

A Message from the Board of Commissioners

Welcome to spring in Radnor!

This is the time of year when we get to rediscover our yards, parks and open spaces. We are fortunate in Radnor to be able to enjoy a variety of parks, whether small pocket areas or large open spaces. I'd like to give an update on one of the exciting developments for our parks in the 7th Ward.

Late this spring (or early summer) long-awaited changes will bloom as we begin the approximately nine-month renovation of Clem Macrone Park. With 9.4 acres set in Garrett Hill, this heavily used park serves our most denselypopulated ward, and all residents of Radnor, in a variety of active and passive recreational uses. Little has changed in the five decades since it was, so its upgrade is long overdue. The improvements will ensure sustainable uses and further greening of our park. The rehabilitation to the park and its facilities will mean greater access for all and modernized restrooms and amenities that will enhance its usability for all park visitors. And the completed project will help provide a model for the redevelopment process - a partnership of township leadership, expert direction and community collaboration

Eight-year journey and community partnership

Last December, the Board of Commissioners approved final funding for the redesign and redevelopment of this open space in the heart of the 7th Ward. However, the seeds for this change were sown within the community eight years ago. Then, as part of Garrett Hill's Master Planning process, a community-led Township committee, working with planning consultants, steered multiple visioning workshops, where over 250 neighbor participants identified priorities for improvement in Garrett Hill. First among these priorities was "Park Improvements" for the Ward's two parks, along with a list of recommendations for areas of investment.

A little more than 4 years later, the Township secured a grant to engage landscape design and architectural consultants, again working with community input, to turn priorities into realities. After seven focus-groups and presentations, residents' priorities were turned into a comprehensive design for redevelopment that expanded both the usability and usable area of this space, creating increased value for Radnor residents. Township Staff provided the platform for the collaboration that was essential for the design's success, while Board vision and support was valued and appreciated by the community.

William White, Radnor's Finance Director, reports the Township has secured a number of funding sources needed to invest the \$1.8 million into revitalizing Clem Macrone Park. All of the funding sources are available immediately, including 31% from PA State grant funds, 9% from impact fees paid by Villanova, and the remaining Township funds from a combination of bond financing and general funds, all provided for in the Township's capital plan.

All of Radnor, and especially the adjacent neighborhoods of Garrett Hill, Rosemont, Conestoga Village, Old Oaks, Black Friar and others, will benefit from this investment that will provide for premier recreational programming and revitalized passive use.

Benefits realized for the 21st Century

About a third of the investment will go to Storm Water Management and infrastructure improvement, benefiting adjacent neighbors and Valley Run, the stream that courses thru the park. Other athletic, playground and structural improvements include:

- The Tot Lot that will be upgraded and moved to the interior, making it safer for the children.
 The baseball field which will get improved structures and a drier outfield, increasing its usability.
 New tennis and basketball courts to replace aging and broken ones.

- Grading improvement and vegetated swales to direct and hold runoff, improving and protecting the
- Grading improvement and vegetated swales to direct and rold runoff, improving and protecting the health of the stream.
 Accessibility that will be increased with new pedestrian entrances and additional parking.
 Bathrooms, currently in distressing condition, that will be replaced and relocated to the front of the park where they will be truly accessible and secure.
- A moderately sized pavilion, located mid-park, providing cover for picnickers at the rear, while a small band shell will offer protection during music and parade activities scheduled at the park.
- · The parks educational mission that will continue with the demonstration rain garden and boardwalk accessible environmental area.
- A new walking loop that will complete a park trail at the rear, adding nearly a third more useable space to the park because of better drainage and runoff control.

 Electricity and water sources to serve ongoing needs and especially the Garrett Hill – Rosemont 4th of July
- Parade and Picnic.

The value for all our parks

Like a number of our parks in Radnor, this redevelopment was long overdue. With a partnership of community input, consultative expertise, and Township leadership, everyone is looking forward to a new day for this jewel in the heart of the 7th Ward. The value to Radnor can be measured in the strength of resident advocacy, the park's use and support by no less than six community groups, and receipt of PA State Grants of \$579,000 deemed worthy for the project. Come visit and enjoy this unique park when it's complete! I invite all Radnor residents to come and enjoy the 'new and improved" Clem Macrone Park as soon as it is completed – expected in early 2017.

