

IRISH SHEPHERD'S PIE

Since St. Paddy's Day is right around the bend, I wanted to tap into my Irish roots and provide a recipe that is somewhat traditional, but with a much healthier (and I think tastier) twist. So, while my Irish mates may not approve of these modifications, people looking to eat healthy and yummy comfort foods certainly will!



Vitamin A

INGREDIENTS:

Potatoes:

- · 1.5 lbs. sweet potatoes
- · ¾ cup low-sodium chicken broth
- · ¼ cup low-fat plain Greek yogurt
- · Salt and pepper
- · Paprika

Filling:

- · 1 lb. 93% lean ground turkey
- · 1 tsp. olive oil
- · 1 medium onion, chopped
- · 2 celery stalks, diced
- · ½ lb. (8 oz) mushrooms, sliced
- · 1 cup frozen peas
- · 1 cup riced cauliflower (or cauliflower, chopped well)
- · 2 tbsp. flour (whole wheat recommended)
- · 1 cup beef broth
- · 1 tbsp. tomato paste
- · 1 tsp. Worcester sauce
- · 1 tsp. each rosemary, thyme, and parsley
- · Salt and pepper

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Bake or boil the potatoes until soft [baked about 45 minutes or boiled for about 30].
- 2. Drain the potatoes (if boiled) and mash with chicken broth, yogurt, and ½ tsp salt.
- 3. Preheat oven to 425 degrees.
- 4. In a large pan, sauté the turkey with ½ tsp salt until cooked through and brown. Set aside in a bowl.
- 5. In the same pan, add oil, onion, celery, mushrooms, peas, and cauliflower. Sautee until vegetables are soft, about 10 minutes.
- 6. Add flour, broth, tomato paste, Worcester sauce, and spices. Add ground turkey.
- 7. Simmer the turkey and vegetable mixture for about 10 minutes.
- 8. Spray a 13" x 9" pan with olive oil spray.
- 9. Spread the bottom of the pan with the ground turkey mixture.
- Add mashed sweet potatoes on top of the ground turkey mixture in an even layer.
- 11. Bake about 20 minutes, then place under broil and broil on high for about two minutes until the potatoes brown.
- 12. Let cool a bit and serve with a side of more vegetables!

Here we are in the throes of Winter, with March being the big finish! SILVER SPOTLIGHT

Jacqueline Frances Carter was born on June 6, 1930, in Leominster, Massachusetts to Annie Max Carter and Arthur Carter. The family moved to New Haven, Connecticut when Jackie was a young girl. Jackie is one of six children, five girls and one boy. When they first moved, the family lived in an apartment. They managed, but were quite poor. Jackie's Dad worked at a local paper mill and her Mom was a homemaker.

> Jackie remembers well what it was like growing up in wartime. One particular story involves her oldest sister, Pauline. Apparently, one of their neighbors was of German descent. Pauline was sure he was a spy! So, she and her friends used to sneak around the neighborhood and spy on him! She also remembers ration books. Her family was very fortunate, as her Mom knew someone who could supply the family with meat without using any of their ration books!

When the war was over, Jackie's family was able to purchase a house. Their backyard almost abutted with Yale University's campus! In fact, Jackie's first job was at Yale while she was in high school. She graduated in 1948 and was able to attend a local teacher's college and studied early childhood education. While attending Southern Connecticut State College in New Haven, Jackie and several other students were heavily influenced by a professor who happened to be in the Naval Reserve. He convinced the girls to join as well. For two summers the girls attended Officer's Candidate School for six weeks.

Upon graduation from college, the girls were officially considered to be WAVES, Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service, a unit of the U.S. Naval Reserve. Having earned the rank of Ensign, each girl had orders to report to the Pentagon. Jackie was assigned to the Crypto Center. Her department oversaw decrypting messages sent to the Pentagon from the officers in the field. She had to have Top Secret clearance, as any member of the FBI would. Jackie recalls that the messages mostly had to do with ship movements, but often they concerned U.F.O.s which were spotted out at sea! Sometimes messages were for President Truman. Jackie would be driven to the White House and hand the message to the Naval Liaison, Commander Beech. And she was only 22 years old!

As she tells the story, she had no idea that she was considered a veteran until she attended a Veterans' Coffee Hour at the Wayne Senior Center. She was able to learn about all the benefits that she is entitled to. The facilitator of the group, Bob Haley, a young veteran himself, arranged for our veterans to take part in the Honor Flight Initiative. This program treats veterans to a much-deserved day of honor and recognition. The veterans go to Washington, D.C. for the day, visiting all the

war memorials and Arlington National Cemetery on a luxury bus. Each veteran has a "guardian" assigned to him or her, who makes sure that the day goes smoothly and helps the veteran when needed. Jackie was in awe all day. She couldn't believe that the bus was escorted by police officers on motorcycles for the entire trip down!

