

### A Message from the Board of Commissioners

Hello Everyone,

Here is a recap/update on a few matters that the BOC addressed in 2016 or expects to address in early 2017.

- 1. 2017 Budget The Township completes its budget in December of each year. While I think the Commissioners unanimously agree that we have honest and competent staff and volunteer advisors, we often disagree over spending amounts, spending priorities, borrowing, capital planning, etc. Regardless, the democratic process requires us to vote. Consequently, the budget that results is the Township's operating budget for the year. You can find information about the budget on the web or contact your Commissioner to understand it better.
- 2. **Willows Mansion** The Township has been trying for the last few years to match the Mansion to an optimum Township use. It has proven more difficult than originally anticipated. We seem to have a spectrum of alternatives from no action (\$30k to \$70k per year) to complete renovation (around \$2.6M) with a few options in between. Again, the website is filled with material for your review or you could ask your Commissioner.
- 3. **PLO Zoning** This district is wholly located in Ward 2 and centrally located in the heart of the Township along and around King of Prussia Road. Its traffic affects everyone who lives, works, or visits Radnor. Furthermore, its current zoning requires traffic intensive uses. A few years ago, one of the PLO land owners approached the Township with a request to modify the zoning but no agreement occurred. Subsequently, the Township attempted to modify the zoning. Again, no agreement occurred. Most recently, Penn Medicine approached the Township with a prospective mixed-use plan and a prospective zoning amendment that Penn Medicine believes will reduce traffic from the site relative to the baseline zoning and baseline development. The goal of the prospective zoning is to allow the substitution of low traffic uses (hotel, assisted living, and ambulatory care) for high traffic uses (general and medical office). The Commissioners have evaluated the concept for months. At the time that I prepared this letter, no decision was yet made on this item. But, please be assured that all action taken (or to be taken) on this item was taken (or will be taken) because the majority of Commissioners believe that the zoning adjustment will reduce traffic in the aforementioned way and improve development. Again, the website is filled with material for your review or you could ask your Commissioner.

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

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


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

Items may be added to these lists from time to time, so please check back every now and then to make sure you are receiving notifications that interest you. ### CivicReady

This notification website is separate from the Township website but they are still connected together. Please visit our notification website at radnor.civicready.com where you may sign up for Emergency Alerts, General Notifications, Weather Alerts and Other Notifications.

**Other Notifications:** The Center for Disease Control, the Department of State and the World Health Organization.

A subscriber who has provided us with a voice number will be contacted via a pre-recorded voice message, a subscriber who has provided us with an email address will be contacted via an email message and a subscriber who has provided us with a SMS number will be contacted via text message. All messages will be about the nature of the event as well as proper response strategies that the public should undertake.

Although the Township has provided CivicReady with a general database of Radnor Township home and business phone numbers, residents are urged to subscribe all of their phone numbers (home and cell) to ensure that they receive proper emergency voice notifications.

Weather alerts are provided by the National Weather Service. Alerts automatically inform citizens in the path of severe weather moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. Please note that if the National Weather Service issues a severe thunderstorm warning for your area at 3:00am and you checked the severe thunderstorm notification check box you will receive a call around that time. Other alerts are also provided by outside parties and are held to the same example as the weather alerts. Options are available to choose when you wish to receive these alerts.



### WINTER TIPS FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Department is in at the First Flake of Snow! The dump trucks will be salting prior to the snow removal operations. The roadways are constantly monitored for snow and slippery conditions. The following are a few tips to help us better serve you:

- Please remove all parked cars from the roadway during snow removal operations. Be aware that the dump trucks are equipped with 10 foot plows. If you are parked across the street from another car the truck not be able to get through. Use your driveway. If you don't have a driveway try and park on the same side of the road as other cars in on your street to allow the snow plow to make as large a path as possible.
- Please do not leave your car in the cul-de-sac. We will not be able to salt or clean the entire area.
   When removing snow, Do Not Throw, Blow, or Shovel the snow back into the road.
- . When following a salt truck, be aware the driver may stop or slow to get the salt to the back of the truck. Stay back 100 feet from the vehicle and avoid mishaps.

