

A Message from the Board of Commissioners

I am pleased to have the opportunity to bring residents and businesses up to date on activities and issues involving Radnor Township government.

Stormwater— As most everyone in the township knows, in early 2014 a stormwater fee went into effect to pay for projects that will help prevent damaging floods. The fee ordinance was enacted after our outside consultant studied other Pennsylvania municipalities and flood vulnerability points in the township and presented to our Board of Commissioners the benefits of passing a fee, rather than raising taxes. Currently, stormwater controls are funded out of general tax revenue: residences and for-profit businesses foot the bill even though tax-exempt organizations contribute a substantial amount of the runoff. By enacting a fee system the township can require all property owners to pay, including universities, private schools, religious institutions and others, many of whom have substantial non-porous surfaces on their property.

In March, our Board of Commissioners moved another step closer to approving specific flood-control projects by hiring an expert in water resources management, CH2M Hill, Inc. With guidance from our citizens Stormwater Advisory Committee, chaired by Heather Gill, the company is on a fast track to study the three watersheds in the township and to recommend to us specific remediation projects. At the top of the list are chronic flooding conditions in front of the Radnor firehouse, on Iven Avenue at the Police Station and at the intersection of Banbury Way and Francis Ave. We also are moving ahead on an improved flood-control basin at the south end of North Wayne Field with expected additional input on esthetic features from residents living nearby who enjoy the considerable benefits of the park.

Government Efficiency— We are now in our third year of no tax increases for Radnor Township government yet we finished 2014 in better shape financially than we did in 2013—and 2013 was a large improvement over 2012.

In February the Board of Commissioners voted to refinance our 2009 general obligation bonds in light of the very favorable interest rate environment. By doing so we realized present value savings, net after all costs, of \$345,099.60, or 7.064% of refunded principal. The annual debt service savings will be \$32,000 to \$34,000 per year through 2026 and we will now be available to pay debt service on the bonds we used to purchase 71.03 acres of Ardrossan Farm in December 2014. We hit the bond markets at a very fortuitous time and achieved quite a low all-in-cost rate of 3.552%. The township's bond rating from Moody's Investors Service continues to hold at Aa1, up from Aaa in 2007 and Aa2 in 2009.

Our employee count is low—120 people, down from 150 several years ago. It is a credit to Bob Zienkowski, Township Manager, who has understood that we can run government and deliver services at a high level while saving money through personnel reductions. We will continue to reserve significant sums for pension and employee post-tenure benefit liabilities (health care and life insurance). Although these obligations range from \$60 million to above \$200 million, our obligation is to pay for them over many, many years—and not discharge them as if they were due tomorrow. In the past three budgets, we combined a "pay-as-you-go" system each month with the set-aside of significant amounts for the future. Unfunded liabilities are descending at a healthy pace.

CivicReady

This notification website is separate from the Township website but they are still connected together. Please visit our notification website at radnor.civicready.com where you may sign up for Emergency Alerts, General Notifications, Weather Alerts and Other Notifications.

Radnor Township Notifications include but are not limited to:

Emergency Alerts: Evacuation Notices, Flooding Alerts, and Missing Child Reports.

General Notifications: Trash Scheduling Changes, Township Events and Crime Alerts.

Weather Alerts: Blizzard, Earthquake, Flood, Severe Thunderstorm and Tornado Warnings.

Other Notifications: The Center for Disease Control, the Department of State and the World Health Organization.

A subscriber who has provided us with a voice number will be contacted via a pre-recorded voice message, a subscriber who has provided us with an email address will be contacted via an email message and a subscriber who has provided us with a SMS number will be contacted via text message. All messages will be about the nature of the event as well as proper response strategies that the public should undertake.

Although the Township has provided CivicReady with a general database of Radnor Township home and business phone numbers, residents are urged to subscribe all of their phone numbers (home and cell) to ensure that they receive proper emergency voice notifications.

