes up a significant portion of our operating revenue. Those three revenues come from (1) Real Estate or Property Taxes, (2) Business Taxes or "Act 511 Taxes", and (3) Permits, Fines, Department Revenues. Chart 1 shows the three revenue categories, and what percentage they represent to the total revenue. The real estate taxes are pretty straight forward: The Board sets the millage rate annually, which is then applied to our home's assessed value, as set by the County. For 2014, the Township's tax rate will remain the same as it has been going back to 2012. The primary reason why the Township has been able to keep the property tax rate the same is because of the significant growth in business taxes ("Act 511 Taxes). Radnor's strong business tax base is critical to keeping the overall property tax rate as low as possible. With an expanding business tax base, less pressure is put on the property tax to balance the Township's annual budget. Finally, departments such as Community Development and Recreation generate a significant amount of revenue through permit revenue or direct user fees, which help to offset the costs of those departments. Without the direct user fees or permitting revenue, those departments would require a larger tax subsidy to operate; which would require higher taxes.

Finally, it is also important to understand that the Township represents only 12% of your total property tax obligation. The School District and County make up the other 88%, as broken down in chart 3.

This type of information is available by going to the Township's web site / Finance Department / Financial Reporting & Budgeting page where you will find current and past budgets, audited financial statements and monthly finance update reports. So how much do we pay for these services? Chart 2 distributes the 2014 property tax rate or millage rate, based on the average assessed value of \$318,000, by how much is needed to fund these departments, after direct revenues are taken into consideration. Keep this information handy when you receive your real estate tax bill in February to understand how your contributions are returned by way of these various services.

Winter Driving Tips from AAA

Severe weather can be both frightening and dangerous for automobile travel. Motorists should know the safety rules for dealing with winter road emergencies. AAA reminds motorists to be cautious while driving in adverse weather. For more information on winter driving, the association offers the How to Go on Ice and Snow (http://exchange.aaa.com/wp-content/uploads/2012/12/ AAA-How-to-Go-Ice-Snow.pdf) brochure, available through most AAA offices. Also available is a Guide to Wet-Weather Driving Techniques (http://exchange.aaa.com/wp-content/uploads/2012/09/ Get-a-Grip.pdf).

AAA recommends the following winter driving tips:

- Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.
- Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- Make certain your tires are properly inflated.
- Never mix radial tires with other tire types.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-up.
- If possible, avoid using your parking brake in cold, rainy and snowy weather.
- Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).
- Always look and steer where you want to go.
- Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle.

Tips for long-distance winter trips:

- Watch weather reports prior to a long-distance drive or before driving in isolated areas. Delay trips when especially bad weather is expected. If you must leave, let others know your route, destination and estimated time of arrival.
- Always make sure your vehicle is in peak operating condition by having it inspected by a AAA Approved Auto Repair facility.
- Keep at least half a tank of gasoline in your vehicle at all times.
- Pack a cellular telephone with your local AAA's telephone number, plus blankets, gloves, hats, food, water and any needed medication in your vehicle.
- If you become snow-bound, stay with your vehicle. It provides temporary shelter and makes it easier for rescuers to locate you.
 Don't try to walk in a severe storm. It's easy to lose sight of your vehicle in blowing snow and become lost.
- Don't over exert yourself if you try to push or dig your vehicle out of the snow.
- Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna or place a cloth at the top of a rolled up window to signal distress. At night, keep the dome light on if possible. It only uses a small amount of electricity and will make it easier for rescuers to find you.
- Make sure the exhaust pipe isn't clogged with snow, ice or mud.
 A blocked exhaust could cause deadly carbon monoxide gas to leak into the passenger compartment with the engine running.
- Use whatever is available to insulate your body from the cold.

This could include floor mats, newspapers or paper maps.

• If possible run the engine and heater just long enough to remove the chill and to conserve gasoline.