Other parks in Radnor's system are also slated for improvements that will certainly benefit from community input. As they take their time in turn, please consider participating in the planning process and help usher all our parks into the 21st century to the benefit of neighbors and all residents.

Televised meeting videos and Township Programs will be available on the Township YouTube Channel within approximately 24 hours of their original air date and time on RTV.











Weather Alerts: Blizzard, Earthquake, Flood, Severe Thunderstorm and Tornado

Other Notifications: The Center for Disease Control, the Department of State and the World Health Organization.

A subscriber who has provided us with a voice number will be contacted via a pre-recorded voice message, a subscriber who has provided us with an email address will be contacted via an email message and a subscriber who has provided us with a SMS number will be contacted via text message. All messages will be about the nature of the event as well as proper response strategies that the public should undertake.

Although the Township has provided CivicReady with a general database of Radnor Township home and business phone numbers, residents are urged to subscribe all of their phone numbers (home and cell) to ensure that they receive proper emergency voice notifications.

Weather alerts are provided by the National Weather Service. Alerts automatically inform citizens in the path of severe weather moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. Please note that if the National Weather Service issues a severe thunderstorm warning for your area at 3:00am and you checked the severe thunderstorm notification check box you will receive a call around that time. Other alerts are also provided by outside parties and are held to the same example as the weather alerts. Options are available to choose when you wish to receive these alerts.





Trash and residential recycling pick up is curbside unless residents choose the optional Rear Yard Trash Subscription. Residents may choose this convenient affordable service for 2016 for the annual fee of just \$420 per property.

2016 Rear Year Trash Subscription arrangements can be made in person at the Radnor Township Building Finance Department, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne or online at www.radnor.com and access the payment center. Once the application and payment is received by the Township, rear trash service will begin with the next regularly scheduled pick-up.

The applications for rear yard trash service for February 1, 2016-January 31, 2017 should be returned with payment by January 27, 2016.

Radnor Recycles





All persons occupying a residential dwelling in Radnor Township are required to recycle. Radnor Township provides a single stream curbside recycling program to our residents as required by Pennsylvania Act 101 "Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act". All recyclables can be placed into the same container with no sorting necessary.

The following lists show what is acceptable for single stream recycling and what is not acceptable.

Acceptable items:

- . Aluminum, clean foil, bi-metallic cans, and steel aerosol cans (empty)
- Glass glass bottles and jars
- Plastic containers marked with # 1 though #7
- Clean Paper Products newspaper, inserts, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, paperback books, phone books, cardboard boxes (broken down), clean pizza boxes, office and school paper, color paper, boxboard (cereal, cake, and cracker boxes), paper egg cartons, paper bags (grocery type).

Items Not Acceptable for Recycling:

- Garbage foam egg cartons, ice cream cartons
- Plastic bags please leave your items loose in the can (plastic bags jam the recycling equipment)
- Food waste
- Used Paper Plates, paper towels, paper napkins all food tainted paper items
- Styrofoam
- Motor oil bottles or hazardous chemical container
- Plastic toys or sporting goods
- · Electronics, batteries, CDs, DVDs
- · Light bulbs, hangers, yard waste or garden tools

Please have your recycling containers at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your scheduled recycling day. Additional recycling containers may be purchased for \$20 at the Radnor Township Building, 301 Iven Avenue, Wayne.

Yard Waste - Environmental Recycling

Please do not put your tree trimmings, brush and leaves out with the trash. Every Wednesday (with the exception of holiday weeks), yard waste is collected curbside. The Township will take up to 10 bundles/bags of yard waste per collection.

- All yard waste must be placed in bio-degradable bags or a 35 gallon refuse container. Contents of bags or containers are not to exceed 50 lbs. No Plastic Bags.
- Tree trimmings and brush must be tied in bundles no more than 2 feet in diameter and no longer than 3 feet in length.
- . Leaves will be collected in bio-degradable (paper) bags and placed at the curb except during the Township wide leaf collection in the fall. In the fall, leaves should not be bagged.
- Grass clippings, dirt, and rocks are not collected as part of the yard waste program.