Weather alerts are provided by the National Weather Service. Alerts automatically inform citizens in the path of severe weather moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. Please note that if the National Weather Service issues a severe thunderstorm warning for your area at 3:00am and you checked the severe thunderstorm notification check box you will receive a call around that time. Other alerts are also provided by outside parties and are held to the same example as the weather alerts. Options are available to choose when you wish to receive these alerts.



2015 Yard Waste Drop-Off Program and Curbside **Yard Waste Collection Program**

Curbside Yard Waste Collection Program

The Public Works Department collects residential yard waste at curbside on Wednesdays (except Holiday weeks); please have it at the curb by 7:00 a.m.

- Grass clippings will not be collected. It is recommended that the grass clippings be left on your lawn to decay or be composted on your property.
- Tree trimmings, sticks, and brush should be tied in bundles no more than two feet in diameter and no longer than 3 feet in length and 4 inches in diameter. For the safety of our employees, sticks and brush will not be collected that is sticking out of a container.
- All yard waste must be placed in bio-degradable bags or a 35 gallon refuse container – contents of containers should not exceed 50 lbs. No Plastic Bags. Yard waste placed in plastic bags, or mixed with any trash will not be picked up.
- The collection is for bio-degradable yard waste. Please do not put out cans of dirt
- Bags & Bundles should be placed at Curbside by 7:00 a.m. on Wednesday mornings.
- The Township will take up to 10 bundles/bags of yard waste per collection.
- Burning of sticks and yard waste is not permitted in Radnor Township.

Yard Waste Drop-Off Program

Township residents may drop off yard waste and brush (tree limbs no longer than 3 feet and no bigger than 4 inches in diameter, leaves, plant materials, grass clippings, etc.) at Skunk Hollow Park, located on Darby-Paoli Road between Newtown and Sawmill Roads, ½ mile east of the Willows, between 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the third Friday of each month except November and December when the Township crews are collecting leaves.





Radnor Township has Another Year of Financial Improvement



The Township's 2014 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report ("CAFR") shows that the Township's Net Position improved in 2014 by \$1,019,813. This marks the fourth straight year that the net position has improved. In fact, in 2010, the Township had a net deficiency of (\$10,584,071) and the net position for 2014 is \$4.004.689 as shown in graph 1. The Statement of Net Position presents information on the entire Township's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Township is improving or deteriorating. Significant contributors to the financial improvement have



been the Township's asset growth over the past four years, while controlling liability growth. More specifically, assets have grown from \$60 million in 2011 to \$81 million in 2014 while liabilities have only grown from \$71 million in 2011 to \$79 million in 2014. The two primary assets that have grown the most are the Township's Cash and Investments along with Capital Assets, more specifically, land. Cash has grown from \$12 million to almost \$19 million from 2011 to 2014. The growth in this category ties directly to the Board of Commissioner's commitment to restoring the cash reserves in the General Fund while at the same time, setting aside excess revenues to offset a portion of the Township's longterm liabilities. The growth in the capital assets is most significantly the result of the acquisition of the 71 acres of open space at the Ardrossan estate, which added \$11.6 million in 2014.

The most significant underlying reason for the financial improvement over the past four years is the performance of the Act 511 tax revenue. Act 511 taxes consist of the realty transfer tax, business privilege and mercantile taxes, as well as the local services tax. Each of these sources of revenue represent a different look at Radnor's economy as the realty transfer tax is a reflection of the real estate market, business privilege and mercantile represent gross activity in Radnor's businesses, and the local services tax represents employment in Radnor. Over the past four years, this category of revenue for the Township has grown from \$10 million in 2011 to over \$14.5 million in 2014 (see Graph 2). The revenue growth doesn't include two one-time business privilege payments that added an additional \$9.5 million to the Township's treasuries in 2013. Those dollars were put to work by the Board



of Commissioners to fund pension liabilities, capital projects, stormwater and operational efficiency projects.