### Yard Waste Collection:

Collected curb side on Wednesdays (with the exception of holiday weeks), must be placed in bio-degradable paper bags or loose in a 35 gallon refuse container. Contents of container cannot exceed 50 lbs. No plastic bags will be accepted

Tree trimmings and brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 3 feet in length and branches can be long larger than 2" in diameter. No firewood will be collected. Leaves will be collected in bio-degradable bags when placed at the curb except during the Township ide leaf collection in the fall. Up to 10 bundles/bags of yard waste per collection will be accepted.

Plastic bags, trash, grass, and dirt mixed with lawn debris is not permitted.

### Recyclable items:

Yes: newspaper, inserts, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, paper back books, phone books, cardboard, clean pizza boxes, office and school paper, color paper, boxboard (cereal, cake, and cracker boxes), paper egg cartons, paper bags (grocery type), aluminum cans, clean foil, tin and steal aerosol cans (empty). glass jars and bottles (empty), plastic containers #1 through #7.

No: garbage, plastic bags, food waste, food tainted items (used paper plates, paper towels, paper napkins), Styrofoam, motor oil bottles or hazardous chemical containers, plastic toys or sporting goods, electronics, batteries, CDs, DVDs, foam egg cartons, ice cream cartons, light bulbs, hangers, yard waste or garden tools.


### Revenue Update

Year over year revenue is flat, but is still expected to meet full year expectations.

Township revenues are made up of three broad categories: Real Estate Taxes (39%), Act 511 Taxes (41%) and other revenues (20%). Other revenues are comprised of permits, fines, departmental income and miscellaneous income.

Real Estate and Business Taxes (a part of the Act 511 group) are collected prior to May 15th, so at this point in the year; almost all of the

collection efforts, audit proceeds to-date are \$551,000 with more expected before year's end 2. Finally, building permit (and related) revenues are relatively flat over last year. Other revenue areas that are performing well are interest (+62K over 2015), grants (+\$26K over 2015) and departmental (+\$111K over 2015). Interest is up due to better investment



annual revenues are collected giving us a good idea on where we will end the year. Real Estate Taxes are the most predictable and continue to perform as expected.

Next, regular business taxes continue to show little to no growth. However, due to the Township's ongoing follow up and returns this year. Grants are up due to increases in state pension aid. Departmental is up due to increases in parking revenue.

Those results have allowed us to maintain the year-end revenue forecast for the General Fund at \$33.8 million.


### Expenditures stay on Track


Township expenses fall within eight broad categories: General Government, Protection of Persons & Property, Public Works, Parks & Recreation, Library, Community Organizations, Non-Departmental and Other Financing Uses. Through October 2016, General Government is performing slightly over budget as a result of higher Act 511 audit professional fees. Security of Persons and Property are performing at budgeted levels as a result of not yet hiring all of the budgeted police positions as well as not needing all of the contracted inspection expenses in Community Development. Some Police Department line items are forecasting to exceed budgeted levels due to various reasons. However, in the aggregate and as a result (again) of not hiring the budgeted police positions, the impact to the bottom line is minimal. Public works is trending below budgeted levels due savings from the light winter earlier this year. Parks & Recreation continue to perform below budget due to various factors that include lowerthan-expected recreation and community programming costs and lower park maintenance supply costs. Library is performing as expected while community organizations are over budget as a

result of an accounting change in how the Township is treating parking revenue sharing programs with the Wayne Business Association and Wayne Presbyterian Church. Non-Departmental and other financing uses are performing as expected for the most part.

As we try to forecast to yearend, base line operational expenditures are right on track and should meet expectations. Potential variations could result from any weather related events that might cause the Township to expend funds unexpectedly.

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

### Winter Safety Tips!

### **Preparing Your Home for Winter**

As winter approaches, our thoughts turn to other activities as we plan for the annual hibernation to the indoors. This is also a good time to plan a safe hibernation for your house as well. The constant change in the weather can have a significant effect on your house that, if left unchecked, may result in major repairs in the future.

Now is the time to inspect your house for anything that does not appear to be normal. Things to look for include loose siding, missing or torn shingles, broken or sticking doors, missing caulking around windows or



any other item that will leave your home exposed to the elements. Now is the time to start addressing these items before the cold weather sets in and these items are forgotten.