Shortly after serving in the Navy for two years, Jackie met her husband who was in the ROTC. He was assigned to go to Japan. Upon his return, the couple began their family, four children, three girls and one boy! At the age of 50, Jackie earned her Master's Degree in Library and Information Science. Her specialty was business library research. Over the years she worked for Sun Oil, Dupont and even the E.P.A., working with the Freedom of Information Act when it first became law. She finally retired at the age of 70 and began to caring for her first grandchild.

Jackie loves retirement. Her passions are reading, old movies and travel. She feels great and attributes her good health to a life of eating right and exercising. She loves the Wayne Senior Center because there is always something going on and all the people are so nice, and the Wayne Senior Center loves her right back!





How to Update Your Home with its Architecture and History in Mind.

In lieu of the typical "spring cleaning tips," I'd like to share some designer insight on how to make tasteful updates to any historic home while keeping architectural motifs consistent with its era.

The trick to redesigning a historic home in a classic way that won't date is by using finishes and fixtures that are made to represent that time period or by salvaging the real thing. It's easier than you think. And truth be told, you're still free to mix and match! Traditional motifs can be used with more modern touches, and it will give you a chance to add an element of interest that can bring your home's design up to date. So, because our modern world provides contemporary design solutions regularly, I'm here to shed light on a few of your "Old World" options.

Main Line Homes have History!

Many homes in Radnor Township are historic. These homes have architectural details, lots of character, and a story to tell. Whether your home's architecture is Georgian, Victorian, or Tudor Revival

style, each home in our area has a certain personality and deserves to have that style represented in its interior.

As a designer, it's critical for me to understand the history of a home, the architectural details, and the existing interior design so that my team and I can adequately highlight each important "architectural moment."

According to the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, there are over 35 architectural styles represented in Pennsylvania alone. How can we honor that?

Do a little bit of research on your home's style. A couple hours on the Internet to research photos and referencing the location and year of your home was should do it. Print a few photos and take notes before you start any major design work. Make sure any professional you hire is aware of the home's history, and if you're interested in honoring your homes' architecture, make sure he or she understands the style's overarching themes.

Integrate A Home's Architecture with Interior Design

If your home is Arts and Crafts or Bungalow style, try to incorporate some stained or leaded glass in the kitchen and main entry area. For a Colonial Revival style, have a carpenter frame out any doorways with a pediment style opening. Look up a few millwork styles that were used in the appropriate decade. If you're really interested, see if there's an estate sale in your area. There will be plenty of architectural cues from seeing a property in its original state! There are many ways you and your designer can approach your home's update while keeping its original charm.

Updated Original Lighting

Lighting is a great way to reference a time period and the architectural style of a home. Visit a local salvage yard or antique store and bring photos of old homes with the same motifs. A sales associate should be able to help you find a light fixture or two that looks like what would originally be found in that period. If you source new lighting from a vendor, just select something that's similar to what you see in the historic photos. It's okay if the finish is different – it may create a historic feel with a slightly updated look. Do a little homework on what your options are, or hire a designer to do this for you, and it'll go a long (long) way!

Powder Rooms are the Perfect Place to add **Character with Flair!**

Another way to add interest and give your guests a WOW experience is the powder room. It's the most frequently used room for guests in the home, and a great place to add a pop of personality. Consider patterns like quatrefoils, floral patterns, and classic geometrics. It's also a great space for those sconces and old mirror you picked up at the local salvage yard. The painter/wallpaper hanger you hire to finish your bathroom walls will likely be happy to refinish those old sconces to make them as good as



I met Alice in the mid-90s, as a young college graduate. From her, I learned how to start a nonprofit organization, how to lead a productive meeting, and how to use collaboration to access broad input for real impact. I also learned from Alice how to effectively advocate for myself and others, and I learned the value of restorative justice. I am choosing to honor Alice as a WRC Warrior for the legal changes she advanced for all women, as well as for the knowledge I use every day in my personal and professional life that I learned from her."

Angela Marchesani, Director of Program Operations: "Dr. Mia Solomon (1956-2013) was an influential knowledge warrior in my life. As one of my first graduate professors, Mia taught me the fundamentals of clinical practice, and became a personal mentor as well. She opened doors for me, professionally and personally, and provided her expert consult when needed. Her faith and encouragement led me to my current role at WRC. She imparted a wisdom that guides me to this day, and inspires me to support and mentor aspiring helping professionals."