Complementing the revenue growth has been the Township's approach in spending those proceeds. It has been widely presented that the Township is carrying unfunded pension and post-employment benefit liabilities to the tune of \$105 million (2014 CAFR). Instead of pouring these added revenues into new program / projects, the Board of Commissioners has been steadfast in allocating these dollars to addressing existing issues. Specifically, the Board has allocated

over \$3.5 million to begin funding the post-employment benefit obligations and have overfunded the pension plans by \$3.2 million over the past three years. In fact, the Board has also adopted a formal funding plan that aims to set aside funding to address today's unfunded portion, while also prefunding tomorrow's liabilities. The goal: To prevent future generations of Radnor residents from having the burden of funding these liabilities. The other plan factor is reducing or eliminating the benefit for future employees. To that end, the unionized non-safety staff stepped up during the last contract negotiation and agreed that all new hires after January 1, 2013 receive no pension or post-employment benefits. Next, the Board has passed legislation mandating that the General Fund maintain, at a minimum, cash reserves equal to no less than 15% of annual expenditures. At the same time, the Township has capitalized on the continued low-interest bond market and refinanced its outstanding debt four times since 2010. Included in the 2013 refunding was the elimination of the costly "SWAP" debt that the Township initially entered into back in 2005. Those refinancing transactions will save the Township an average of \$188,000 per year through 2037, which equates to a cash savings of over \$5.0 million.

The Township still has financial hurdles to climb, but the results of the past four years have shown that if the Township remains focused to addressing these issues, it can be done. The Township's 2014 CAFR, along with the 2011, 2012 and 2013 reports are all available on the Township's website, under the Finance Department page. The Police Department and Parking Unit have installed forty-four (44) Kiosks/Parking Management System from DEVO Associates LLC Parking Kiosks, for use under the Parking Enforcement Unit of the Police Department. Unlike the way parking has been managed by mainly parking meters until now, the latest Kiosk system will be utilizing the newest and most modern system available for parking enforcement, management, payment methods, phone payment capability, grace period features, and most notably, advertising options and public message features. The pay by space system will be a new era in communication with the Radnor Community and local businesses. These units will be environmental friendly as they reduce paper waste and are solar powered.

The new Kiosks will be certified by Delaware County, Division of Weights and Measures. All of the existing meters and poles will be removed once the Kiosks are in place. This will create a positive visual look in the area where the meter and poles were previously located in the Township. The Police Department has been looking for a Kiosk, which will allow Parking Enforcement Officers to work more efficiently while providing the highest level of service to the community. The Radnor Police Department recognizes that effective parking management is a high priority for the entire business and residential community.

Rental Licensing Permits Due June 30th

Are landlords required to register rental units?

Yes. Property owners are required to register rental units with the Township and pay an annual fee based upon the number of dwelling units in a building. Beginning in mid-May, the Township will be mailing their Rental License renewal applications issued by the Department of Community Development to the owner of a rental unit under the requirements of Chapter 226 - Rental Housing. Property Maintenance

In order to keep Radnor Township an attractive place to live, work, and play, the Township has adopted minimum requirements for Property Maintenance including mowing or trimming grass and other vegetation on private property.

Are Use and Occupancy Permits required for re-sales?

Yes. Use and Occupancy Permits are required for all re-sales. Permits are also issued for new homes, apartments, home-based businesses, for change of all non-residential/commercial tenants, and new commercial structures. No property shall be occupied or used by a new owner as a result of transfer by title, deed, or other legal means until a Certificate of Use and Occupancy has been issued by the Township. Any code violations will need to be addressed.

How tall can your grass or weeds be before it is a violation?



A violation exists when the weeds or grass are more than 12 inches in height (or more than 12 inches in length if matted down). A violation also exists if there is any vegetation that is poisonous to the touch, such as poison ivy, poison oak, or poison sumac. Other vegetation such as vines, saplings or shrubs may also be a violation if it exceeds the 12-inch height regulation and is clearly uncultivated. Please note that a clearing permit may be required depending on the size and type of vegetation being removed. Please contact the Township for assistance.