You may also want to take a look at other items that are often overlooked until it is too late. One important item is your home heating system. Most people who are not on a maintenance program forget to have service performed until well into the heating season when the furnace decides to stop working. Unfortunately, this is the time that most heating contractors are busiest and you may have to wait for service. Avoid the headache and plan ahead.

Items such as your water heater may need your attention as well as other home appliances. Remember to check and make sure water pipes are properly insulated and not exposed to freezing temperatures. Be sure that leaves and debris do not obstruct water flow from gutters and downspouts. Water that freezes and is allowed to back up rooftops often provides you with unwelcome leaks. The lists are endless, but remember your home is a major investment - take good care of it.

### Did You Know?

- Smoke alarms provide an early warning of a fire, giving people additional escape time. In 2009-2013, smoke alarms sounded in more than half (53%) of the home fires reported to U.S. fire departments.
- Three of every five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms (38%) or no working smoke alarms (21%).
- The death rate per 100 reported home fires was more than twice as high in homes that did not have any working smoke alarms compared to the rate in homes with working smoke alarms (1.18 deaths vs. 0.53 deaths per 100 fires).
- In fires in which the smoke alarms were present but did not operate, almost half (46%) of the smoke alarms had missing or disconnected batteries.
- Dead batteries caused one-quarter (24%) of the smoke alarm failures.

Fall is a perfect time to make sure your smoke detectors are in good working condition. Taking a few minutes now can mean the difference between life and death.

### Why Should My Home Have Smoke Alarms?

A smoke alarm can save your life and those of your loved ones. They are a very important means of preventing house and apartment fire fatalities by providing an early warning signal -- so you and your family can escape. Smoke alarms are one of the best safety devices you can buy and install to protect yourself, your family, and your home.

### What Types of Smoke Alarms Are Available?

There are many different brands of smoke alarms available on the market but they fall under two basic types: ionization and photoelectric. Ionization alarms sound more quickly when a flaming, fast-moving fire occurs. Photoelectric alarms are quicker at sensing smoldering, smoky fires. There are also combination smoke alarms that combine ionization and photoelectric into one unit, called dual sensor smoke alarms. Because both ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms are better at detecting distinctly different yet potentially fatal fires, and because homeowners cannot predict what type of fire might start in a home,

the United States Fire Administration recommends the installation of both ionization and photoelectric or dual sensor smoke alarms. In addition to the basic types of alarms, there are alarms made to meet the needs of people with hearing disabilities. These alarms may use strobe lights that flash and/or vibrate to assist in alerting those who are unable to hear standard smoke alarms when they sound.


### Where Do I Put Them?

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement. Many fatal fires begin late at night or in the early morning. For extra safety, install smoke alarms both inside and outside sleeping areas. Since smoke and many deadly gases rise, installing your smoke alarms at the proper level will provide you with the earliest warning possible. Always follow the

# manufacturer's installation instructions. Where Can I Get Smoke Alarms?

Many hardware, home supply, or retail stores carry smoke alarms.

### How Do I Keep My Smoke Alarm Working?

If you have a smoke alarm with batteries:

- . Smoke Alarms powered by long-lasting batteries are designed to replace the entire unit according to manufacturer's instructions.
- In standard type battery powered smoke alarms, the batteries need to be replaced at least once per year and the whole unit should be replaced every 8-10 years.
- In hard-wired, battery backup smoke alarms, the batteries need to be checked monthly, and replaced at least once per year. The entire unit should be replaced every 8-10 years.

### Do I need a Carbon Monoxide Detector as well? YES!

- · Every home with at least one fuel-burning appliance/heater, attached garage or fireplace should have CO alarms.
- An alarm should be installed on every level of the home.
- . Place the alarm at least 15 feet away from fuel-burning appliances.
- . Make sure nothing is covering or obstructing the unit.
- . Do not place the unit in dead air spaces or next to a window or door.
- Test the CO alarm once a month by pressing the test/reset button.
- · Every month, unplug the unit and vacuum with a soft-brush attachment or wipe with a clean, dry cloth to remove accumulated dust
- · Should the alarm go off, and if anyone is experiencing symptoms, you need to get everyone into fresh air and call 911 from a neighbor's home. If no one is experiencing symptoms, you should call the fire department or a qualified technician from a neighbor's home to have the problem inspected. If you are unable to leave the home to call for help, open the doors and windows, and turn off all possible sources while you are waiting for assistance to arrive. Under no circumstance should an alarm be ignored!