A Human Rights Issue?

On February 5, 2018, the United Nations called for "general inputs and specific proposals with regard to ... the human rights to safe drinking water and sanitation."

In 2012 Rotary identified Water and Sanitation as one of its six areas of focus, aligning itself with other international groups. Rotary has designated March 2018 as the "Water and Sanitation Month," to focus attention on these compelling needs throughout the world.

Water is a key issue in the fight to eradicate extreme poverty. The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) partnership with Rotary International combines the vast network of Rotary volunteers with the expertise of USAID to fulfill the joint mission to provide clean water. In 2018, the United Nations renewed its 2015 commitment to 17 Sustainable Goals, which include access to safe water for everyone by 2030.

Clean drinking water is so vital to human life that we rarely experience its loss personally. Hurricanes, floods, and pollution threaten our sources even here in the United States. We expect to have clean water – on tap or from the bottle.

And yet, throughout the world, 844 million people do not have clean water, reports the World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF. 2.3 Billion people don't have a decent toilet. Schools do not have clean water or sanitation facilities.

Absence of adequate sanitation facilities in schools adversely impacts education throughout the world. This particularly affects girls, because it may take an hour or more each way to walk for water and bring it back, a female's responsibility except in Mongolia. And after a certain age girls just do not go to school since there are no facilities for her special needs. Without proper education, the vicious cycle of poverty and disease continues.

To fight disease, combat poverty, and promote education, Rotarians have built latrines and more modern sanitary facilities with sinks and toilets in schools and even in a police station in Nigeria, Sri Lanka, Kenya, Haiti, Bangladesh, the Philippines, and Uganda. Every \$1 invested in water and toilets returns an average of \$4 in increased productivity, according to WHO.

Absence of clean water breeds diarrhea, cholera, guinea worm, typhoid, dysentery, parasites, respiratory illness, pneumonia, liver diseases, neurological disorders, fevers, pain, and death. Visitors to countries with contaminated water can bring transmittable disease back home to the US. Rotarians have helped dig wells and build systems to deliver, collect and purify water in countries like Egypt, Bangladesh, India, Thailand, Jamaica, Ghana, and Haiti.

Rotarians, with partners, built a sewage treatment plant in India, sanitized a lake in Mexico, created a medical camp in Uganda, and developed a **ROTARY CALENDAR:**



sustainable water and sanitation project in Tanzania. WASRAG — the Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group — is a focused Rotary Group of volunteer experts who help with the development of projects to improve sanitation and hygiene around the world.

In addition to building infrastructure, Rotarians provide educational programs for children and communities on the importance of sanitation, hygiene, and proper methods of handwashing including in India, Nigeria, Pakistan, Ghana, and Zambia, which the Centers for Disease Control advocate to deter the spread of disease.

Rotary International also offers Foundation water scholarships to Master's Degree candidates who

have already been admitted to the IHE Delft Institute for Water Education (The Netherlands), the largest international postgraduate water education facility in the world. After returning to their home country, the graduates work with their sponsors to improve water and sanitation in their community.

Locally, clean water is threatened by natural disasters and pollution. Rotarian medical teams and other volunteers rushed to provide emergency disaster relief efforts for victims of numerous hurricanes in affected states. In Lake Erie, near Toledo, Ohio, Rotarians are fighting the pollution caused by the blue-green algae poisoning the lake. Rotarians assembled various government and non-profit groups, collected data from 330 sites, and helped develop and implement plans to clean up the lake.

Rotarians work to improve health, promote literacy, build sustainable economic communities, resolve and prevent conflict, and to provide clean water and sanitation locally and globally, according to their interests. 



Radnor A Better Chance, Inc. (Radnor ABC) is one of the community schools of the National A Better Chance Program. Our goal is to develop leaders of tomorrow by providing students from underserved communities who show strong academic and leadership potential with a home away from home while attending Radnor High School (RHS). Our scholars come from as close as Upper Darby and as far as Minnesota. Since the inception of Radnor ABC 45 years ago, we have over 100 alumni with 95% of our scholars attending college. These academically talented scholars have graduated from Radnor High School and attended a variety of colleges and universities such as Columbia, Duke, Georgetown, Williams, Villanova, Lehigh, Penn State, Hofstra, New York University and the University of Virginia.