Tips for driving in the snow:

- Accelerate and decelerate slowly. Applying the gas slowly to accelerate is the best method for regaining traction and avoiding skids. Don't try to get moving in a hurry. And take time to slow down for a stoplight. Remember: It takes longer to slow down on icy roads.
- Drive slowly. Everything takes longer on snow-covered roads. Accelerating, stopping, turning nothing happens as quickly as on dry pavement. Give yourself time to maneuver by driving slowly.
- The normal dry pavement following distance of three to four seconds should be increased to eight to ten seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.
- Know your brakes. Whether you have antilock brakes or not, the best way to stop is threshold breaking. Keep the heel of your foot on the floor and use the ball of your foot to apply firm, steady pressure on the brake pedal.
- Don't stop if you can avoid it. There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling. If you can slow down enough to keep rolling until a traffic light changes, do it.
- Don't power up hills. Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads
 just starts your wheels spinning. Try to get a little inertia going
 before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top.
 As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed
 down hill as slowly as possible.
- Don't stop going up a hill. There's nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.
- Stay home. If you really don't have to go out, don't. Even if you can drive well in the snow, not everyone else can. Don't tempt fate: If you don't have somewhere you have to be, watch the snow from indoors.

NEW TRAFFIC PATTERN:

- Conestoga Road (eastbound) @ Radnor-Chester Road-Radnor Township
- Starting Monday, November 4, 2013, Penndot has given Radnor Township Police permission to prohibit left turn movement onto Radnor Chester Road from 7:00 a.m. -9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. -6:00 p.m. Monday-Friday Only.
- The Radnor Police-Highway Patrol Unit feels this will improve the congestion at this intersection by restricting turning movement during peak hours. The traffic light at 320 and Sproul Rd will be adjusted to handle the new flow of traffic.

Why Should My Home Have Smoke Alarms?

A smoke alarm can save your life and those of your loved ones. They are a very important means of preventing house and apartment fire fatalities by providing an early warning signal -- so you and your family can escape. Smoke alarms are one of the best safety devices you can buy and install to protect yourself, your family, and your home.

What Types of Smoke Alarms Are Available?

There are many different brands of smoke alarms available on the market but they fall under two basic types: ionization and photoelectric. Ionization alarms sound more quickly when a flaming, fast-moving fire occurs. Photoelectric alarms are quicker at sensing smoldering, smoky fires. There are also combination smoke alarms that combine ionization and photoelectric into one unit, called dual sensor smoke alarms. Because both ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms are better at detecting distinctly different yet potentially fatal fires, and because homeowners cannot predict what type of fire might start in a home, the United States Fire Administration recommends the installation

of both ionization and photoelectric or dual sensor smoke alarms. In addition to the basic types of alarms, there are alarms made to meet the needs of people with hearing disabilities. These alarms may use strobe lights that flash and/or vibrate to assist in alerting those who are unable to hear standard smoke alarms when they sound.

Where Do I Put Them?

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement. Many fatal fires begin late at night or in the early morning. For extra safety, install smoke alarms both inside and outside sleeping areas. Since smoke and many deadly gases rise, installing your smoke alarms at the proper level will provide you with the earliest warning possible. Always follow the manufacturer's installation instructions.

Where Can I Get Smoke Alarms?

Many hardware, home supply, or retail stores carry smoke alarms.

Are Smoke Alarms Hard to Install?

If your smoke alarms are hard wired into the electrical system --you will need to have a qualified electrician do the initial installation or install replacements. For battery-powered smoke alarms, all you will need for installation is a screwdriver. Some brands are self-adhesive and will stick easily to the wall or ceiling where they are placed. For all smoke alarm installations, be sure you follow the manufacturer's instructions because there are differences between the various brands.

How Do I Keep My Smoke Alarm Working?

If you have a smoke alarm with batteries:

- Smoke Alarms powered by long-lasting batteries are designed to replace the entire unit according to manufacturer's instructions.
- In standard type battery powered smoke alarms, the batteries need to be replaced at least once per year and the whole unit should be replaced every 8-10 years.
- In hard-wired, battery backup smoke alarms, the batteries need to be checked monthly, and replaced at least once per year. The
 entire unit should be replaced every 8-10 years.

Preparing Your Home for Winter

As winter approaches, our thoughts turn to other activities as we plan for the annual hibernation to the indoors. This is also a good time to plan a safe hibernation for your house as well. The constant change in the weather can have a significant effect on your house that, if left unchecked, may result in major repairs in the future.