### **HOLIDAY FIRE SAFETY TIPS**

### **Natural Christmas Trees**

Before buying a tree, test for freshness by tapping the base of the tree on the ground or pulling lightly on a limb. If many needles fall off or needles can be easily pulled off, the tree is too dry. Keep your tree as fresh as possible by placing the stump of the tree in a bucket of water outdoors until you are ready to decorate. Before setting up the tree inside the house, trim two inches off the stem diagonally so it can absorb water. Mount the tree securely in a large, wide based reservoir stand and add water each day to ensure the tree is well watered. Choose a suitable location for your tree, ensuring that it is well away from heating sources and clear of all exits.

### **Artificial Trees**

Though fireproof, metal or aluminum trees are electrically conductive and cannot be decorated with any electrical product. The metal can cause a short and a fire, or simply become "hot" or deliver a nasty shock. Aluminum trees can be illuminated by a colorful spotlight placed a safe distance from the tree, as set out in the manufacturer's instructions.

### **Decorations and Presents**

Wrapping paper and decorations can be highly combustible, and should be kept away from heat sources such as candles, lamps, heaters, fireplaces and wood-burning stoves. Gift wrap and boxes should be collected as soon as gifts are opened, and discarded with the garbage or recycled where appropriate.

### **Indoor Lights and Electrical Decorations**

- Use only lights that have been tested and labeled by an Approved testing laboratory.
- Examine light strings, cords, plugs and receptacles before using. Discard any that have frayed cords, cracks in the lamp-holders, or loose connections.
- Do not overload electrical circuits or extension cords, and follow instructions about connecting light strings to extension cords.
- Never place furniture or other objects over electrical cords; never run electrical cords under a rug. With a rug covering a cord, any damage the cord may sustain can go unnoticed.
- Always unplug the light string before attempting to replace a bulb. Ensure the voltage and/or wattage marked on the light set is compatible with the replacement bulb.
   This is especially important with mini-lights as they come in different voltages.
- Avoid using timers on indoor lights. Tree lights could turn on when no one is at home and create a potential fire hazard. Always turn Christmas lights off before leaving home or going to sleep.

### **Outdoor Lighting**

- Use only lights that have been tested and labeled by an approved testing laboratory and are marked for outdoor use
- Turn off the electricity to the supply outlet before working on outdoor wiring.
- Keep electrical connections off the ground and clear of metal objects. Use insulated tape, not metal nails or tacks, to hold strings of outdoor lights in place

to hold strings of outdoor lights in place. Be careful not to tape the cords either over, under, or along metal eaves troughs.

- Run cords above ground, keeping them out of puddles & snow.
- Tape all plug connections with plastic electrical tape to make them as watertight
  as possible. To prevent moisture from entering bulb sockets, bulbs should face the
  ground.
- When using spotlights or floodlights to light your home or trees, ensure they are marked for outdoor use to withstand snow and rain. Indoor floodlights should never be used outdoors.

### **Holiday Parties**

• Decorate with flame-retardant or non-combustible materials.

Have large, fireproof, non-tip ashtrays available for guests who smoke. Empty ashtrays
regularly into a metal container; after the party, check inside and under upholstery and
trashcans for misplaced cigarette butts that may be smoldering.

### Candles

Never use lit candles as decorations on Christmas trees. Place candles in non-tip candle holders and ensure they are well away from Christmas tree or other combustible materials. Never leave lit candles unattended and ensure that they are always out of reach of the children. Matches and lighters are tools not toys! Store them up high where children can't reach them.



### **Fireplaces**

Have your chimney inspected at least once a year and have it cleaned if necessary. Always use a fire screen, and burn only material appropriate for fireplaces. Burn only wood – never burn paper or pine boughs in a fireplace as the burning particles can float up your chimney and onto your roof or into your yard. Never use flammable liquids in a fireplace. Because ashes may rekindle, never store them in your home. Always remove ashes from your fireplace in a metal container.

### Fire Safety in the Kitchen

Always practice fire safety in the kitchen but especially during the festive season. Don't leave cooking food unattended - oil or fat can ignite. If you are faced with a grease fire, remember, put a lid on it and turn the heat source off! Always turn pot handles to the back of the stove when cooking, to avoid pots being pulled or knocked off.