Currently, our student participate in such diverse activities as RHS basketball team, RHS cheer team, RHS Soccer Team, RHS Crew, Yearbook, Musical Theatre, Art Club, Color Guard, Orchestra (RHS and Delaware County Youth Orchestra), Madrigals (vocal group) and the Black Student Union (founded by the kids in the ABC house, with the help of alumni Mubarak Lawrence in organizing its inception).

We have one major fundraiser each year, the Radnor ABC Soiree. Held on Friday, May 11, this year and in a home in Radnor, we will have well over 200 attendees. While there is food, drink and a silent auction, the best part of the event is the opportunity to meet our scholars and hear our graduating seniors speak about their last four years at RHS and plans for the future. We also have three alumni speakers share how their experience with Radnor ABC has affected what they have done post-graduation and where they currently are in life.

While it certainly takes the focus, effort and goodwill of our volunteers to make Radnor ABC a success, it also takes the financial support of compassionate individuals and businesses. 

Commissioner's corner

My name is Luke Clark and I am the elected Commissioner for Radnor Township Ward 3, which includes South Wayne, St. Davids and part of Villanova.

As usual, Radnor Township has a lot going on, and that is good. The Board of Commissioners has two meetings every month on the second and fourth Monday evenings of the month at 6:30 PM at the Township Building where everyone is welcome and encouraged to participate. Please note these meetings are broadcast live on the Township television channel, they are replayed on the same channel thereafter and they are uploaded to the Township's YouTube channel as well for viewing any time.

I am sure everyone will join me in welcoming spring to Radnor Township! Radnor has a lot of walkable neighborhoods, as well as a vibrant downtown area and I always look forward to being able to take advantage of that once the weather gets warmer. I also hope that everyone enjoyed the beginning of March Madness and had a festive (and safe) St. Patrick's Day!

The Township's events calendar begins to pick back up once spring comes around. On Sunday, April 8, we are having the Spring Eggstravaganza at Villanova Stadium, which is always fun for everyone. Additionally, we have my favorite event, the Wheels of Wayne, on Sunday, April 29, which features incredible cars from all different years and delicious pulled pork, among other attractions. I will send out more information about the annual late spring and summer events the Township will put on in my next article.

Please remember that this is an offyear federal and state election cycle with two special local elections here

in the Township. First, at the federal level, we have elections for all the members of the House of Representatives as well as one-third of the Senate. Next, at the state level, we have elections for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, other state executives, Representative and one-half of the Senate. Lastly, at the Township level, we have special elections for Commissioner for Wards 1 and 7, which were vacated last year when Commissioners Phil Ahr and Jim Higgins resigned. The nomination petitions for these offices were due by March 6, so please make sure to check out who is on the ballot for the Primary Election for these offices on May 15.

At the Board level, 2018 started out tough for us for several reasons. First, we began the year with one vacant seat, three new Commissioners and a major land development application with a deadline for approval or denial fast approaching. Next, we had to figure out who to appoint as the interim Commissioner to the vacant Ward 1 Commissioner seat. Lastly, we had to figure out who to appoint as Chair of the Vacancy Board to assist with appointing the aforementioned interim Commissioner. All of that was a lot

to throw at a new Board still trying to come together to govern effectively. However, we came to a unanimous consensus on the Vacancy Board Chair, we appointed Matthew Marshall Interim Ward 1 Commissioner, and we called a Community Development Subcommittee meeting to address all issues raised by Commissioners, staff and the public regarding Penn Medicine's land development application.

All the above challenged our ability to come together as a cohesive and efficient Board, but I believe we handled it well and have set ourselves up to be a Board that listens and endeavors to do the business of the Township instead of fighting over internal issues and conflicts. I am excited to note the Radnor Memorial Library renovation and expansion is wrapping up, Villanova University has begun its last phase of its land development project, and Penn Medicine will be moving forward with demolition of the 145 King of Prussia Road site soon and will begin its mixeduse land development there. We have a lot of businesses and institutions here in Radnor, which can create traffic and other issues I know, but this truly is a great community to live in, do business in and just be part of!

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

BEWARE

OF THESE SCAMS!

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is frequently visited this time of year by transient criminals who travel great distances in search of victims for their various money-making scams. In many instances, their targets are the elderly. The most effective defense against scams artists is to employ some basic crime prevention tips. Two of the more prevalent scams perpetrated by transient criminals include:

Home Repair Scams: Victims are approached through door-to-door solicitation. The perpetrator offers to seal the victim's driveway, fix the roof, or do some other repairs at an unusually low price. Many times the perpetrator will indicate that they are "working in the area" or they have "extra materials." Typically, they will charge less if paid in cash. Upon completion, the final price is frequently much higher than the original estimate. Additionally, the materials used are typically of an inferior quality.