Who is responsible for correcting the violation?

The violation should be corrected by the person responsible for the maintenance of the property. In most cases, this is the property owner, but it may be the tenant or owner representative.

What area must be mowed?

In addition to the yard or lawn area, you must mow

any area between your property and the paved area of all adjacent streets, including ditches, easements, alleys and unpaved right-of-way. Storm drainage swales, ditches or easements are also the maintenance responsibility of adjacent property owners.

What are some of the other Property Maintenance Issues that I need to be aware of?

The Township has adopted the International Property Maintenance Code, which requires all exterior property and premises to be maintained in a clean, safe, and sanitary condition. In addition, the Code requires all structures to be maintained in good repair, structurally sound, and sanitary so as to not pose a threat to the public health, safety, or welfare.

All garbage, trash, and refuse should be kept in appropriate containers with tight-fitting lids to avoid attracting rodents and other vector. The use of bird feeders should be monitored as excess bird food deposited on the ground could attract rodents. In addition, areas of stagnate water such as bird baths, unused tires, flower pots, buckets, low-lying areas in a yard, or ponds without a circulation system can be breeding grounds for mosquitoes including those that can carry the West Nile Virus.

If I hire someone to perform my property maintenance, do they need to be licensed?

In some cases, your contractor will need to be licensed with the Township. Check with the Community Development Department to determine specific licensing requirements. The public is encouraged to consider the following guidelines when contemplating hiring anyone for a home improvement project:

- Verify that the contractor is registered with the State and/or Township. You can call the Community Development Department at 610-688-5600 to verify if the individual is licensed.
- Be cautious of "One-Time Offers". You should not have to make a decision on the spot to receive the deal or special that is being offered; especially if the contractor says, "We will only be in the area for today!"
- · Get at least three estimates from at least three different contractors. Check and verify all references supplied by the contractor. Verify the contractor has a valid Certificate of Insurance. Shop around!

- Know the difference between proposals (estimated costs) and contracts (specified costs). Enter into a contract no matter how small of a project.
- Be sure the contract describes the service(s) to be performed, lists the materials to be used. and includes a starting and expected completion date.
- Ask for a written warranty or guarantee with your contract.
- · Be cautious of companies that require advanced payments.
- · Contact the Better Business Bureau to file a complaint for the non-delivery of services or check with them ahead of time to see if there were prior complaints.

Emergency Response & Posting Building Numbers

- It is extremely important to provide a method to identify your premises. Building numbers shall be legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property. This is really important with flag lots.
- The letters shall be Arabic Numerals and/or Alphabet letters.
- The Numbers and/or Letters shall contrast with their background.
- The size of the Numbers and Letters shall be 4" in heightand1/2inchwide.Police,Fireandotheremergency response teams must know where you are in order to respond in timely manner.



Don't Get Bitten This Summer...Protect Yourself From Disease!



Lyme disease and West Nile Virus may be a threat to your health this summer. It is important to know the dangers and warning signs of these potentially harmful diseases.

Lyme disease is caused by the bite of deer ticks. Approximately 20 percent of all deer ticks carry the bacteria that causes Lyme Disease. If you are bitten by a tick, removing it quickly will significantly reduce your chance of getting the disease.

Another tick-borne disease is also on the rise, Ehrlichiosis (Human Granuloctic Ehrlichiosis). HGE has also been linked to the deer tick and has been found along the East Coast and in the Midwest. Symptoms of Lyme Disease and Ehrlichiosis are high fever, headaches, and vomiting. If symptoms continue over several days, consult your physician.

We also headed into the peak mosquito-breeding season and mosquitoes are the agent for infecting humans with the West Nile Virus.

The Township advises the public to take sensible precautions while outdoors to guard against mosquito bites and potential infection by West Nile Virus:

Use insect repellent. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends repellents that contain DEET, Picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus. The Township advises to read and follow label directions carefully no matter which repellent is selected.