Revenue Update

2015 ends up 4.9% over 2014 and up 4.8% versus expectations, thanks mostly to transfer tax, business privilege tax audits and development income.

General Fund revenues exceeded expectations, on a cash basis, by \$1.56 million in 2015. Revenues that did better than expectations were the real estate transfer tax which ended \$800,000 better than expected, business tax audits which ended \$300,000 better than expected, development revenues which ended \$465,000



Revenues that missed expectations included base business privilege taxes, mercantile taxes, police fines, and parking revenues. Reasons for the variances vary from over-estimating economic conditions as they translate into the

was collected during the installation. Moving forward into 2016, the business privilege and mercantile expectations are a bit concerning given the important those revenue sources have on overall financial performance. This will be an area of focus in Q1 2016.

The chart below tracks how the actual cash flow for the general fund is performing against expectations. Through October, results continue to trend ahead of expectations.

Expenditure Update

Expenditures swell in December, but land short of total General Fund revenues.

Each year, December is one of the most expensive months due to several factors: (a) year-end payments for various benefits, (b) year-end vendor payments that tend to be greater than normal months due to billing habit of the vendors, and (c) year-end General Fund transfers to funds for various items that include capital funding, debt service and small special revenue fund obligations. That being noted, total General Fund expenditures came in less than total revenues by approximately \$1.1 million.

The General Fund net revenue amount would have been higher if not for several major variations from the 2015 budget that impacted several township departments. A summary of the major impacts include: (a) legal costs associated with litigation were much higher than budgeted, (b) labor attorney costs in both the Administration Department and the Police Department exceeded budgets by well over \$300,000. Please note that the Police Department costs were associated with one particular labor issue that was satisfied late in 2015. (c) Information technology costs were higher in 2015 due to migration of the email system which will save costs in future years, (d) Community Development payroll


was higher than budgeted due to overtime needed to review plans and issue permits (revenue offset), (e) snow / ice costs from 2015 were much higher than budgeted, and (f) shade tree maintenance costs were significantly under budgeted for 2015 (note that the actual cost of maintenance for 2015 was consistent with prior years).


2015 expenditures were less in most township departments in 2015 versus 2014. For example, general government costs were down over \$160,000, public works highway costs were down \$183,000 (in spite of the heavy winter costs), and net engineering costs were down \$55,000. Finally, debt service costs were down in 2015 by \$250,000 from 2014 as a result of various refunding transactions and planned principal pay-downs.

As the Township looks forward into 2016 several areas of the expense budget will need particular monitoring including legal costs, non-contractual personnel costs and contracted services. The importance of greater expense control will be magnified if the concerns

regarding the business privilege and mercantile taxes become reality.

Do You Own or Operate a **Business in Radnor Township?**

As a business owner, including landlords and persons operating a business from a home office, you are required to register your business and annually file a business tax return with the Township. The type of business you operate will determine whether you file a Business Privilege Tax Return or Mercantile Tax Return. In general, retailers file a Mercantile tax return while all others file a Business Privilege tax return. If you have any questions or are unsure if you are required to file, please feel free to call the Township at 610-688-5600 x152 or visit the Township website at www.radnor.com for forms and information. Do not delay... Tax returns are due by May 15th for the previous calendar year. If a valid extension request is filed with the IRS or State, the Township will accept this as an extension for your local return. While the extension allows for additional time to file your return, your tax liability must be satisfied by May 15th.

Contractors may be engaged and other resources may be needed. Inquiries from the news media, the community, employees and their families and local officials may overwhelm telephone lines. How should a business manage all of these activities and resources? Businesses should have an incident management system (IMS). An IMS is "the combination of facilities, equipment, personnel, procedures and communications operating within a common organizational structure, designed to aid in the management of resources during incidents" [NFPA 1600].