Now is the time to inspect your house for anything that does not appear to be normal. Things to look for include loose siding, missing or torn shingles, broken or sticking doors, missing caulking around windows or any other item that will leave your home exposed to the elements. Now is the time to start addressing these items before the cold weather sets in and these items are forgotten.



You may also want to take a look at other items that are often overlooked until it is too late. One important item is your home heating system. Most people who are not on a maintenance program forget to have service performed until well into the heating season when the furnace decides to stop working. Unfortunately, this is the time that most heating contractors are busiest and you may have to wait for service. Avoid the headache and plan ahead.

Items such as your water heater may need your attention as well as other home appliances. Remember to check and make sure water pipes are properly insulated and not exposed to freezing temperatures. Be sure that leaves and debris do not obstruct water flow from gutters and downspouts. Water that freezes and is allowed to back up rooftops often provides you with unwelcome leaks. The lists are endless, but remember your home is a major investment - take good care of it.

A RADNOR TOWNSHIP TREASURE TURNS 100

There is a 100-year-old treasure residing in Radnor Township, and her name is Sammie Ruth Fletcher. The newly-minted centenarian celebrated her birthday at a dinner with family and friends on October 12. Much has been written about Mrs. Fletcher since her arrival in the township. She is most noted for bringing together United Nations representatives from several countries to experience life in the United States by visiting the homes of average Americans here in Radnor in 1954.

Though many years have passed since that historic event, Sammie Ruth still speaks enthusiastically and proudly about the United Nations visit. Through her involvement with international affairs for the League of Women Voters (she is still a League member!) she first generated the idea of inviting delegates from the U.N. to come and experience life in America. She first sold the idea of hosting the delegates to the League, then to Radnor Township and finally to the United Nations itself. She made an appointment with the chief of protocol at the United Nations to arrange the visits for anyone who wanted to come. She made arrangements for travel and accommodations, and once the visitors had arrived, she hosted a dinner for the delegates—with help from upperclassmen at Radnor High School, who served as waiters at the affair.

Locally, Sammie Ruth was a board member of the Radnor League of Women Voters for 30 years; she was also actively involved with the Radnor Historical Society and the Radnor United Methodist Church, where she taught Sunday school and she volunteered frequently at the former Rosemont Elementary School.

Though she doesn't get out much anymore, Sammie Ruth remains actively engaged in the world around her. She is not a fan of television, but is an avid reader, preferring biographies and books on travel. "Something about the world to increase my knowledge and understanding of it. I'm just curious," she says. "Yes, I've had an interesting life, but I haven't accomplished much," Sammie Ruth says modestly. The people of Radnor Township would surely differ with her on that account.





Are You a Hospital Inpatient or on Observation Status? If you have Medicare - Ask!

Did you know that even if you stay in the hospital overnight, you might still be considered an "outpatient"? More and more often, patients are staying overnight in the hospital without admission. This is referred to as observation status. Your hospital

status (whether the hospital considers you an "inpatient" or "outpatient") affects how much you pay for hospital services (like X-rays, drugs, and lab tests) and may also affect whether Medicare will cover care you may need after your hospitalization such as home care or in a rehabilitation facility.

You're an inpatient starting the day you're formally admitted to the hospital with a doctor's order. The day before you're discharged is your last inpatient day. You're an outpatient if you're getting emergency department services, observation services, outpatient surgery, lab tests, or X-rays, and the doctor hasn't written an order to admit you to the hospital as an inpatient. In these cases, you're an outpatient even if you spend the night at the hospital.

Note: Observation services are hospital outpatient services given to help the doctor decide if the patient needs to be admitted as an inpatient or can be discharged. Observation services may be given in the Emergency Department or another area of the hospital.