Avoid exposure to mosquitoes. Mosquitoes tend to breed best in shaded areas of still water and stay near where they breed. Therefore eliminating breeding areas such as old containers, tires, cleaning



clogged rain gutters, draining pool covers, and any other objects that hold water is very important. To avoid mosquitoes, remember that they are most active between dusk and dawn, and favor wooded areas and tall grass where there is shade. Mosquitoes are also attracted to dark clothing, so wearing lighter colors is helpful. Mosquitoes are also attracted to the light and odors from a house so keep window and door screens in good repair to prevent their entrance.

Water Conservation Starts With You!

Water conservation has become an essential practice in all regions, even in areas where water seems abundant. In addition to saving money on your utility bill, water conservation helps prevent water pollution in nearby lakes, rivers and local water-

Conserving water can also extend the life of your septic system by reducing soil saturation, and reducing any pollution due to leaks. Overloading municipal sewer systems can also cause untreated sewage to flow to lakes and rivers. The smaller the



amount of water flowing through these systems, the lower the likelihood of pollution. In some communities, costly sewage system expansion has been avoided by a concerted effort to save water.


Emerald Ash Borer at Doorstep

This Emerald is no jewel; rather it is a unique environmental pest. The Emerald Ash Borer, discovered in Michigan in 2002, subsequently arrived via cargo ship from Asia. This insect impacts ash trees. However, without treatment, it inevitably kills them.

This insect is now found in 13 states including Pennsylvania, but has not been confirmed in Delaware County or Radnor Township.

SWMAC: A Comprehensive Approach to Stormwater Mitigation in Radnor

Since our establishment in early 2014, Radnor's Stormwater Advisory Committee (SWMAC) has taken a comprehensive, technical and data driven approach to mitigating the very real issue of stormwater and flooding. With the establishment of Radnor's Stormwater Fee in 2013, funds are now specifically earmarked for stormwater mitigation in our community. Several stormwater projects have either been completed or are underway including: the Chamonix Bridge replacement, the Wayne train station parking lot improvements (cost-share with SEPTA) and the Malin Road, Mill Road and Malbridge Road culvert replacements.

The Board of Commissioners appointed CH2M as the Radnor Stormwater Administrator and authorized an engineering assessment of the Ithan Creek Watershed, which encompasses Radnor's most flood prone areas. This assessment will include identification of remediation measures for known flood sites at the Banbury Way and Francis Avenue intersection, South Wayne Avenue in front of the Radnor Fire Company, and Iven Avenue near the Radnor Municipal Building. Projects will be selected for design and construction to address flooding conditions within the Ithan Watershed. The SWMAC also recommends performing engineering assessments for the Darby Creek and Gulf Creek watersheds within Radnor Township; this will enable Radnor to have a comprehensive township-wide stormwater management strategy.

There are several ways that Radnor residents can help reduce the impact of stormwater. Proven stormwater mitigation strategies include installation of rain barrels, rain gardens, downspout diversions and cisterns by homeowners. Any one or a combination of these systems can be installed on your property to improve stormwater management for both you, your neighbors and the Radnor community. To support these initiatives, SWMAC has recommended a residential rebate program to assist property owners with the cost of materials for implementing these proven strategies. Delaware County Household Hazardous Waste Program: A Benefit to Society

We are surrounded by chemicals. Chemicals are in our food and gardens, chemicals clean our houses, chemicals run our cars. The average person can be exposed to about 2,100,000 toxins every day. Due to constant exposure to these chemicals, we become relaxed in our handling and contact of these unsafe substances. It is important to realize that although chemicals are often necessary for modern and efficient functioning in our daily lives, it is essential that we understand that chemicals are still dangerous substances, and should be handled accordingly.

The most dangerous kinds of chemicals are hazardous chemicals. Hazardous chemicals are substances that are poisonous, toxic, flammable, volatile, able to corrode, or able to mix and cause unsafe conditions. They also include those that are radioactive, environmentally unsafe, or which cause physical or health problems.