The National Incident Management System (NIMS) was established by FEMA and includes the Incident Command System (ICS). NIMS is used as the standard for emergency management by all public agencies in the United States for both planned and emergency events. Businesses with organized emergency response teams that interface with public emergency services can benefit from using the ICS. ICS is also well suited for managing disruptions of business operations. Public information and crisis communications are an integral part of the ICS structure. In Radnor Township, we have adopted the principles of NIMS and the Incident Command System. During emergency events, the Township Manager in consultation with Department Heads and the Board of Commissioners may decide to activate the Emergency Operation Center (EOC).

When an incident occurs, incident stabilization activities (e.g. firefighting, damage assessment, property conservation) may be underway at the scene of the incident. Others assigned to support incident stabilization, business continuity or crisis communications activities will report to an emergency operations center. The emergency operations center is a physical or virtual location from which coordination and support of incident management activities is directed.

The Incident Command System and the use of an Emergency Operations Center supports incident management.

Emergency Operation Center

An emergency operations center (EOC) is a physical (e.g., a conference room) or virtual (e.g., telephone conference call) location designed to support emergency response, business continuity and crisis communications activities. Under Pennsylvania law, Radnor Township is required to have a dedicated individual who is appointed to fill the role of Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC). This appointee is forwarded to the Pennsylvania Governor who, confirms the appointment of the qualified individual. Upon activation by the Township Manager, staff meets at the EOC to manage preparations for an impending event or manage the response to an ongoing incident. By gathering the decision makers together and supplying them with the most current information, better decisions can be made. Radnor Township's primary EOC should be established at the main business facility and a secondary EOC available should there be a problem with the primary facility. The EOC supports the following incident management functions.

- · Activation Bring knowledge and expertise together to deal with events that threaten the business
- . Situation Analysis Gather information to determine what is happening and to identify potential impacts
- Incident Briefing Efficiently share information among team members
- Incident Action Plan Provide a single point for decision-making and decide on a course of action for the current situation
- . Resource Management Provide a single point of contact to identify, procure and allocate resources
- . Incident Management -Monitor actions, capture event data and adjust strategies as

Under the concepts of NIMS, an EOC is not an on-scene incident command post (ICP) - where the focus is on tactics to deal with the immediate situation. An EOC is used to support on-scene activities through the prioritization of activities and the allocation of available resources. A major function within the EOC is communications between the emergency response team, business continuity team, crisis communications team and company management.

The emergency operations center should be activated whenever there is a major incident that causes significant property damage, potential or actual business disruption or has the potential to cause a significant impact on the business. Under the direction of the Township Manager, Radnor Township has activated the EOC for the Papal visit to Philadelphia, Superstorm Sandy and many past sizable winter storms and hurricanes. Beware of These Scams

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is frequently visited this time of year by

transient criminals who travel great distances in search of victims for their various moneymaking scams. In many instances, their targets are the elderly. The most effective defense against scams artists is to employ some basic crime prevention tips. Two of the more prevalent scams perpetrated by transient criminals include:



- Home Repair Scams: Victims are approached through door-to-door solicitation. The perpetrator offers to seal the victim's driveway, fix the roof, or do some other repairs at an unusually low price. Many times the perpetrator will indicate that they are "working in the area" or they have "extra materials." Typically, they will charge less if paid in cash. Upon completion, the final price is frequently much higher than the original estimate. Additionally, the materials used are typically of an inferior quality.
- Diversion Thefts/Imposter Frauds: In this scam, criminals approach and distract a homeowner luring them toward a particular room of the house with ploys such as feigning illness, asking for a drink of water, saying they are looking for a lost pet, etc. They might also pose as a repairman from the local power company or water department in an effort to gain access to the victim's house or lure the victim out of the house. They often present an identification badge and wear what appears to be a work uniform. They will try to convince the victim that they need to test the water pressure, electrical service, or determine where the property line is and will advise that company regulations do not allow the employee to be on the property or in the house unaccompanied. Their intent is to distract the victim while unseen accomplices enter the residence and steal valuables, such as jewelry and cash. In some instances, the suspects communicate with hand-held radios or cellular telephones while committing these offenses. Some of the other less frequently used ploys include claims that the perpetrator works for a tree pruning service, driveway paving service, or fence installation company.