If you're in the hospital more than a few hours, always ask your doctor at the hospital or the hospital staff if you're an inpatient or an outpatient. If you have questions, or for more information please contact Surrey's Home Services department at 610-647-9840

Skunk Hollow Community Garden *by Sara Pilling*

Skunk Hollow Community Garden, located at Willows Park, is a garden organized by Radnor residents, for Radnor residents, with all maintenance by the members. The garden embraces using only natural gardening methods and in reaching out to others, educating the young [and not-so-young] with natural gardening methods and with fresh vegetables.

In spite of a long, cool spring and late summer temperaturess, excessive rainfall, 4-5 heat waves, followed by a month of 'drought' as well as a plethora of invasive insects, our harvest in 2013 was remarkable. Once again the garden provided Philabundance with vegetables, equal to a dollar value of \$1448.00 With 70% response to our survey, 132 persons regularly ate the harvest; gardeners shared their veggies with 128 other families.



Five school groups came to learn and work in the garden, as did students from Villanova University and staff & friends of Whole Foods-Devon. Most recently, 8th graders from Delaware Valley Friends came to work with 6 gardeners in building their winter hoop gardens. To quote their teacher,

"We will be relating the tasks involved with the project to some of the executive functioning skills that students have been practicing in their executive functions lab. Specifically, students will be using a strategy called "Using Your Future Glasses". This strategy will help students plan and execute a project by having them visualize and write out what needs to happen prior to and during the project, as well as having students discuss and visualize what the final product of the project will look like". All had a fine time and the project was very successful.

Sara Pilling has been living the green life. An environmentalist, horticulturist and advocate for local conservation efforts, she has championed the preservation of open space, conscientious land use and sustainable, organic gardening. In December the Radnor League of Women Voters honored Sara for her many years of work on behalf of responsible conservation with the League's 2013 Civic Participation Award.

Sara's background is rich and varied. A graduate of Goucher College, she has an associate's degree in horticulture and landscape design from Temple University-Ambler campus; is a graduate of the Barnes Arboretum School of Horticulture and earned a master of science in community organizing from Eastern University. She counts among her credits more than 20 years of service in Haiti, where she established non-profit scholarship to allow 60 Haitian children to attend school and 200 young women to learn life skills of embroidery and fashion.

Closer to home, Sara's notable efforts have included serving on the core committee to save the Willows Cottage; working to establish the Rain Garden for Macrone Park, through a grant from the League's Water Resources Education Network and helping in the effort to "Save Garrett Hill." She is perhaps known best, however, as the co-chair and unofficial 'COO' of the Skunk Hollow Community Garden.

To say that Sara is a 'garden dynamo' is probably an understatement. Her "we can do this" mantra was the impetus behind the creation of the Community Garden and has been the ongoing reason for its success. She has built alliances with nearly everyone in the township on behalf of the garden, and has done everything from buying supplies to garnering the garden's tax-exempt status. Her horticultural expertise includes an encyclopedia of knowledge about pesticide-free vegetable gardening.

Sara Pilling's endeavors on behalf of the Garden have been widely praised and her name is one of the many that have become synonymous with a cleaner, greener way of life in Radnor Township.

Witch Hazel Folklore

Walking around Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens you will see numerous native trees and shrubs. One in particular is the Witch Hazel. They are low maintenance plants that bloom when most are dormant. Their flowers are scented with a citrus scent and have great foliage color in the autumn. Along with all those attributes our native Witch Hazel Hamamelis virginiana has medicinal properties. The leaves and bark of our native Witch Hazel were used as an astringent on the skin, first, by the Native Americans. Today it is used in a wide variety of skin care products.

So how did the Witch Hazel get its name? There are a couple of tales to tell, one based in folklore and one based in science. Folklore states that Witch Hazels have magical medicinal properties. When Europeans first came to this country they adopted remedies for ailments from the Native Americans, like boiling the leaves and bark of the Witch Hazel. This tree's healing image became famous enough that people believed it would protect them from witches. Witch Hazel is actually used as an ingredient in many witchcraft potions. Botanists have their own theory. They believe that "Witch" came from the word "Wych". It is an old English word that means bending. Witch Hazels are small and have pliant stems so it is also likely that the name came from the more scientific theory.