The major difference between the usage of hazardous and non-hazardous chemicals is the disposal. Non-hazardous liquids may be poured down the sink, and non-hazardous solids may be thrown in the trash. Hazardous chemicals, however, cannot be dumped out. They must be dropped off at a chemical collection site.

This is where the Delaware County Household Hazardous Waste Program helps out. The Delaware County offers four days during the year, where the public can drop off their hazardous waste. The first collection day of the year was on April 25th. The next collection day is on Saturday June 13th, at the Marple Newtown High School from 9:00 am- 3:00 pm. The event will happen rain or shine, and the public is strongly encouraged to come out with any hazardous waste they may have.

The Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) program has run since the early 1990's. Then in 1998, the Delaware County began working with the Bucks, Chester, and Montgomery Counties and the City of Philadelphia. By doing this, if any collection dates do not work for a citizen, you can participate in more collection programs from any of the other counties. Together, this gives the public around 20 opportunities to bring out their hazardous waste. These 5 counties last year collected 3 million pounds of hazardous waste! These programs have received recognitions for the aid they give to both the environment and the public health. In 1999 and 2008, the Delaware County and the Southeast Region together were awarded the Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence. The Delaware County program has earned two other awards itself

The HHW program accepts many types of hazardous wastes, but does have materials that it cannot accept. It is unable to collect Radioactive, Medical, and Unidentified Waste, Explosives, or Latex paint. Furthermore, they will not accept electronics. However, the Delaware County has located several places which accept electronics and other materials. Most libraries have blue boxes to drop off cell phones (without the cords), Best Buy accepts computers and TV's, Goodwill and Staples will accept computers (not monitors), most Radio Shacks, Target Stores, Lowes, and Home Depots will take your Ni-Cad, rechargeable, and Lithium batteries for recycling, and finally Lowes or Home Depot will accept Compact Fluorescent Lamps. Between all these programs, the public can get rid of all their unwanted and dangerous materials.

After disposing of these hazardous wastes, one should know that there are ways to run a toxic free household and garden. Combinations of non-toxic cleaning methods, chemical substitutes, or natural products are a great way to keep the house healthy. Outside, one can use natural mulch instead of fertilizers and planting methods and natural pesticides to keep away diseases and pests. In conclusion, chemicals need to be disposed of responsibly, and we need to understand that chemicals aren't always the go-to solution. There are many programs to help us correctly handle our chemicals. The Delaware County Household Hazardous Waste is one such program which is extremely beneficial to both the community and the environment. With programs like these in place, it is important that we utilize them to our fullest extent.

Green Ribbon Native Plants ® ay Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens

In 2003, Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens began a program to inspire home gardeners to incorporate more native plants into their landscapes, called the "Green Ribbon Native Plant®" Program in which each year three native plants are recognized and added to a continually growing list of outstanding native plants. These plants are showcased in our newly redesigned Green Ribbon Garden located directly adjacent to our Education Center. This garden is a great example of how you can incorporate native plants into the home garden setting.

This year three great new plants have been added to our list of Green Ribbon Native Plants®. The first is Butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa), which is a tuberous perennial that has beautiful orange flowers in summer. Like all milkweeds, it is the larval host for the monarch butterfly, which greatly increases the plant's ecological value. The second Green Ribbon Plant is the ever popular Eastern Purple Coneflower (Echinacea purpurea), which is a beautiful summer blooming perennial wildflower. The drooping purple ray flowers grow best in full sun and will continue to bloom if deadheaded. Our final Green Ribbon Plant is a woody shrub called Red Chokeberry (Aronia arbutifolia). This multi-stemmed, deciduous shrub has showy white flowers in April, then bright red fruit and beautiful fall color later in the season. The tart taste of the fruit is what gives Chokeberry its common name. The full list of Green Ribbon Native Plants® can be found on our website (www. JenkinsArboretum.org).

Respite Care – A Necessity for Today's Changing Families