Here are some ways to avoid becoming a victim:

- Always lock your doors when doing yard work, getting mail, or anytime you go outside - both front and back doors.
- Be careful who you let in your home. Never allow strangers inside your home, even if they appear to be in distress or with a young child.
- Check with your utility company by telephone if an employee requests
 to enter your home or wants you to come outside with them. If you do
 not see official identification, ask for it; however, criminals have become
 adept at making their own identification cards and each individual's
 identification should be verified with their respective company.
- Beware of unsolicited home repairmen. If you cannot verify the name, address, or telephone number of the repairman, they might not be reputable. If you need the services of a home repairman, work with local trade's people recommended by friends or reputable building supply stores. Request local references. Check your local phone directory, your municipality's building officials, or the Better Business Bureau to verify they are legitimate. Verify that the contractor is properly licensed, bonded, and insured. Per the Home Improvement Consumer Protection

Act, Pennsylvania contractors who perform at least \$5,000 of home improvements per year are required to register with the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office. Their paperwork must display the company's registration number that can be verified at the Pennsylvania Attorney General's website at http://hicsearch.attorneygeneral.gov or by calling 1-888-520-6680. You can call the Community Development Department at 610-688-5600 to verify if the individual is licensed.

- Be cautious of "One Time Offers". You should not have to make a decision on the spot to receive the deal or special that is being offered; even if the contractor says, "We will only be in the area for today!"
- Be suspicious of high pressure sales tactics. Obtain written contracts
 describing the explicit specifications of the work, the price, the
 responsibility for cleaning up, and the hourly rate for any added work.
 Never sign a contract or agreement without carefully reviewing it.
 You should understand and agree to all of the contract or agreement
 provisions.
- Get at least three estimates from at least three different contractors.
 Check and verify all references supplied by the contractor. Shop around!
- Know the difference between proposals (estimated costs) and contracts (specified costs).
- Be sure the contract describes the service(s) to be performed, lists the materials to be used and includes a starting and expected completion date.
- Ask for a written warranty or guarantee with your contract.
- Be certain the work is completed to your satisfaction before you make final payment. Require a guarantee on the work and pay by check so you can stop payment if dissatisfied.
- Be cautious of companies that require advanced payments.
- Write down the license plate number of any vehicles suspicious individuals may be operating. Try to obtain a good physical description of anyone who comes to your door.
- CALL THE POLICE TO REPORT THE INCIDENT IMMEDIATELY! Never be too embarrassed to report that you might have been victimized or swindled.
- Contact the Better Business Bureau to file a complaint for the non-delivery of services or check with them ahead of time to see if there were prior complaints.

Remember! As a general rule of thumb: If it seems too good to be true, it probably is!

Thinking about a Generator?

The weather patterns for the past few years have many people considering the installation of a portable generator or a stand-by permanent generator in case electricity service is interrupted. You are reminded that permits are necessary before a generator can be installed. While generators come in handy when severe storms knock out power, they need to be operated safely. You can't see or smell the deadly carbon monoxide produced by a generator and it can kill quickly. According to the Con-



sumer Product Safety Commission, one generator can produce as much carbon monoxide as hundreds of cars

Here are some tips for using a portable generator:

- Use generators outside, away from windows, doors, and vents or any other opening in the house.
- · Always read and follow the manufacturer's operating instructions before running generator
- Maintain your generator according to the manufacturer's maintenance schedule for peak performance and safety.
- Engines emit carbon monoxide. Never use a generator inside your home, garage, crawl space, or other enclosed areas. Fatal fumes can build up, that neither a fan nor open doors and windows can provide enough fresh air.
- Use a battery-powered carbon monoxide detector in the area you're running a generator.
- Gasoline and its vapors are extremely flammable. Allow the generator engine to cool at least 2
 minutes before refueling and always use fresh gasoline. If you do not plan to use your generator in 30 days, don't forget to stabilize the gas with fuel stabilizer.
- Never operate the generator near combustible materials.
- If you have to use extension cords, be sure they are of the grounded type and are rated for the application. Coiled cords can get extremely hot; always uncoil cords and lay them in flat open locations.
- Never plug your generator directly into your home outlet. If you are connecting a generator into
 your home electrical system, have a qualified electrician install a Power Transfer Switch.
- Generators produce powerful voltage Never operate under wet conditions. Take precautions to protect your generator from exposure to rain and snow.