### **Greening the Holidays**

As we are rolling into the holiday season and entering a time of year of over indulgence, it is extremely important to remember restraint when it comes to the environment. Thanks to organizations like afewsteps.org we are reminded of the importance of greening up our holidays. Below are seven tips offered on their website to help in that process.

- Light with LEDs LED Christmas lights use 90% less electricity and last more than 100 times longer than conventional strands.
- Know your Turkey Most food items travel 1,500 miles before they reach our table. Local food tastes
   the beginning of the second to t
  - better because it's not engineered to travel. And most local turkey farms raise free-range, hormone-free birds.
- 3. Throw Waste-Free Holiday Parties Americans create 25% more waste during the holidays or an additional one million tons of waste per week. If you throw a holiday party, try to make it waste-free. Borrow from neighbors. Buy inexpensive plates and cloth napkins to use year after year. Send food home with guests.
- 4. Give Meaningful Gifts In a national survey, 70% of Americans said they would prefer less focus on purchased gifts. Consider giving a gift of your time. Write a letter. Prepare a favorite dish. Share a local event together.
- Donate Last Year's Gifts for Reuse More than \$5 billion worth of Christmas gifts go unused each year - they are usually those items purchased at the last minute.
- 6. Turn It Off Standby power accounts for roughly 10% of US residential electricity use, or \$130 per household per year. Use a smart power strip to make it easy to turn off devices, available at home improvement stores for less than \$20.

### WHAT WE DO IN WINTER

People often ask what we do here at Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens during the winter months. The most important part of our winter work is keeping track of the Arboretum's collections through plant recording and mapping. We have to record accurate information on where each plant originated, when it was planted, how it was nurtured, and exactly where it is located in the Arboretum. There are over 12,000 woody plants at Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens. Record keeping is a significant and crucial task. We were



fortunate to receive a generous grant from The Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust two years ago that has enabled us to convert our mapping from paper to computer database. This conversion project brings us up to modern botanical garden standards. Keeping up with records in the computer database is good work for cold winter days. Labels for each plant with both Latin and common names are created during the chilling winter months as well.



What other kinds of tasks do we do? Even in the winter, 1 ½ miles of trails must be cleared every day – either of leaf debris, snow, or ice for the safety of our visitors. (Our paths are now resurfaced with Porous Pave thanks to generous grant funding from the McLean Contributionship and the Mars Foundation.) Snow removal with plows, snow blowers, and shovels on the parking lot at times seems perpetual! Again,

the safety of our visitors is our paramount concern. Winter also gives the Arboretum staff a wonderful chance to reassess or sometimes design or redesign some of the garden areas. In a bleak winter landscape, one can often see more clearly what may need reorganization or rethinking. In the winter garden, we do a lot of pruning: suckers, water sprouts, and crossing branches must be removed. We prune or cut back late blooming shrubs that form buds on new wood.

On snowy winter days, seed catalogs are poured over to make the best selections early. Reading and research are important parts of planning for spring. We must know the histories and natural habitats of plants in the collection or those we are considering so that the optimal growing conditions can be determined before actual planting time arrives in spring. In the shop, all hand tools are sharpened, oiled, and organized. Maintenance is done on all power equipment including mowers, chain saws, and other power tools.





In the greenhouse, plant propagation is ongoing. The horticulture staff is busy scarifying or cleaning seeds and rooting cuttings. Did you know that the reason why a seed is encased in a protective covering is that inside the casing there are inhibitors that keep the seeds from germinating at the wrong time of the year. Once the seeds are removed from the casing (or in some

situations – once the casing is punctured) they can be

planted in soil and the seeds will germinate. Much of the work we do in winter in the greenhouse is propagation from seeds.

Check our website www.jenkinsarboretum.org from time to time for events and interesting programs, often offered free of charge or at nominal cost. ### **The Election Connection**

Since it's founding in 1920, the primary mission of the League of Women Voters has been to register voters, provide nonpartisan information about candidates, and educate citizens about how government works. The 2016 Election has been an opportune time for League members, both men and women, to continue this tradition. With the cooperation of the Radnor Township School District, as well as private and parochial schools, academies, and universities, hundreds of students received cards, like that above, that provided links to on-line voter registration and candidate information. Several students even interrupted their lunch to fill out paper forms that were mailed to election boards by our members! Fifth graders in the public schools each received an activity booklet, *Electing the President*, compliments of the League.