Whatever the origin of the name, Witch Hazel has become an important tree not only for its medicinal uses but also as a favorite landscape tree. With beautiful fall foliage and scented flowers in October and November, it's hard not to stop and appreciate this beauty. Our native Witch Hazels can be found throughout the northeast along rivers, in locations with rich soil and here at Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens.


Nurturing Natural Bird Food in the Cold Seasons



Birdfeeding is enjoyed by millions of people across the country and by many in Radnor Township, an official Audubon Bird Town. Seeing a variety of birds close to our windows, especially in winter, provides hours of viewing pleasure. But there are ways to go beyond simple birdfeeding while providing natural food and protection during the winter. Here are two:

- 1. Stop cleaning up: A landscape that contains leaf litter, spent perennials and other "dead" elements actually host countless overwintering insects (including pupating caterpillars!) that will eventually feed the birds. Entomologist Doug Tallamy writes, "The easiest way to preserve over-wintering insect populations is to relax our neatnik standards whenever possible." That's good news for many of us!
- 2. Plant native fruiting shrubs and seed producing trees which will provide cover and a food source into late fall and winter: Chokeberry, winterberry holly, dogwood, pines and birch are good choices.





So despite a seemingly lifeless backyard, winter can be one of the most active times for birds looking for refuge in your private sanctuary.



Recreation Winter Safety Tips



The following tips for staying safe during winter recreational activities are being offered:

- Avoid areas with fixed objects such as trees, posts, and fences
- Always stay in control and be able to stop or avoid other people or objects
- People ahead of you have the right of way. It is your responsibility to avoid them
- Do not stop where you obstruct a trail or are not visible from above
- Whenever starting downhill or merging onto a trail or slope, look uphill and yield to others
- Observe all posted signs and warnings. Keep out of closed areas. Construction or building of ramps or jumps is not permitted
- Park in designated areas only
- No motorized snow vehicles are permitted in the parks
- Do not use trails or slopes that end in a street, drop-off, parking lot, river or pond
- Observe park hours dawn to dusk. NO night winter recreation activities are permitted
- Parents are encouraged to supervise their children

Radnor Township's parks can be a fun place to enjoy sledding with friends and family. For your safety, please obey Township regulations concerning park hours, parking in designated areas, and restricted "No sledding" areas. All winter recreational activities in Radnor Township Parks are "At Your Own Risk."

PACT FOR ANIMALS - ON A MISSION TO KEEP FAMILIES AND THEIR PETS TOGETHER!

Have you ever wondered what happens to the family pet when a family has a dire emergency and no one to watch after their beloved pet? Sadly, when an emergency circumstance or temporary crisis occurs, many pet owners are left with only one choice - to surrender their beloved pets to a shelter and never see them again. Owner surrenders are a huge problem for local area shelters and rescues that are already overcrowded, and less than half of all animals that enter shelters leave them alive.

In 2010, Buzz Miller, a local resident, founded PACT for Animals and set out to support soldiers going on active deployment, as well as hospitalized children and individuals, who have no family or friends to take care of their companion pets during times of need. Since PACT's first fosters, PACT has doubled its placements every year!

PACT's Military and Hospital Foster Programs save pets from uncertain futures, keep them safe, and reunite them with their families once the family emergency is over. PACT works directly with military service members to match their "best friends" with appropriate foster homes that will give them care and love while their caregivers are on active deployment. PACT's local, Hospital Foster Program, provides home foster care for the pets of children and adults faced with medical emergencies in the Delaware Valley. Families who stay with a hospitalized child or family member can depend on PACT to care for their companion animals when all other possibilities have been exhausted.

Prior to PACT's two foster programs, many individuals experiencing a temporary crisis were forced to make a heartbreaking decision and surrender their beloved pets to overcrowded shelters, where they would be put up for adoption, or worse, euthanized, never to be seen again. Can you imagine being forced to make that painful decision?

PACT is the only organization of its kind in the United States saving beloved pets from being needlessly surrendered, while giving their owners the peace of mind that they will eventually be

reunited with their "best friends." This non-profit is making a local and national difference every day, by saving animals from abandonment and preventing the heartache that comes from having to lose a beloved pet. Best of all, PACT is proudly located in the Delaware Valley!