Often times, we are in a rush to soak up that first bit of nice weather and stretch our legs from a long cold winter. Did you apply for and receive a permit or even know that a permit was required? A permit is required for new construction, additions, alterations, any project that requires structural changes. Building permit applications are available on the Township website or at the Township office. Check with the Community Development Department before you make alterations to your home or business. Here are some of the improvements that require permits:

- Fences or walls Structural repair or replacement Shed, greenhouse Fireplace
 - Wood deck, patio, porch Alternative Energy Systems
 - Swimming pool, spa, or hot tub over 24 inches in depth
 - Changes in use, home occupations, change in commercial tenants
 - New buildings and additions Heating and air conditioning replacement
- Roof replacement Plumbing alterations Signs Electrical work or new installation
 - Interior alterations



With the warming weather, now is the time people start to seek out a good safe Public Swimming Pool and secure their seasonal memberships. The following are recommended tips to inquire about in order to ensure a safe, fun swimming experience.

- . Inquire if all lifeguards are certified as a Lifeguard, CPR, & 1st Aide.
- Inquire as to the ratio of lifeguards to bathers (1 per 50 is recommended).
- . Inquire if the wading pool will be guarded by a lifeguard.
- Inquire as to the frequency of pool sampling during the day by lifeguards.
- o Indoor pools get sampled 2x per hour.
- o Outdoor pools get sampled 1x per hour.
- Inquire about the pool policy for accidents (Vomiting, Formed and loose Fecal matter).

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

The Authentic Garden

What makes a garden "authentic"? For American gardeners, this question can be vexing. Because America is a comparatively young nation, it is still developing its own garden style and gardeners have tended to turn to other national traditions—such as Italy's, Japan's, or England's—for inspiration. The result of this stylistic borrowing may overlook local landscapes and history, and have little connection with our daily lives. Claire Sawyers shows how this tendency can be reversed: how we can create gardens that are both deeply rooted in their surroundings and deeply satisfying to their creators and owners. Drawing on her knowledge of a vast array of American and foreign gardens, she identifies the five principles that help instill a sense of authenticity and to make a garden that is true to a specific time, place, and culture; to capture and reflect an authentic spirit so that the garden, in turn, will nurture the spirit of those who cherish and dwell in it.

Since 1990 Claire Sawyers has been director of the Scott Arboretum of Swarthmore College, regarded by some as "the most beautiful campus in America." She brings both U.S. and international perspectives to her work. She grew up on a dairy farm in Missouri and spent six years of her youth in Japan, to which she returned to work with Japanese landscapers. She has also worked in Belgium (Kalmthout Arboretum) and France (private gardens in Brittany and Normandy). The purpose off Skunk Hollow Community Garden is to provide a protected from-most-critters space for Radnor residents to gather and garden together, to raise fresh naturally grown [pesticide & herbicide-free] and to share our garden & bounty with others.

Despite last year's weather, the garden had its best season ever! Spring and planting weather was delayed; we were late to plant peas, potatoes and spring greens. Because the gardeners were so conscientious in their watering, the garden thrived!! There were several intervals of weeks of no rain! Our community planting of potatoes, sweet potatoes, corn and Edamame beans was successful.



The garden has an active program of outreach. We host school [AIS and Haverford] and college [Harcum and Villanova] workdays and are grateful for their support. Every Saturday from June to September, we gather our 'excess' vegetables and deliver them to Loves & Fishes, located in Prospect Park. This pantry provides basic foodstuffs for 650 families living in lower Delaware County. In 2015, the value of vegetables donated equaled \$3250.

Every fall a survey is circulated, inviting each of the 63 families to tell us how many ate regularly from their garden plots and with how many other families their shared their harvest. For 2015, with 51% responding, the survey results indicate that 123 persons regularly ate from the garden. In addition, gardeners shared their harvest with 177 other families. Not bad!!!