Thanks to the support of Radnor Township, the Wayne Senior Center, the Wayne Business Association, the Radnor Memorial and Ludington Libraries, and many area churches, residents were able to obtain information and resources, not only for voter registration but also absentee ballots. Hundreds of citizens also connected with League members at the annual Fall Festival in Wayne and at SEPTA train and trolley stops on National Voter Registration Day.

With the collaboration of Studio 21, the members of the League were featured in several programs. Each was designed to help residents learn about the voter registration, how to watch a debate, or the voting process itself. Channel 21 also aired LWV candidate forums for the 165th and 166th legislative districts to provide voters with yet another source of non-partisan information. Radnor Township Television (RTV) assisted by posting important dates and other information for voters among their scrolling features.

Although the League's Voter Guide has become an on-line resource, hard copies were printed and made available to residents at local libraries and each polling place. Working with the Township, Voter Service Chair Gayla McCluskey obtained maps of each ward that were also posted at voting locations throughout Radnor to help residents avoid waiting in line at the wrong polling place. Each voter was also given an "I Voted" sticker, thanks to the generous contribution of a League member. The LWV has been and will continue to be connected with elections. We are helping to make democracy work!



# Skunk Hollow Community Garden By: Sara Pilling

Sixty-two families have successfully completed our 5th year of gardening together. Despite adverse weather - cold, heat [41 days/90 were 90-degrees or higher], and drought – our garden harvest was bountiful.

This weekend [November 6th] is 'closedown weekend', during which time we open and drain water lines, power wash the reserve tank; drain all hoses to hang in the shed, built for our use by an Eagle Scout, clean all tools and pack the shed until spring.

Those who have not planted fall/winter crops: lettuce, arugula, chard, kale, broccoli, carrots, beet turnips, or crops for next spring/summer such as garlic, shallots and spinach are urged to totally clean their planting beds. Any recalcitrant weeds in paths/aisles are pulled. Why do we do all this work? Because in spring we want to get right to work!

The garden had several visitor workdays: Haverford School on two different occasions, Agnes Irwin School and Villanova Universities' Day of Service. They are invited for a day of work, working with our gardeners. Their youth, strength and enthusiasm help us to maintain this garden complex – it's a lot of work. Once again, the garden welcomed many families participating in the Great American Campout.

For the fifth year the gardeners shared their harvest with the food pantry, Loaves & Fishes. Located in Prospect Park, 600+ persons are provided with 90 meals each month - we provide fresh, pesticide free vegetables through the summer months. This year our donation had a value of \$3521.00. Among the harvest we collected 375 pounds of squash, 143 pounds of tomatoes and 197 pints of cherry tomatoes.

### **Red Cross Has Steps to Heat Your Home Safely**

The days are getting shorter and the temperatures cooler, signs that it's the time of year when many people turn the heat back on in their homes. It's also the time of year when the number of home fires goes up, often times caused by the use of alternate heating methods. Nearly half of the households in this country use alternative heating sources such as space heaters, fireplaces, or wood/coal stoves to stay warm. The American Red Cross has steps people should follow as they get their homes ready for cooler weather.

- Have furnaces, chimneys, fireplaces, wood and coal stoves inspected and cleaned before another winter of use. Test batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide
- Prepare a disaster supply kit to have ready should winter storms hit. The kit should include a three-day supply of food and water per person, flashlight, battery-powered or hand-crank radio and extra batteries.
- If someone is using a space heater, the Red Cross recommends that people look for a model that shuts off automatically if the heater falls over. Space heaters should be placed on a level, hard and nonflammable surface in the home.

The Red Cross responds to about 1,200 disasters every year across Eastern Pennsylvania, and most of them are home fires. Working with fire departments and community groups across the country, the Red Cross is installing smoke alarms in homes in neighborhoods at high risk for fires and teaching residents about fire prevention and preparedness. The Red Cross is calling on everyone to take two simple steps that can save lives: create and practice their home fire escape plan and check their smoke