Diversion Thefts/Imposter Frauds: In this scam, criminals approach and distract a homeowner luring them toward a particular room of the house with ploys such as feigning illness, asking for a drink of water, saying they are looking for a lost pet, etc. They might also pose as a repairman from the local power company or water department in an effort to gain access to the victim's house or lure the victim out of the house. They often present an identification badge and wear what appears to be a work uniform. They will try to convince the victim that they need to test the water pressure, electrical service, or determine where the property line is and will advise that company regula-

tions do not allow the employee to be on the property or in the house unaccompanied. Their intent is to distract the victim while unseen accomplices enter the residence and steal valuables, such as jewelry and cash. In some instances, the suspects communicate with hand-held radios or cellular telephones while committing these offenses. Some of the other less frequently used ploys include claims that the perpetrator works for a tree pruning service, driveway paving service, or fence installation company.

Here are some ways to avoid becoming a victim:

- · Always lock your doors when doing yard work, getting mail, or anytime you go outside - both front and back doors.
- · Be careful who you let in your home. Never allow strangers inside your home, even if they appear to be in distress or with a young child.
- Check with your utility company by telephone if an employee requests to enter your home or wants you to come outside with them. If you do not see official identification, ask for it; however, criminals have become adept at making their own identification cards and each individual's identification should be verified with their respective company.
- · Beware of unsolicited home repairmen. If you cannot verify the name, address, or telephone number of the repairman, they might not be reputable. If you need the services of a home repairman, work with local tradespeople recommended by friends

- or reputable building supply stores. Request local references. Check your local phone directory, your municipality's building officials, or the Better Business Bureau to verify they are legitimate. Verify that the contractor is properly licensed, bonded, and insured. Per the Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act, Pennsylvania contractors who perform at least \$5,000 of home improvements per year are required to register with the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office. Their paperwork must display the company's registration number that can be verified at the Pennsylvania Attorney General's website at http://hicsearch.attorneygeneral.gov or by calling 1-888-520-6680.
- You can call the Community Development Department at 610-688-5600 to verify if the individual is licensed.
- · Be cautious of "One Time Offers." You should not have to make a decision on the spot to receive the deal or special that is being offered, even if the contractor says, "we will only be in the area for today!"
- Be suspicious of high pressure sales tactics.
 Obtain written contracts describing the explicit specifications of the work, the price, the responsibility for cleaning up, and the hourly rate for any added work. Never sign a contract or agreement without carefully reviewing it. You should understand and agree to all of the contract or agreement provisions.
- · Get at least three estimates from at least three different contractors. Check and verify all references supplied by the contractor. Shop around!
- \cdot Know the difference between proposals (estimated costs) and contracts (specified costs).

- · Be sure the contract describes the service(s) to be performed, lists the materials to be used and includes a starting and expected completion date.
- · Ask for a written warranty or guarantee with your contract.
- Be certain the work is completed to your satisfaction before you make final payment. Require a guarantee on the work and pay by check so you can stop payment if dissatisfied.
- Be cautious of companies that require advanced payments.
- Write down the license plate number of any vehicles suspicious individuals may be operating. Try to obtain a good physical description of anyone who comes to your door.
- · CALL THE POLICE TO REPORT THE IN-CIDENT IMMEDIATELY! Never be too embarrassed to report that you might have been victimized or swindled.
- Contact the Better Business Bureau to file a complaint for the non-delivery of services or check with them ahead of time to see if there were prior complaints.

FACILITY INFORMATION

The Radnor Activity Center at Sulpizio Gym (RAC) is an indoor gymnasium where members of the community can participate in programs organized by the Radnor Township Recreation and Community Programming Department. The building was formerly part of Radnor Middle School and through a lease agreement with the School District, the township is allowed to program a variety of activities during the week and weekends.

The building was named in honor of Louis J. Sulpizio, a former educator, coach and administrator within the Radnor School District. Mr. Sulpizio was born and raised in Wayne and was a graduate of Radnor High School. He joined the school district in 1951. Over his tenure, he taught history, coached all sports, and retired as the Radnor Middle School Assistant Principal in 1983.

The RAC is located at 125 South Wayne Avenue in beautiful downtown Wayne, directly behind the Radnor Fire Company. Newly renovated in 2016, it is a full-size gymnasium facility available for birthday parties and special events for community residents and organizations.

Parking is available in the municipal lot across the street from the Radnor Fire Company. Please do not park in the Fire Company parking lot.
